From my heart to yours:

A Day in the Life of Jesus

Mark 1:21-39 is a large unit that depicts a day in the life of Jesus.

How I wish I could have been there!



It is revealing to see the places Jesus went and the things he did.

The setting was Capernaum, a town situated on the northwest shore of the Sea of Galilee. This was the headquarters for Jesus' Galilean ministry. Here it was said that he was "at home" (Mark 2:1).

In the morning on this particular day Jesus taught in the synagogue and healed a pathetic victim possessed with an unclean spirit. Afterward, he went to the home of Peter and Andrew where he healed Peter's mother-in-law. Immediately she arose and prepared a chicken or fish dinner for the group (1:29-31). Just a conjecture. In the evening Jesus was in the streets addressing the needs of a sea of hurting people (1:32-24). Sometime during the night he slipped away to a "lonely place" for prayer (1:35-39).

Jesus attended the synagogue, the place of worship. He spent time at home with his adopted family. He took advantage of the opportunity to minister to others. Finally, he drew apart for a quiet time with his heavenly Father.

Jesus provided a worthy pattern for us to follow. We will be able to maintain spiritual balance in our lives when we participate in corporate worship, spend quality time with family, grasp opportunities to minister to others, and plan moments alone with God in private devotion.

Two possible traps await us. One is to regard communion with God as an end in itself with little or no allowance for service. The other trap is to magnify service at the expense of worship and taking time to be still with God. Both are important realities.

May our prayer be, "God grant me the wisdom to know when to worship, when to work, and when to play. Amen."





Barcelona Road Baptist Church has established with the Church's account at Regions Bank a Zelle Account. If your bank has Zelle, it is very simple to use.

You download a mobile app on your phone and set up a payee for the Church using the email brbc3finance@att.net. Funds are then transferred electronically when you designate a donation to be made. Regions Bank notifies the Church by email that the funds are available in our account. There are no fees to the church or the sender and no checks to write or mail. You can also go directly to Zellepay.com and open an account.

This is an option that some of our members are currently using that perhaps you were not aware is a possibility. Not every bank is equipped to transfer through Zelle, so you will need to contact your bank.



Robert Langley, a member of BRBC and a trained instructor, started teaching Tai Chi classes in September in the Fellowship Hall. There were so many who wished to take the class that it was divided into two sessions—one Thursday and one Friday, both at 11:00 AM.

Tai Chi is a mind-body exercise and meditation practice that combines slow, gentle, and controlled movements with focused breathing and deep attention. It aims to improve physical health, balance, strength, flexibility and mental well-being. The movements are circular, continuous, and never forced, keeping joints relaxed and muscles soft, making it an accessible, low-impact activity for people of all ages and fitness levels.

<u>The Italian Ballerina</u>: a World War II novel by Kristy Cambron - Delaney Coleman recently lost her grandfather--a beloved small-town doctor and World War II veteran--so she returns home to help her aging parents. When a mysterious Italian woman reaches out claiming to own one of the family's precious heirlooms, Delaney is compelled to travel to Italy and uncover the truth of her grandfather's hidden past. With the help of the woman's skeptical but charming grandson, Delaney learns of a Roman hospital that saved hundreds of Jewish people during the war. Soon, everything Delaney thought she knew about her grandfather comes into question.



Based on true accounts of the invented Syndrome K sickness, <u>The Italian Ballerina</u> journeys from the Allied storming of the beaches at Salerno to the London ballet stage and the war-torn streets of World War II Rome, exploring the sometimes heart-wrenching choices we must make to find faith and forgiveness and how saving a single life can impact countless others.

The Water Keeper/The Letter Keeper (Books 1 and 2 of the Murphy Shepherd series) by Charles Martin – In Book 1, Murphy Shepherd is a man with many secrets. He lives alone on an island, tending the grounds of a church with no parishioners, and he's dedicated his life to rescuing those in peril. But as he mourns the loss of his mentor and friend, Murph himself may be more lost than he realizes. When he pulls a beautiful woman named Summer out of Florida's Intracoastal Waterway, Murph's mission to lay his mentor to rest at the end of the world takes a dangerous turn. Drawn to Summer, and desperate to find her missing daughter, Murph is pulled deeper and deeper into the dark and dangerous world of modern-day slavery.

In Book 2, Murphy Shepherd has made a career of finding those no one else could--survivors of human trafficking. His life's mission is helping others find freedom . . . but then the nightmare strikes too close to home. When his new wife, her daughter, and two other teenage girls are stolen, Murphy is left questioning all he has thought to be true. With more dead ends than leads, he has no idea how to find his loved ones. After everything is stripped away, love is what remains. Hope feels lost, but Murphy is willing to expend his last breath trying to bring them home.

"To everything there is a season, and a time to every purpose under the heaven." — Ecclesiastes 3:1

This verse perfectly captures the essence of October as a season of change. God ordains a time for every event and purpose. Whether October brings joy, challenge, or rest, this verse reminds us to trust God's perfect timing and plan. It encourages us to embrace the present moment, knowing it fits into His divine design.
