# **Learning From The Dying**

I have never experienced a year like 2025. Never have I gone through a time where so many of my friends, former police co-workers, high school classmates, and members of our congregation have passed in such a short period of time. Law enforcement is a big brotherhood, and some of those who passed were former partners, officers on my squad, or people that I worked around. We shared careers marked by exciting events, life-changing tragedies, frustrating failures, and amazing successes. Their passing makes me sad, but their passings aren't surprising. It's where we are in the circle of life.

This year, my lifelong friend, Larry, passed away from ALS, Lou Gehrig's disease. We'd grown up together and were close friends for over sixty years. Last October, Larry called me and asked me to come to his house. When I hung up the phone, I knew it was going to be bad news. Larry told me he probably had less than a year to live. I began visiting him weekly, and we would talk mostly about the Padres or the teams we disliked, like the Dodgers. Sorry Pastor Borbon.



Larry's ALS was the type that first attacked his vocal cords, and he quickly lost his ability to speak. After that happened, we texted about baseball, past girlfriends, or memories of the stupid, fun things we did as kids.

Larry's ALS was aggressive, but before he lost his ability to speak, he shared he'd always thought he'd have about ten years of retirement to spend with his family, and especially his grandkids. Larry lived for less than two years after retirement.

When ALS affected Larry's hand coordination and he lost his ability to text, our visits became more difficult for me. Then the ALS diminished his vision. Larry knew I was with him because he could hear me, but our interactions became very basic. I couldn't tell if my visits were making a difference.

My frustrations grew until one day, when I was standing at the foot of his bed, I prayed to God to help me figure out how to connect with Larry. My prayer was answered when the Holy Spirit said, 'Do as Jesus did for his disciples, rub his feet.' From that moment on, I rubbed Larry's feet during every visit. When I did, I could sense him relaxing, breathing deeper, and falling asleep. It was a blessing because Larry was most fearful about dying in his sleep from suffocation.

Larry passed away in June. The next day, I called Laurie, another childhood friend from our neighborhood, to tell her about Larry's passing. Laurie said she had some bad news, too; she was suffering from pancreatic cancer and fighting for her life. Laurie was diagnosed with her cancer on Easter Sunday, and she knows the journey she's on.

On Sunday, July 20<sup>th,</sup> I asked you (the congregation) to sing two verses of a song to her after the worship service. Twenty-nine of you stood on the steps to the Altar and sent a powerful message that we were all caring for her. It was a message she needed to hear.



Laurie recently had a blood test that measured some substance in her blood, where a normal reading should be 0-35 parts per milliliter. Laurie's results were terrible. She had over 500 parts per milliliter. Her chemo treatments had stalled the spread of cancer, but only for a short time.

I was angry at God after Laurie shared the dire news, and I don't remember ever in my life being angry at God. But I was angry for days. In one of those angry moments, I prayed, "Heavenly Father, all Laurie wants is to live long enough to see her daughter's wedding in June, and you can't let that happen?" I prayed stupid words like, "Come on God, I'm a good guy, I try to be a faithful servant, and I'm even the President of the congregation." It's okay to laugh at those stupid words because they sounded ridiculous even as I prayed them. Saying and doing things when we're angry is probably never a good idea, but in those angry moments, I meant what I said.

I told Aida about my anger, and she chastised me a bit, saying, 'You need to have more faith. Laurie still has hope, I do, and you should too. God can change the course of this.' I believe that wholeheartedly, while realizing God doesn't always reveal the wisdom of His plans.



Since Laurie shared her illness, Aida and I have called her, texted and sent her multiple cards every week. In our conversations. Laurie shared her amazing perspectives on where she's at and where's she's going. She isn't afraid of dying. She's sad that she will be leaving her family yet knows her joy in Heaven will be infinitely greater than her sadness here on earth. She questions why she gets to be with Jesus, but not in the vein of 'Why me Lord?' Instead, her question is, 'Why do I get the blessed honor of being with Jesus before so many others.' I was especially struck when she said, "I've lived a gifted life. I delivered two children without any drugs-it was the worst pain I've ever felt. I was screaming like crazy, but I survived. If God wants me to, I can hang with on the cross with him."

Laurie's faith shaped her values and made her candid about her faith. Her words have the power of believability. Her vision of life with Christ has helped lessen my sense of loss but not eliminated it. That indescribable sensation we get in our chest when sadness is bringing us down lies just beneath my surface right now. This has been a hard summer for me.

The Holy Spirit lifted my spirits when I was told to rub Larry's feet. In doing that, I relearned the truth about the power of touch to the dying. Listening to Laurie, I heard her inspiring words about her faith.

I don't know why God chose to call Larry to his Kingdom now and why Laurie will be there soon. I am tremendously sad, but maybe in my sadness learning lessons from the dying is part of God's greater plan. Still, I wouldn't mind a miracle.

#### PS.

In one of those husband-and-wife conversations, Aida told me to quit getting so teary. I told her I didn't want to stop because shedding tears gave my brain more room to grow. She replied, "If that's the case, you need to start sobbing."






