How We Are Saved

Many religions of the world share a common thread. They are based on salvation by works. In ritual practices, participants wash and scrape their skin, slash their bodies with knives or sharp objects, walk on hot coals, and even toss babies into a river. When I visited Thailand on a mission trip, I became aware of worshipers who annually bring little boats they have made to the city’s canals. The people sing while their boats float out of sight, supposedly carrying their sins away.

Some expressions of Christianity also emphasize a works salvation. Certain groups believe their sins are washed away by baptism. Others ascribe saving properties to the elements of the Lord’s Supper. Still others encourage good deeds as a means to atone for sins. But how would you ever know when you have done enough good deeds to merit salvation?

Some depend on family heritage as their hope for making it to heaven. But Christianity is not passed down from generation to generation like a family heirloom. Each of us must have a personal experience with Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord.

Paul believed that salvation comes by grace through faith and is a gift from God (Ephesians 2:8-9). Elsewhere, he admonishes “Work out your own salvation with fear and trembling” (Philippians 2:12). Sometimes this imperative is misunderstood. Clearly the intensifying preposition is not “toward,” “for,” or “at,” but “out.” We are able to work out our salvation only because God already has worked it in! He is the one who initiates and brings about transformation in our lives and then energizes us to accomplish his divine purpose.

How do we work out our salvation? We do it in a spirit of reverence and humility. We are fully aware of our inadequacy and our need for dependence on God. We do not approach our service to him as slaves cringing before a master, fearful of his punishment, but as children not wanting to grieve our heavenly father by our failure to please him and do his will.

Read the New Testament

Many of you accepted the challenge and have read the New Testament during March. Some finished early; others have lagged behind. Please don’t give up. There is nothing special about the suggested monthly period. Keep reading at your own pace and allow the Lord to bless your effort.

Easter Sunday

Plan to be present in worship on Easter Sunday, April 5. We will celebrate the resurrection of our Lord. “Christ our Lord is risen; He is risen indeed!”
