

The Holy Eucharist: Enriching Our Worship

The Third Sunday after the Epiphany January 21, 2024 • 10:15 a.m.

HOLY SPIRIT EPISCOPAL CHURCH

Worship lies at the heart of the Christian life. It is in worship that we express our theology and define our identity. It is through encountering God within worship that we are formed and transformed as the people of God. One of the glories of the Episcopal Church is its liturgical worship. Liturgy refers to the patterns, forms, words, and actions through which public worship is conducted.

The people's responses are in **bold**.

This type of note, offering directions about the service, is called a "rubric," which comes from the Latin word rubrica (red)—referring to a time when these instructional notes were always written in red.

THE ENTRANCE RITE

When the service is accompanied by music, it often begins with an instrumental piece of music, during which the congregation can prepare for worship.

PRELUDE

We begin our worship as a gathered community by praising God in song.

The people stand as able at the introduction to the hymn.



WELCOME

We acknowledge that our worship is taking place in the aboriginal territories of the Salish and Kalispel people.

OPENING ACCLAMATION

The People standing, the Celebrant says

Celebrant Blessed be the one, holy, and living God.

People Glory to God for ever and ever.

THE COLLECT FOR PURITY

This prayer was an English rendering of a Latin prayer that began the liturgy in the medieval church before the Reformation. It remains a distinctive part of Episcopal worship to this day.

The Celebrant may say


Almighty God, to you all hearts are open, all desires known, and from you no secrets are hid: Cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy Name; through Christ our Lord. *Amen*.

Glory to God (Canticle 20)

The Gloria, or some other song of praise, centers the service on the God we gather to praise in our worship.

The following is sung, all standing





THE COLLECT OF THE DAY

The collect is the prayer appointed for each Sunday that "collects" or captures the theme of the day or season of the Church year. It summarizes the attributes of God as revealed in the scriptures for the day.

Celebrant God be with you.

People And also with you.

Celebrant Let us pray.

Give us grace, O Lord, to answer readily the call of our Savior Jesus Christ and proclaim to all people the Good News of his salvation, that we and the whole world may perceive the glory of his marvelous works; who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. **Amen.**

THE LESSONS

The People are seated for the lessons.

THE FIRST READING: Jonah 3:1-5, 10

This reading is typically from the Old Testament (Hebrew Scriptures) which Jesus knew and from which he often referred or quoted.

A Reading from the book of Jonah.

¹The word of the LORD came to Jonah a second time, saying, ²"Get up, go to Nineveh, that great city, and proclaim to it the message that I tell you." ³So Jonah set out and went to Nineveh, according to the word of the LORD. Now Nineveh was an exceedingly large city, a three days' walk across. ⁴Jonah began to go into the city, going a day's walk. And he cried out, "Forty days more, and Nineveh shall be overthrown!" ⁵And the people of Nineveh believed God; they proclaimed a fast, and everyone, great and small, put on sackcloth.

¹⁰When God saw what they did, how they turned from their evil ways, God changed his mind about the calamity that he had said he would bring upon them; and he did not do it.

Reader Hear what the Spirit is saying to God's people.

People Thanks be to God.

The People remain seated.

THE PSALM

The psalms are prayers that Jesus used and cover every mood of humanity's relationship with God and one another.

Reader

Our response to the first reading is a portion of Psalm 62, found in the service leaflet. Please pray it with me.

PSALM: Psalm 62:6-14

For God alone my soul in silence waits; *

truly, my hope is in him.

⁷He alone is my rock and my salvation, *

my stronghold, so that I shall not be shaken.

8In God is my safety and my honor; *

God is my strong rock and my refuge.

Put your trust in him always, O people, *

pour out your hearts before him, for God is our refuge.

¹⁰Those of high degree are but a fleeting breath, *

even those of low estate cannot be trusted.

¹¹On the scales they are lighter than a breath, * all of them together.

¹²Put no trust in extortion;

in robbery take no empty pride; *

though wealth increase, set not your heart upon it.

¹³God has spoken once, twice have I heard it, *

that power belongs to God.

¹⁴Steadfast love is yours, O Lord, *

for you repay everyone according to his deeds.

THE SECOND READING: 1 Corinthians 7:29-31

This reading, taken from the New Testament, is typically from a letter (epistle) to the early Church, the Acts of the Apostles, or the Revelation to John.

The people sit.

A Reading from Paul's First Letter to the Church in Corinth.


²⁹I mean, brothers and sisters, the appointed time has grown short; from now on, let even those who have wives be as though they had none, ³⁰and those who mourn as though they were not mourning, and those who rejoice as though they were not rejoicing, and those who buy as though they had no possessions, ³¹and those who deal with the world as though they had no dealings with it. For the present form of this world is passing away.

Reader Hear what the Spirit is saying to God's people.

People Thanks be to God.

The People stand to sing the hymn.

The sequence hymn moves us toward the summit of the Liturgy of the Word—the reading of the Holy Gospel. Gospel means "good news"—specifically the "good news of Jesus."



All remain standing as able.

THE HOLY GOSPEL: Mark 1:14-20

This reading is taken from one of the four Gospels (Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John), which depict the life, teachings, death, resurrection and ascension of our Lord Jesus Christ. We stand for the Gospel reading to show the particular importance placed on Jesus' words and actions.

The Holy Gospel of our Savior Jesus Christ according to Mark.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

¹⁴Now after John was arrested, Jesus came to Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God, ¹⁵and saying, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news."

¹⁶As Jesus passed along the Sea of Galilee, he saw Simon and his brother Andrew casting a net into the sea—for they were fishermen. ¹⁷And Jesus said to them, "Follow me and I will make you fish for people." ¹⁸And immediately they left their nets and followed him. ¹⁹As he went a little farther, he saw James son of Zebedee and his brother John, who were in their boat mending the nets. ²⁰Immediately he called them; and they left their father Zebedee in the boat with the hired men, and followed him.

The Gospel of our Savior.

People Praise to you, Lord Christ.

The People are seated at the invitation of the preacher.

THE SERMON

Valerie Hess, Lay Preacher

The sermon directly follows the Gospel because it is to be grounded in the scriptures. It illuminates the scriptural readings and relates them to daily life.

The People stand.

THE NICENE CREED

The word "creed" comes from the Latin "credo" for "I believe." First formulated at the Council of Nicaea in 325 AD and confirmed in 381 AD, the Nicene Creed is said at the Holy Eucharist and reflects what Christians believe regarding the relationship between the Father, Jesus, and the Holy Spirit: the Holy Trinity.

We believe in one God,
the Father, the Almighty,
maker of heaven and earth,
of all that is, seen and unseen.
We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ,
the only Son of God,
eternally begotten of the Father,
God from God, Light from Light,
true God from true God,
begotten, not made,
of one Being with the Father.
Through him all things were made.
For us and for our salvation
he came down from heaven:
by the power of the Holy Spirit

he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate;

he suffered death and was buried.

On the third day he rose again

in accordance with the Scriptures;

he ascended into heaven

and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life,

who proceeds from the Father and the Son.

With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified.

He has spoken through the Prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.

We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.

We look for the resurrection of the dead,

and the life of the world to come. Amen.

All remain standing, as able, or sit or kneel.

THE PRAYERS OF THE PEOPLE

We pray for ourselves and particularly on behalf of others. In our prayers we pray for the Universal Church, the nation and all who govern, the welfare of the world, the concerns of our community of faith, including those who are in need or suffer, and for the departed. We are reminded in prayer that we are part of a larger fellowship, the Church—the Body of Christ.

The People stand, sit, or kneel as they are able.

Intercessor The Prayers of the People are guided by Form 6 found on page 392 of the Book

of Common Prayer and in the service leaflet. Please pray them with me.

For God alone our souls in silence wait.

Watchful for your light and in peace, we pray to you, Lord God.

For all people in their daily life and work;

For our families, friends, and neighbors, and for those who are alone.

For this community, the nation, and the world;

For all who work for justice, freedom, and peace.

For the just, sustainable, and proper use of your creation;

For the victims of hunger, fear, injustice, and oppression.

For all who are in danger, sorrow, or any kind of trouble;

For those who minister to the sick, the friendless, and the needy.

For all who are discerning your call, and for the grace, peace, and unity of the Church of God;

For all who proclaim the Gospel, and all who seek the Truth.

In the Anglican Cycle of Prayer, we pray for the Church of South India (United), and in the Diocesan Cycle of Prayer, we pray for the Church of the Incarnation and the community of Great Falls, with Lori Hale Babcock as Interim Rector and Donna Gleaves as Deacon. We pray especially this morning for Dick Rognas and Heidi Johnson, for those lost to disease, destruction, or violence, and, in silence or aloud, for other loved ones who have gone before us.

Who put their trust in you.

The Priest stands and says

Almighty God, to whom our needs are known before we ask, help us to ask only what accords with your will; and those good things which we dare not, or in our blindness cannot ask, grant us for the sake of your Son Jesus Christ. *Amen*.

CONFESSION OF SIN

The Deacon or Celebrant says

Let us confess our sins to God.

Silence may be kept.

Minister and People

God of all mercy,
we confess that we have sinned against you,
opposing your will in our lives.
We have denied your goodness in each other,
in ourselves, and in the world you have created.
We repent of the evil that enslaves us,
the evil we have done,
and the evil done on our behalf.
Forgive, restore, and strengthen us
through our Savior Jesus Christ,
that we may abide in your love
and serve only your will. Amen.

The Priest stands and says

Almighty God have mercy on you, forgive you all your sins through the grace of Jesus Christ, strengthen you in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep you in eternal life. *Amen*.

THE PEACE

All stand. The Celebrant says to the people

Celebrant The peace of Christ be always with you.

People And also with you.

The Ministers and People may greet one another in the name of the Lord.

Having listened to the Word of God, affirmed our faith, confessed our sins, received forgiveness and shared in the peace, we are prepared for the drama and miracle of the Holy Communion. THE GREAT THANKSGIVING

In the Great Thanksgiving, we do what Jesus himself asked us to do: thank God and recall all that God has done for us in the life, death, and resurrection of Christ. The Great Thanksgiving, or Eucharistic Prayer, is a long prayer with four parts. Each of these four parts corresponds to a different action of Jesus at the Last Supper, where he took, blessed, broke, and gave bread and wine as sacraments of his body and blood. We begin the Great Thanksgiving with the Sursum corda, meaning "Lift up your hearts."

Presider Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.
People It is right to give our thanks and praise.

Celebrant

All thanks and praise are yours at all times and in all places, our true and loving God; through Jesus Christ, your eternal Word, the Wisdom from on high by whom you created all things. You laid the foundations of the world and enclosed the sea when it burst out from the womb; You brought forth all creatures of the earth and gave breath to humankind.

Wondrous are you, Holy One of Blessing, all you create is a sign of hope for our journey; And so as the morning stars sing your praises we join the heavenly beings and all creation as we shout with joy:

The Sanctus (Holy, Holy, Holy) is the hymn of praise that never ceases before God and is based on Isaiah 6:3.



The People stand or kneel.

We recall God's acts of salvation history. The presider says the "Words of Institution" that Jesus said at the Last Supper. During the prayer, the Holy Spirit is invoked to bless and sanctify the gifts of bread and wine.

The Celebrant continues

Glory and honor are yours, Creator of all, your Word has never been silent;

you called a people to yourself, as a light to the nations, you delivered them from bondage and led them to a land of promise.

Of your grace, you gave Jesus to be human, to share our life, to proclaim the coming of your holy reign and give himself for us, a fragrant offering.

Through Jesus Christ our Redeemer, you have freed us from sin, brought us into your life, reconciled us to you, and restored us to the glory you intend for us.

We thank you that on the night before he died for us Jesus took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, gave it to his friends and said: "Take, eat, this is my Body, broken for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper Jesus took the cup of wine, said the blessing, gave it to his friends and said: "Drink this, all of you: this cup is the new Covenant in my Blood, poured out for you and for all for the forgiveness of sin.

Do this for the remembrance of me."

And so, remembering all that was done for us: the cross, the tomb, the resurrection and ascension, longing for Christ's coming in glory, and presenting to you these gifts your earth has formed and human hands have made, we acclaim you, O Christ:

Celebrant and People

Dying, you destroyed our death. Rising, you restored our life. Christ Jesus, come in glory!

The Celebrant continues

Send your Holy Spirit upon us and upon these gifts of bread and wine that they may be to us the Body and Blood of your Christ. Grant that we, burning with your Spirit's power, may be a people of hope, justice and love.

Giver of Life, draw us together in the Body of Christ, and in the fullness of time gather us with [blessed ______, and] all your people into the joy of our true eternal home.

The Great Amen is when the congregation with a unified great voice concurs with all that the presider has prayed. It is the only "Amen" in all capitals found in the Book of Common Prayer, signifying the greatness of the congregation's response.

Through Christ and with Christ and in Christ, by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, we worship you our God and Creator in voices of unending praise.

Celebrant and People

Blessed are you now and for ever. AMEN.

THE LORD'S PRAYER

We pray together the prayer that Jesus taught his disciples to pray. The link between our daily bread and the spiritual food we receive in the Eucharist is an ancient connection.

The Celebrant then continues

And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,

People and Celebrant

Our Father, who art in heaven,
hallowed be thy Name,
thy kingdom come,
thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven.
Give us this day our daily bread.
And forgive us our trespasses,
as we forgive those who trespass against us.
And lead us not into temptation,
but deliver us from evil.
For thine is the kingdom,
and the power, and the glory,
forever and ever. Amen.

THE BREAKING OF THE BREAD

The Celebrant breaks the consecrated Bread. A period of silence is kept. Then may be said

FRACTION ANTHEM

Celebrant We break this bread to share in the Body of Christ.

People We who are many are one body, for we all share in the one bread.

INVITATION

The Celebrant says

The Gifts of God for the People of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

DISTRIBUTION OF COMMUNION

The ministers receive the Sacrament in both kinds, and then immediately deliver it to the people.

All who seek God and a deeper life in Christ are welcome to receive Holy Communion. Please receive the bread in open and outstretched hands and respond to receiving Communion by saying "Amen." Gluten-free wafers are available; please make your need known to the minister. Receiving the bread only is full participation in the Eucharist. Wine is also available, and you may drink from the common cup or dip your wafer in the intinction cup. If you prefer to receive a blessing instead, please indicate your choice by crossing your hands across your chest. Those who wish to have Holy Communion brought to them at their seat should notify an usher.

God's Blessing be with you, Christ's peace be with you, the Spirit's outpouring be with you, now and always. *Amen*.



ANNUAL SOCK DRIVE FOR THE POV CONCLUDES THIS SUNDAY

Let's start 2024 the same generous way we Holy Spirit parishioners have begun every year since 2016: by donating socks, scarves, hats and gloves to our houseless brothers and sisters who reside at the Poverello Center and Johnson Street Shelter. The collection, which began on Sunday, January 7, will conclude on Sunday,

January 21. The easily recognizable red-and-white striped box is located in the parish hall. A second more modest plastic bin has been set on the porch by the church office for receiving items for extended hours outside the building.

We welcome items that are hand-knit, store-bought or gently used. Please remember: socks should be made from wool or synthetic fabrics such as Thermolite. Please NO cotton. Cotton does not keep out the cold and fails to wick away moisture, making feet feel cold and damp. Houseless men and women who sleep at the Poverello Center and Johnson Street Shelter spend many of their daytime hours outside in our cold, snowy and windy winter weather. As a result, these facilities go through many, many pairs of socks and other wooly items in a single day. TODAY IS ALMS SUNDAY FOR THE POVERELLO CENTER'S HOT TEAM

The socks, hats, and gloves that we have been gathering this month for the Poverello Center help to warm those reached by the Pov's Homeless Outreach Team (HOT). The goal of the HOT Team is to help people who are living unsheltered to rebuild relationships and redevelop – or create - systems of support to help them stay alive, and to ultimately support them to find permanent housing. The Team works with an array of people each day, including business owners, law enforcement, healthcare providers, donors, and volunteers, to educate the public on what they can do to help unhoused neighbors. They develop connections across the community, and believe that in doing so, they can help to fill crucial gaps and keep the city safer. We will learn more today about their work and ways we can be supportive. HOLY SPIRIT | EPISCOPAL CHURCH PROPOSED 2024 BUDGET

Yearend 2023 Financials/Proposed 2024 Budget

The financials for 2023 ended up much better than had been projected. Originally, the budget projected a \$72,318 deficit, but due to the factors outlined below, the year resulted in an operating deficit of \$53,441, so about \$19,000 better than projected.

Key items impacting the 2023 operating income and expenses:

- Pledges were about 18K lower than budgeted but Plate offerings and Other Income were over \$45,000 higher than projected.
 - These did include special gifts and memorials from some of our parish family we lost in the past year.
- Special Holiday offerings, Rummage Sale, and Holiday Market added an extra \$4,000 over the budgeted income.
- Although not a major income Item at this point, various parishioners have made Deferred Gift Annuities to the Montana Community Foundation for the benefit of Holy Spirit Endowment. Those funds are beginning to generate income that we can use in our operations. This last year the income from that source was about \$1,900, but they are projected to grow substantially going forward. If you have interest contributing to this type of endowment, please reach out to Keith Kuhn or Dorcie Dvarishkis, and they can connect you with the appropriate representative at the Montana Community Foundation who can explain the workings, tax advantages, etc. of this type of donation.
- On the Expense side, the biggest expense is employee compensation. It makes up over 60% of the total budgeted expenses. This area ended the year pretty close to budget.
- For general operating expenses, we ended up about \$4,000 higher than projected. Much of this was in additional printing costs for memorial service bulletins and the use of expanded weekly service leaflets.

Between 2019 and 2021, Holy Spirit received a gift from the Mary Blair estate which is restricted to use for buildings and grounds. During the past year we have used about \$20,000 of those funds for various improvements to the parish properties.

The parish investments were tapped into to make up the shortfall for operational expenses. We started the year with \$682,955 in cash and investments and ended the year with \$642,435, for a decrease of just over \$40,000 after investment earnings.

Comparing the proposed 2024 budget to the 2023 budget, it reflects a decline in our budgeted income of nearly \$15,000 due to a reduction in pledges. Expenses were held very close to the same as 2023, with the exception of salaries. The budget includes a 3.20% cost of living increase which is in line with the SSI increase. We have yet to see additional savings from the solar panels and have not adjusted the utilities expense. The diocesan assessment will increase \$5,189. Our projected budget shortfall for 2024 is just over \$89,000.
