

Our Advent theme comes from the common prayer that is often said before meals. I grew up saying it at every single family supper, and I always thought it was a way to give thanks and praise for the food that was prepared for us. From the fields, animals, crops, it came from. From the workers who packaged it. From the stores and employees who sold it to us. Then from my parents or grandparents who prepared it for us to eat. I always focused on the food portion (probably because of supper time), but I never stopped to pay attention to the phrase at the beginning: "Come, Lord Jesus, be our guest..."

So then, what does it mean to have Jesus be our guest? In the Polish Christmas Eve tradition known as Wigilia, there are twelve traditional dishes on the table representing the twelve disciples. There is also an empty chair set at the table for any unexpected visitor because if someone shows up at your door

they should be fed and given shelter. It goes hand in hand with an old polish saying that translates to "a guest at home is God at home."



By having

Jesus as our guest, we are practicing the hospitality that is laid out to us by God. We are inviting Jesus into our lives, and opening are our hearts and minds in preparation for Jesus to fully come into our world. This preparation carries us through Epiphany and into Lent too. What would it mean to fully invite Jesus into our lives? To practice this hospitality of letting Jesus fully become our guest in our homes, in our lives, and in our world?

IT'S A TEAM EFFORT

I have referred to Christianity as a team sport. We can't do it alone. We worship together. God's Word

comes to us best through hearing (which requires someone to speak or read it to us). The root word for Communion is "common"—something



shared with others. St. Paul coined the phrase "one another"—we love one another, we forgive and encourage one another. He uses this phrase over a dozen times because we are "members of one another." (Romans 12:5).

My job is to visit those who can't worship in person, or who are homebound in some way. I am visitation pastor. Most of these saints are 80+ years old. I enjoy my time with these elder RLCers. We also have a great care team who visits, helps with transportation to appointments, and serves in other ways.


One concern I have is making sure that we visit those who need a visit. Some situations are obviousmedical issues or a call to the church to request a visit. We deal with what we know and prioritize. Occasionally I hear about some elder member who is upset that they haven't been visited. Fair enough. If we have been notified that they would like a visit it is up to me, the care team, or another pastor to respond. But we can't respond if we don't know. To be the caring church we want RLC to be we need to see it as a team effort where we communicate openly with each other and for each other. If you would like a visit—or if you know of someone else who would like oneplease let us know. We will do our best to make a connection.

Let's keep the communication and caring—flowing. Your pastors and care team are ready to respond as part of team RLC.

Solar lighting options are numerous and confusing with endless possibilities, until, KJ and Bob Bach designed, engineered, and installed a solar panel fed battery powered LED light that is controlled by an internal timer. The lighting for the monument is now operating on 100% solar energy at a fraction of the repair and parts cost.

TAX-SMART DONATION STRATEGIES

As 2023 comes to an end, many donors are looking for guidance on how to develop a charitable giving plan for the remainder of 2023. These tips have been adapted from Schwab Charitable. More information is available online here: www.schwabcharitable.org. Members and friends of RLC are encouraged to consult with their tax professional before acting on this information.

Make a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) of Individual Retirement Account (IRA) assets. Individuals age 70½ and older can instruct an IRA administrator to send up to \$100,000 per year—all or part of the annual



RMD—to charities such as Roseville Lutheran. The IRA assets go directly to RLC, so donors don't report QCDs as taxable income and don't owe any taxes on the QCD, even if they do not itemize deductions

Donate Appreciated Stock. Appreciated non-cash assets—such as publicly traded securities, held more than one year provide a unique opportunity to leverage your investments to potentially achieve maximum impact with your charitable giving. First, you potentially eliminate the capital gains tax you would incur if you sold the assets yourself and donated the proceeds, which may increase the amount available for charity by up to 20%. Second, you may claim a fair market value charitable deduction for the tax year in which the gift is made and may choose to pass on that savings in the form of more giving.

Bunch two years of contributions into 2023. For 2023, the standard deduction is \$13,850 for single filers and \$27,700 for married couples filing jointly. If your total itemized deductions are below those amounts, you may find it beneficial to "bunch" your 2023 and 2024 charitable donations together in 2023 to exceed your 2023 standard deduction. You could then itemize deductions on your 2023 tax return and take the standard deduction for 2024 taxes. This strategy may produce a larger total deduction over two years than two years of standard deductions.

Open a Donor-Advised Fund (DAF) account. A DAF is a simple, tax-smart investment solution for charitable giving that gives the donor flexibility to either make one lump-sum contribution or a series of contributions to charities like Roseville Lutheran Church. Any contribution—of cash or non-cash assets—received by December 31 is eligible for a 2023 tax deduction.

RIVERSIDE INNOVATION HUB

RLC Joins a 2 -Year Learning Cohort Program Through Augusburg University

The Riverside Innovation Hub team is excited to start our work and share what we are doing with the congregation as a whole. This is a two year process that we will engage in where we will learn how to be a public church and a vital neighbor. The purpose of this work is not to get our neighbors to come to church, but is instead for the flourishing of our neighbors and our neighborhood as a whole. This is relational work, where we will strive to really get to know our neighbors. Our goal is to understand the community, value its strengths, and figure out how RLC can be an even better neighbor.

Throughout this two year process, the Riverside Innovation Hub team will participate in learning events at Augsburg University where we will cultivate understanding of the Public Church Framework. This framework will shape our work with the Hub for the next two years.

There are four steps to the framework: 1) Accompaniment, 2) Interpretation, 3) Discernment, and 4) Proclamation. The team will participate in a learning event at Augsburg University for each of these steps and then will be working to enact each step in our context at Roseville Lutheran. We will share more specific information on each step as we learn it. This will be a deliberate process, but we hope that once we begin this process, we will start to develop an assets based perspective that lifts up the gifts that are present in people across the congregation and the community.

In the spring, we will begin the Accompaniment process. Stay tuned for more information and more ways to engage as we move further into this process. Once you enroll, you can put in orders for gift cards. For the Sharing Tree, please request physical gift cards. Once you checkout, you have the option to either pay the church directly or to purchase with a credit card. If you pay the church directly, please either provide payment directly to Pastor Tori, or provide to the church office labeled "youth gift card fundraiser." The physical gift cards will then ship to the church, and Tori will give them to you to provide to the Sharing Tree. Please aim to have gift cards ordered by December 6th so that they arrive in time.

The Fall colors have been popping the past couple of days. Autumn is upon us and winter isn't far behind. The gardens at RLC will rest for the winter, awaiting Spring to then erupt. Thanks to ALL the Lively Landscapers for their energy, time, & efforts this past Summer. Here are a few highlights for 2023:

- Removed the broken arborvitae from behind the cross in the Cross Garden by the North Lobby Entrance, as well as the overgrown junipers along the east wall of the Pre-school. Thanks Mike and Dave!
- The South Terrace had a bit more black dirt put in at the west end to raise the bed so the alyssum that trims the edge of the terrace could be seen.
- Spring Cleanup was truly a kickstart to the all gardens in early May. Thanks to many hands and clippers!
- The Water Buddies once again kept the pots going through another hot summer. Huge thanks, Water Buddies!
- Many buckets of river rock were removed from the Cross Garden preparing it for other plantings. Thanks to Kim Tiber, our newest Lively Landscaper, helping de-rock the Cross Garden and for finding additional medium rocks to cover the base of the cross.
- The Wegalea shrubs that were not happy on the north slope were transplanted to the SW corner of the Activity Center where arborvitae was removed a year ago. Mulch was also added in that corner. River rock was added around the emergency exit step.
- The Cross Garden plantings were installed in early September. Thanks to Ann Schmalz for her Thrivent Action Team Grant to purchase the plants and grasses for the renovated Cross Garden. The Cross was repainted a lighter shade of brown.
- The Child Care House gardens are often a challenge to keep weeded. Linda Satrom came to the rescue in September. However, those gardens need a complete renovation. Looking for a couple of folks who could take on just the child care house gardens in 2024.
- Thanks to those that came for the late summer cleanup event prior to Welcome Sunday.
- Thanks to Julie Wendland for sharing her hostas and Irises and to Julie Henry for sharing her Irises to add to the RLC Gardens.








RLC WELCOME STATEMENT

RLC ORGAN PROJECT UPDATE

The RLC Organ Task Force accomplished the task of identifying a long-term solution for our pipe organ and has transitioned to the Organ Project Team to manage the project of bringing the refurbished Holtkamp #1762 pipe organ from Alabama to RLC.



The congregation voted to move

forward with the organ project in August and RLC signed a contract with organ builder J.F. Nordlie Company of Sioux Falls. Nordlie will restore the organ from Alabama and blend it with 8 ranks (422 pipes) from our current organ and 7 new ranks to create a new instrument consisting of 3 manuals (keyboards) and 57 ranks (3217 pipes). Our new organ will be the J.F. Nordlie Opus 63 organ. It is estimated RLC's organ project will be completed in June 2025.

The wheels are turning on our new organ! The console, windchest and casework designs are in the works and construction of small generic components, such as the compression billows has begun. Other components such as fuses, leathers, the blower, windchest parts, rubber cloth, tremulants, and the adjustable bench mechanisms and have been ordered. The Nordlie crew performed an on-site survey of our pipe loft in early October and measured the diameters of the pipes we will be re-using from our current organ. They traveled to Alabama in early November for final measurements of the Holtkamp organ and all these measurements will assist in final architectural renderings.

CREATING CONNECTIONS

The Organ Project Team wants to promote organ events that develop a greater appreciation for the rich heritage of the pipe organ and fosters congregational and community engagement for all ages. The Community Hymn Sing in August was well attended and brought in many visitors and wonderful singers. Attendees especially enjoyed the opportunity to request their favorite hymn and share why it was special to them. Ice cream sundaes afterwards allowed people time to socialize and meet our neighbors. In November, an opportunity to play our pipe organ gave adults and kids an up close and personal look at this versatile instrument. Not everyone may have an affinity for the organ, but our new pipe organ will benefit all as a fantastic catalyst to bring all ages together to make music and deepen our community connections.


