

In our home we have three Lutheran Books of Worship:

- 1. Service Book and Hymnal © 1958 That Pat had years before we were married.
- 2. Lutheran Book of Worship © 1978 That Pat and I bought when CLC adopted it.
- 3. Evangelical Lutheran Worship © 2006 That CLC/ILC adopted in English and Spanish.



Inside the cover of the **Red** Book is a paper with a six stanza prayer written by Pat for her catechism (she tells me; with help from her Mother). 1. Almighty and most merciful Father from whom comes every perfect gift. 2. Dear Lord, thank you for the beautiful world and my parents, for churches and for wonders of the world.3. Dear Lord, forgive my sins. 4. Lord I hope to become a forest man and I can worship in a church. 5. I hope that everyone gets a good job in the world and a family and is happy. 6. Lord who liveth and reineth with one God, world without end. Amen.

One thing of note that stands out in my memory about the **Green** Book is when Associate Pastor Gene Holtz (on a Sunday morning between services) introduced it to the congregation. One very important thing he told us is that making the sign of the Cross is very Lutheran. Some of us continue to cross ourselves during personal devotion and congregational worship.

In early 2020 along came COVID-19 and attending church changed radically. Everything was on YouTube with just a few people producing the Sunday morning service. Communion was offered after the service (weather permitting) by drive through in the parking lot. Books of Worship (the **Cranberry** Books) were put away until a healthier time. When the sanctuary was reopened for services many practices of the COVID closing remained. Among these practices, the **Cranberry** books were left unused and forgotten in the pew book racks.


EASTER IN THE HORIZON

CARING MAKES A DIFFERENCE

Many of you know that caring for others can make you feel good. Maybe not right in the moment, when you're knee deep in some unpleasant task, but afterwards when you see that you've made someone's life a little easier or better.


I recently had the pleasure of working for more than a month with Lee Hintz, Harriet Morris, Aida, (the First Lady) and Norma Aguilar, the realtor who previously helped the church sell the two duplexes. We were working to help one of our church families sell their home. The five of us became a team as we helped get our congregants' house ready to sell. We cleaned out closets, moved heavy furniture, painted walls, transported some of the owner's furniture to their new residence and extensively researched and marked prices on the items the owners wanted to sell during a garage sale. Norma, the realtor reached out to her numerous real-estate contacts to facilitate getting rid of junk and landscape the property to increase its curb appeal.

It wasn't all manual labor and heavy lifting. We took breaks, shared conversations, and bought each other lunches. During our breaks we talked and realized we all felt good about helping the owners and what we were doing with each other. As a team we became quite close. When we finished, Norma took us all out to lunch to celebrate the successful sale of the owners' home.

After reflecting on our positive experiences, I realized our team had come together by word of mouth. Harriet Morris first alerted me of the need to help the owners and I reached out to Norma, Lee and my wife. It occurred to me that here at CLC/IL we could intentionally create a similar team, a team I would like to call "The Care Team."

I brought up the idea in a council meeting and it was well received with a few caveats of caution. My main point to the council was that this team of 8 to 10 people could assist congregants with needs that might be difficult for them to do. Tasks like driving someone to a doctor's appointment, periodically helping them with meals, helping them organize their bills, helping them understand their computer, finding them a professional for electrical work, plumbing, HVAC needs, or helping them find legal assistance. Collectively, we all know that visiting shut-ins or people living alone can give them a huge lift from feeling lonely or forgotten. That could also be part of what the Care Team does. But having a garage cleaned out or the grass cut, or the house vacuumed can also lift a person's spirits. My list is neither comprehensive nor set in stone and it's open for further thought and discussion.

The congregation of CLC/ILC has always demonstrated compassion and caring for our members, but it has also been somewhat random. Many of you visit shut -ins, bring communion to people who can't get to church, or as Stephen Ministers

and your caring enriches the lives of those you meet.

I'd like to develop a care team that is intentional, organized and structured. I plan to have a meeting shortly after Easter to further develop this idea. DO YOU KNOW WHAT HAPPENS EVERY FRIDAY AT OUR CHURCH?

From 8 a.m. to 12 p.m. at CLC/ILC every Friday, there is a Food Bank Distribution. About 80 families receive a box of food weekly. That's 320 families a month or 3,840 families a year!

This Food Distribution was started by Arlene Johnson over 25 years ago as an offshoot of Sandwich Ministries. It was started long before COVID and while many Food Distributions were started during COVID on a weekly basis, many are now monthly.



For this to happen, food is recovered from Trader Joe's three times a week and once a week from the San Diego Food Bank. Also, weekly we receive food from Kentucky Fried Chicken.

GROUND RULES FOR FACILITATING A MEETING OR STUDY

Ground rules are useful because they are essentially neutral. Rather than dictate them, have a discussion beforehand so everyone has an opportunity to agree on the rules (for groups that meet often, this has to be done only once.) Afterwards, post the ground rules or give everyone a copy so there isn't any misunderstandings. Then, the facilitator, or anyone else in the meeting can simply refer to the ground rules if someone is throwing it off course and someone can say, "We all agreed to stay on subject; let's get back to topic." Here are some examples of ground rules; you can design them to fit your particular group.

- *Silence your cell phone before the meeting/study begins
- *Meeting/study will start and end on time (if you arrive late or need to leave early please do so quietly)
- *This is a safe space so what is shared remains confidential
- *No side conversations they can be distracting to others who are trying to listen
- *The facilitator guides and maintains the direction of the study so it stays on course

Every Friday about 5-10 volunteers arrive at 8 a.m. to sort and box the food. Most of the volunteers have been involved for many, many years.

At 11:30 a.m., people who have signed up arrive and are given a box of food that usually contains meat, eggs, fruit, vegetables, bread, KFC, desserts, canned foods and dried goods. At many Food Distributions there are guidelines as to only once a month or you have to be a certain age, but at CLC/ILC everyone who signs up is given food weekly.

In San Diego County, an estimated 25% of residents, or 824,000 people, experience food insecurity. This includes 214,000 children, 170,000 older adults (age 60+), and 135,000 people living with disabilities.

I have been volunteering for over five years, and every week I feel that because of our Food Distribution at CLC/ILC, so many families in San Diego are receiving food that will help them be a little less food insecure. I was told by one of the people that picks up a box of food that she counts on this food every week. I have been asked by many people why I volunteer every week and that is why!!



UPDATE ON DEFERRED MAINTENANCE PROJECTS HEAT PUMPS

Head Start, our long-time tenant, has a toddler playground in front of the doors that lead to our Mechanical Room in the basement. They are required on non-rain days, to have the children outside for 1 ½ hours a day. This would mean the HVAC technicians would need to stop, pick up all tools and piece parts, and leave the area.

Head start is on spring break beginning 31 March and asked me if the work could be done during their break. Given that Head Start continued to pay rent, and half of our SDG&E, water, and trash fees during the months they could not use the basement due to the sewer water flood remediation and restoration, this was a very reasonable request.

The HVAC scheduler called to arrange for a firm start date, so I requested they begin 31 March.

ROOF

The roof is 95% finished. What remains to be done is the entry alcove / porch area facing Clairemont Mesa Blvd. The roofers needed this area to be absolutely dry before they could work on it. While this means we won't have leaks from the roof, alas, it does not mean we will never have water dripping into the sanctuary.

All 99 of our stained glass window panes have cracks. There are two-foot eaves extending over the roof arch windows, so rainwater doesn't normally hit them. But if we have a storm with nearly horizontal winds blowing NNE, water will be blown under the eaves and those windows will leak water into the Sanctuary until we can get those replaced.


