From my heart to yours:

School is in session and our Wednesday night program with kids is moving forward.

This is also a time for our Nominating Committee to do its work. The Committee nominates folks who will serve on church committees and as church officers. Teams are made up of volunteers who are involved in specific areas of ministry. Committee members serve for three-year terms. Team members have open-ended terms of service. Pray about the part you can play in our church.

Other areas of church life are important and call for our dedication. Let me make several imperative statements. These things we must do in order for our church to move forward.

Be faithful in attendance. Sunday School and Morning Worship are important times for God's people to come together. Are you faithful in attendance? There may be truth in the little rhyme, "Every time I pass the church I stop in for a visit. So that when I'm carried home the Lord won't say, 'Who is it?'"

Be prayerful. Jesus' life was punctuated by prayer. He prayed in every situation. According to the Book of Acts, the early church was characterized by fervent, continual prayer. Will you be a prayer warrior for our church? Be faithful in attendance at our Wednesday night Prayer Meeting. Join our prayer room ministry. Consider forming a prayer group with several others.

Be generous. The same Bible that tells us how to be saved also tells us we ought to tithe. "The tithe is the Lord's" (Leviticus 27:30). A pastor shared with his congregation that he had some good news and some bad news. The good news was that there was enough money to accomplish all the programs and ministries God had planned for their church. The bad news is that it was still in the pockets of the people. Thankfully, most folks in our church give regularly and generously. Do you fit into this pattern?



Be friendly. Welcome our guests on Sunday morning the way you receive guests at your door at home. Do you casually open the door, turn and walk away, and hope they will find their way in? It grieves me when I see visitors sitting by themselves on a pew with nobody else nearby. Why not move to where they are sitting, or ask them to sit with you? It is tragic when guests leave even before the service begins when told they are sitting in someone else's seat!

Be a witness. Our Lord declared, "You shall be my witnesses" (Acts 1:8). All of us can tell others what the Lord has done for us. Our personal testimony is the best witness of all. All of us can invite friends and neighbors to church. Most of the people who join our church do so as a result of a special invitation from you. Relational or friendship evangelism is an effective way to reach others for Christ.

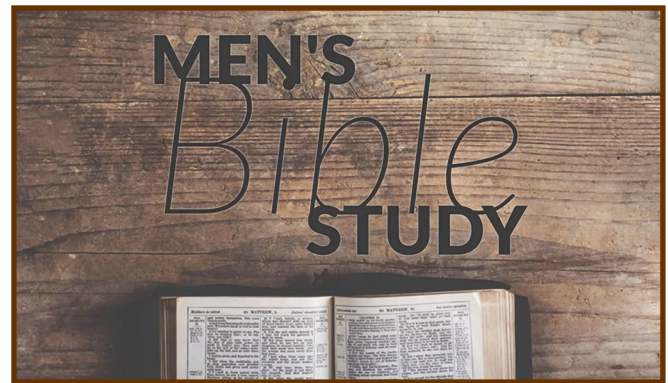

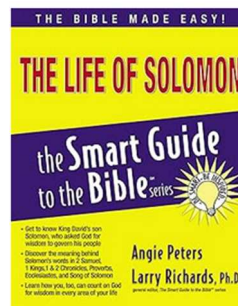

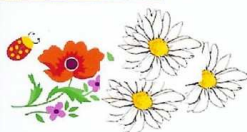

Calling all kids, parents, grandparents... and anyone who enjoys family-friendly books and movies with a little bit of whimsy! All of this month's highlights have to do with "Winnie the Pooh"—but they are definitely not just for children!

The heartwarming family film A BEAR NAMED WINNIE dramatizes the true story that inspired one of the most beloved children's book characters of all time. On the eve of World War I, Canadian soldier Lt. Harry Colebourn (Michael Fassbender) adopts an orphaned bear cub and after naming her Winnie (for the city of Winnipeg), decides to make her the unofficial mascot of his army regiment. When Harry and his troop are deployed to the trenches of France, Winnie is temporarily housed at the London Zoo, where author A. A. Milne meets the bear and uses her as the inspiration for his children's stories, WINNIE THE POOH. FINDING WINNIE - This sweet tale of the black bear that inspired



the legendary children's book character Winnie-the-Pooh will resonate with readers. In the framing story, a mother tells her son, Cole, a bedtime tale about how veterinarian Harry Colebourn, a young Canadian soldier on his way to train and fight in Europe during World War I, stumbled upon a baby black bear that he bought off a trapper at a train depot. Colebourn named the bear Winnie, short for Winnipeg, a gentle reminder of his hometown, and took the bear with him to England. Winnie quickly became the mascot of his unit. But when the time came to ship out to France for combat, Colebourn left his beloved pet in the capable hands of the London Zoo. Calling all kids, parents, grandparents... and anyone who enjoys family-friendly books and movies with a little bit of whimsy! All of this month's highlights have to do with "Winnie the Pooh"—but they are definitely not just for children!

The heartwarming family film A BEAR NAMED WINNIE dramatizes the true story that inspired one of the most beloved children's book characters of all time. On the eve of World War I, Canadian soldier Lt. Harry Colebourn (Michael Fassbender) adopts an orphaned bear cub and after naming her Winnie (for the city of Winnipeg), decides to make her the unofficial mascot of his army regiment. When Harry and his troop are deployed to the trenches of France, Winnie is temporarily housed at the London Zoo, where author A. A. Milne meets the bear and uses her as the inspiration for his children's stories, WINNIE THE POOH. FINDING WINNIE - This sweet tale of the black bear that inspired



the legendary children's book character Winnie-the-Pooh will resonate with readers. In the framing story, a mother tells her son, Cole, a bedtime tale about how veterinarian Harry Colebourn, a young Canadian soldier on his way to train and fight in Europe during World War I, stumbled upon a baby black bear that he bought off a trapper at a train depot. Colebourn named the bear Winnie, short for Winnipeg, a gentle reminder of his hometown, and took the bear with him to England. Winnie quickly became the mascot of his unit. But when the time came to ship out to France for combat, Colebourn left his beloved pet in the capable hands of the London Zoo. Later, Milne and his son, Christopher Robin, visited the London Zoo and Christopher Robin took an

immediate shine to Winnie, developing an unusually strong bond with the animal and even playing with her in her enclosure. The boy imagined all sorts of adventures for Winnie, which became the basis for the now-famous stories written by Milne.

In this heartwarming tale, Christopher Robin (Ewan McGregor), the boy who had countless adventures in the Hundred Acre Wood, has grown up and lost his way.
