My dear Friend,

Not too long ago, I received a message from a woman who had lost her job. She was living in a foreign country, in a non-immigrant status that would run out in a year. She was unable to secure a stable job in the last two years and was depleting her life's savings. The woman wrote, "Arun, please pray God sees me and hears my prayer. I feel so hopeless. What if God never again looks in my direction?"

I wonder how many in the world can relate to the woman's cry for help. How many feel hopeless, desperate, or forgotten by God? In the circle of faith and belief as well, are there not those of us who are also eagerly looking for a miracle? To add to the agony of unanswered prayer, some of us might be further confounded by what might appear like "the disproportionate dispensation of grace". Put in practical terms, "Why would God answer the prayers of others while some are left waiting, frustrated or even discouraged?" Remember my mention in a Christmas season sermon about childless Elizabeth and Zechariah? I imagined if Zechariah might have been tempted to tell the Lord, "Lord, I serve you in your temple as your faithful servant, I see how you answer prayers for others. But me? I feel like you pass me by, and I am forgotten!" We, of course know that Zechariah did not yield to that temptation. Instead, he teaches us that what appears like God's "delays" are not necessarily God's denials.

Someone said, "Prayer does not always change things for you; it changes you for things." If that statement is a bearer of truth, could it be that the bigger miracle God might be doing may not be in the apparent answers to our prayers but rather in the divine shaping of our souls? As author Philip Yancey notes, "God does not eliminate pain, as though we were puppets whose strings he could manipulate. Rather, he uses pain, the universal human experience, as one of his most effective means of drawing us to himself." ¹ As C.S. Lewis observed, "We can ignore even pleasure, but pain insists upon being attended to. God whispers to us in our pleasures, speaks in our conscience, but shouts in our pain: it is his megaphone to rouse a deaf world." ²

The book of Hebrews brings us a precious insight: Endure hardship as discipline; God is treating you as his children. For what children are not disciplined by their father? God disciplines us for our good, in order that we may share in his holiness. No discipline seems pleasant at the time, but painful. Later on, however, it produces a harvest of righteousness and peace for those who have been trained by it (Hebrews 12: 7, 10-11). So, if you as a believer are going through some extremely difficult-to-understand testing times, let me encourage you to believe that your miracle can be in the making. Having said that, may I suggest that the miracles we wish for might not always be the miracles God plans. It has been said that God answers prayer in three ways, “yes”, “no” or “wait”. The Rev. Dr. Selwyn Hughes observed that God answers prayer a fourth way. He might sometimes say, “Here, take something even better than what you asked for.”

The God of miracles has the right to create miracles with his own purpose stamped on them. Could it be that, while the burning bush was certainly a logic-defying miracle, the real miracle that God was looking for might have been the emboldening of Moses? Or while the raising of Lazarus was a coroner-defying miracle, the real miracle that God was looking for was the opening of the eyes of Jewish skeptics? Or while the feeding of the 5000 was a caterer-defying miracle, the real miracle that God was looking for was the surrender of a little lad that would become an inspiration on giving for all times?

As we continue to journey together in our studies from the Gospel of Mark, our theme for July will be, “Looking for your miracle”. I invite you to pray with me that we as a congregation might experience the amazing, wonder-working transforming power and miracles of our Mighty God. God is not limited by our expectations, our doubts, or our circumstances. He is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to his power that is at work within us (Ephesians 3:20). He is the same yesterday, today, and forever (Hebrews 13:8). He is the God of miracles.

"You are the God who performs miracles; you display your power among the peoples." (Psalm 77:14)

MY STORY by Harry Rodriguez

Some of you know, but for those who do not, my grandfather was a pentecostal pastor. Reverend Joaquin Rodriguez came to the U.S. in 1955, purchased a building, and started his own congregation soon after. That is where I, from a young age, first attended church. However, I did not last very long there since I couldn't understand or speak Spanish very well, so my mother found an English speaking Pentecostal church for us to attend. They started picking us kids up by bus every Sunday, and we started liking it a lot. All the people were so nice, and it was so good to finally be able to understand and listen to the other people pray and talk to God and ask Him for forgiveness, and telling God how they loved Him. Everything we were learning and being taught about God in Sunday School was making me feel love towards Him, and each summer we went to Bible camp. Those were some of the best memories I had as a child. This went on for a couple of years, but one day, we had a tragedy in the family. I was very close to my two-year-old cousin, Baby Joe, who we lost suddenly in less than twenty-four hours. I was devastated, having never felt the feelings I was feeling then. A ten-year-old boy should not know what a broken heart feels like. I cried so much to mom, continuously asking "why, why, why?". All she could tell me was that God took him to a better place, but I just did not want to hear it. I got so upset with God, and as much as I loved going to church, I told my mom I did not want to go back. I just couldn't comprehend how God could love us so much and then take a baby away from his family. My mom never made me go back, and she never spoke of it again. As time went on, I lost all feelings for God.

I went on with my life with God not in it. I met my wife in junior high when I was twelve and a half years old (just two and a half years after losing Baby Joe), and I am still married today to the most wonderful woman in the world. Having been together forty-four years and married for thirty-six, I know now that God had a big part in it. I know that everything I learned in church about the way God loves us and wants us to love one another played a big part in my marriage. I know now although I lost faith, God never left my side, and I truly believe that He has always been there for me. Neither my wife nor I believe we would have made it this long without Him.

After my mother passed, my father moved on and so did I. We packed up and moved here to PA, as my mother's brother and some cousins lived in the area. Not long after we settled in, my next-door neighbor asked if we would like to come to church. We said we would think about it, and the next week we went. It was great to be in a church again, and I became a regular attender. I ended up taking down the barrier I had used to block God out and started putting my faith and trust in Him. My wife and I were developing a good relationship with the Pastor as well. After learning my father was going to marry a Christian woman who had gotten him back into his faith, I invited him to come visit and attend church with us, and he did. We were a happy family once again, and again I knew that God had played a big part. However, I had a major setback with going to church not too long after, as the Pastor got caught stealing. All the trust and faith I had developed with both him and coming back to church "went out of the window", leaving me not attending church again and asking God why He wanted to keep hurting my heart. Our family moved again, this time to the community of New Cumberland, PA, and after living here a couple of years, God showed me a sign. No, I really saw a sign! It was the sign in front of the church advertising an opening for a custodian... LOL! I called the church, and about three weeks later I was hired. I am now going on eleven years at Trinity, and I am so grateful to my dear friend, Randy Evertts for hiring me. I miss him dearly, but know he is with the Lord.

With all that said, the rest is history. I eventually ended up becoming a member here at Trinity. I want to say thank you to Pastor Arun, as he played a big part in leading me back to my faith and trusting in God again. So many things in my life have changed for the better because of Pastor Arun's trust in me. I know he sees what God sees in me. My faith has never been stronger, and I wish my father was here to see it. Thank you for reading my story.

Thank you, God, for the blessings you have bestowed on my life. You have provided me with more than I could ever have imagined. You have surrounded me with people who have always looked out for me. You have given me family and friends who bless me everyday with kind words and actions. Lord, You are so good. Thank you for being my Father in Heaven who I love and want to follow all of my days. Amen.

MUSIC AS A VEHICLE FOR THE GOSPEL by Jamie Bream

A few months ago, I was asked to create and give a presentation for our church worship retreat on how to best use music as a vehicle for the gospel. As the original presentation was nearly an hour long (we didn't even get to the discussion questions due to time constraints!), I'll briefly recap each of my six main points in this article, highlighting a few important ideas from each part. Hopefully, this recap will help you better understand, appreciate, and implement music as a vehicle for the gospel in both your personal and corporate worship. Of course, if you would like to view the full presentation, please let me know and I will be happy to share it with you!

1. The Who - who or what are we worshipping? In his song "Clear The Stage", Christian recording artist Jimmy Needham says that "anything I put before my God is an idol" - and this is certainly accurate. At its core, anything we can identify as an idol is simply an expression of pleasing the idol of self. We find idol worship of this sort in Genesis 3, where Eve loved her own desire for the forbidden fruit more than she loved her desire for God. I also briefly touched on the differences between praise and worship, the main difference being that humans can give praise (the way we physically and verbally demonstrate our worship) to other people or things, while worship (the way we live our lives, expressing God's greatness) should be solely reserved for God.

2. The What - what is a vehicle? The American Heritage Dictionary defines a vehicle as "a medium through which something is transmitted, expressed, or accomplished". Building on Bob Dylan's belief that "the thing you have to do (as the musician) is make people feel their own emotions", I explained how different tempos, keys, and intervals can change the feel of a musical selection, thereby changing the "type" of vehicle we are driving and consequentially altering the emotional response of our listeners. To emphasize this point, I shared two versions of a scene from Star Wars, the original overlaid with Luke Skywalker's theme and an edited version overlaid with Darth Vader's theme, to demonstrate how the audience's emotional response shifts as a result of the music that they are presented with.

3. The Where - where is this vehicle going? (Well, that depends... where are you taking it?) As a worship leader, I have to know where I am guiding my congregation. In other words, what is our end destination? Using my basketball officiating experience as a tie-in, I shared three questions one must ask to get from one point to another (and ones I ask while preparing to drive to a game assignment): 1. What is my destination? 2. How will I get there? 3. What route will I take to get there? Each of these questions can also be applied to worship and, specifically, in planning meaningful worship setlists. I integrated a lecture given by worship leader Charles Billingsley, in which he explains how to best plan a worship setlist to reach the end goal of "lifting up the name of Jesus and allowing the Spirit to move", as an example of how these questions can be applied in a real-life worship context.

4. The When - when does the vehicle arrive (and what if it doesn't)? Using the well-known Scripture passage of the woman at the well for reference (found in John 4), I argued that our vehicle arrives when our congregation is worshipping in spirit and in truth. With support from several of the Psalms and John MacArthur's book "Worship: The Ultimate Priority", I determined that we reach the point of worshipping in spirit and in truth when our worship matches the model described in Colossians 3:16, which reads, "Let the message about the Messiah dwell richly among you, teaching and admonishing one another in all wisdom, and singing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs, with gratitude in your hearts to God". I also investigated why this vehicle sometimes does not arrive, sharing several potential roadblocks that could cause the vehicle to stop short of its destination. These roadblocks include not praying at home, coming to church to be entertained, having a divided mind, and performing instead of worshipping (D.A. Carson, *Worship By The Book*).

5. The Why - why is using music as a vehicle for the gospel important? Sharing the gospel through music is important because, simply put, "the songs we sing each week carry the weight of life!". "I don't adhere to rabbis, preachers, evangelists, all of that... I find religiosity and philosophy in the music" Bob Dylan once remarked. "Songs like 'Let Me Rest on a Peaceful Mountain' or 'I Saw the Light' - that's my religion. I've learned more from the songs than I've learned from any of this kind of entity... I believe the songs." This may be true for more people than we ever realize, even those who faithfully attend church each week. I often share the thought that people who attend our services won't go home singing the sermon points, but rather the songs we lead, so our songs must still convey God's truth even though it is through a musical format. Warren Wiersbe sums up the importance of the Why with a simple quote: "I am convinced that congregations learn more theology (good and bad) from the songs they sing than from the sermons they hear." Not that the sermons are unimportant, though - they are actually the most important part of the service! (I covered that point in more detail in the When section.)

Music As A Vehicle For The Gospel...(continued)

6. The How - how do we best use music as a vehicle for the gospel? Simply put, by glorifying God. If man's chief end is to "glorify God, and enjoy Him forever" (as the Westminster Shorter Catechism states), then our worship must be a part of that end. In conjunction with this statement, I shared my personal philosophy of worship by which I evaluate both old and new songs, create setlists for service, rehearse with our Revive worship team, and do many other things, all with the ultimate and final goal of glorifying God. I summed up the entire presentation in one final quote, which comes from Bob Kauflin's *Worship Matters*: "The Gospel is not merely one of the many possible themes we can touch on as we come to worship God. It is the central and foundational theme. All our worship originates and is brought into focus at the cross of Jesus Christ".


