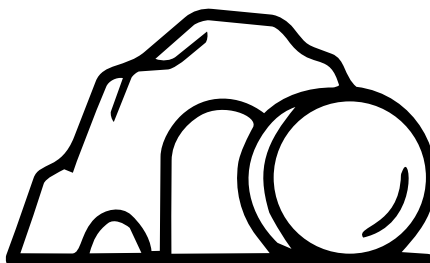
### From the Cross to the Empty Tomb: What Changes for Us?

Dear Church Family,

As we journey through Holy Week and arrive at Easter morning, we stand at the center of our faith: the cross and the empty tomb. These are not just moments in a story long ago; they are the places where our lives are met, transformed, and held by God's grace.

At the cross, we see the depth of God's love poured out. It is here that we bring what weighs heavily on us: our guilt, our regrets, our fears, our failures, and the burdens we try so hard to carry alone. The cross tells us something we often struggle to believe: **we do not have to earn God's love, and we cannot outrun it.** In Christ, God meets us fully in our brokenness and says, "This is not the end of your story." The cross does not deny our pain or sin; it takes them seriously, and then takes them from us.

## Let's Talk About Cancer

Several months ago, I wrote an article for the Clarion where I expressed my sincere thanks to those who had stepped up to the front of the church and sang two verses of the hymn, 'Will You Let Me Be Your Servant.' I asked you to sing verses 2 and 3 for Laurie, a friend of mine for 60 years, who'd been diagnosed with pancreatic cancer. Here are the verses you sang.

Verse 2:

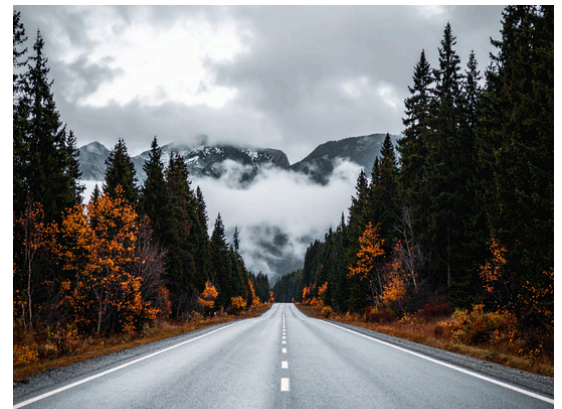
I will hold the Christ light for you in the nighttime of your fear.  
I will hold my hand out to you, speak the peace you long to hear.

Verse 3:

I will weep when you are weeping, when you laugh, I'll laugh with you.  
I will share your joy and sorrow till we've seen the journey through.

The author of those verses probably wasn't thinking specifically about cancer. But the words perfectly describe someone who is willing to walk the difficult path with someone who has cancer. My friend, Laurie, has continued to battle her cancer with chemo treatments, daily prayers, and an amazingly positive attitude. She's also blessed to have many friends who have stood with her since she was diagnosed. Because of our close friendship, I've asked her questions I wouldn't dare ask others with cancer. My questions have been intrusive at times because I want to know how she deals with dying, how she deals with the looming separation from her husband and adult children, and how she deals with the knowledge that she doesn't have enough time left on this earth to realize all of her hopes and dreams. I feel honored by what she has shared.

The journey of dying is a journey we will all experience. For some, the journey is long, and for others, the journey is short with an abrupt end. And most of us don't know what that journey has in store for us. Laurie's candor and wisdom have helped me work through some of my fears and sorrows about dying. And with what Laurie has shared, maybe I'll be able to help others.



Because Laurie shared her diagnosis with me, I've become part of her team, trying to help her laugh and willing to listen to her cry. We are both better for being there for each other.

Laurie has shared that she's learned to live more in the moment. She tries not to sweat the little things. I've taken her wisdom to heart, and I still fail at both of those goals almost daily. And, because of Laurie's amazing faith that Jesus is walking with her, I have greater peace of mind about her tough times. She is not alone. Ever.

Here is why I am sharing this. Many of you have experienced cancer personally, or in the lives of loved ones, friends, or people in our congregation. And you have dealt with it - maybe in a good way and maybe not. Several years ago, about 25 to 30 of us did a book study on forgiveness. The book came out of the Stephen Ministry library, and it was one of the most memorable experiences I've ever had in this church. That group, by sharing their experiences, doubts, and wisdom learned from struggling with forgiveness, gave us all insight into the freedom that comes with forgiveness.



Cancer is perhaps the most frightening disease of our modern times. Its prevalence is growing, but so too are medical techniques, tools, and knowledge on how to fight it. While those are positive developments, we need better insights into how to deal with each other's hearts and spirits with Christ-like love and compassion. We need to be courageous and walk the cancer journey with those in our lives today and be better equipped to walk with those yet to be diagnosed. I believe we can do that with each other and the Holy Spirit in our midst.

Pastor Borbon recognized my grief over Laurie and gave me a book titled, *When God and Cancer Meet*. It's written by Lynn Elb, a Christian woman and cancer survivor. Pastor Borbon asked if I could give him my thoughts after reading it. It was a sly way to hand me the book without saying, 'Hey Gary, you need this.' I found the book inspirational and a quick, easy read.

I've spoken with Theresa Munoz, a Stephen Ministry leader and cancer survivor herself, and both Pastors about using the book as a short four-to-six-week book study. All were excited and supportive of the idea. Theresa is willing to help co-facilitate the study.

If you would like to be part of what I believe will be a valuable and memorable experience, let me know so we can order the books. After Easter, when we see the response, we'll figure out the best time and day of the week to make it work for the greatest number of people.

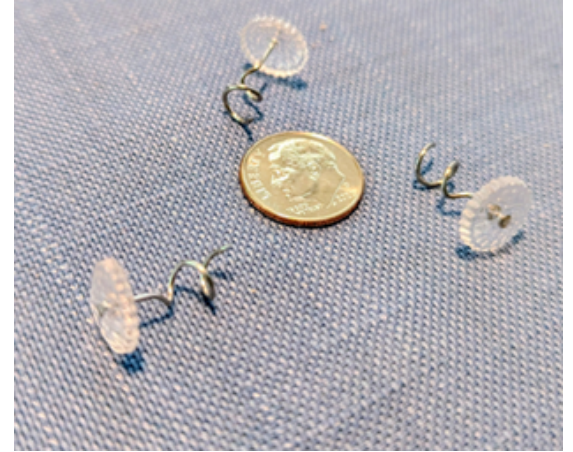

One morning, during a meeting, I heard a friend make a comment. After the meeting, I made a suggestion. At the next meeting, my friend thanked me for the suggestion that had a positive result. Just a little thing.



On Sunday morning, greeting and introducing yourself to someone you don't know can make a new friend, and perhaps someone who will attend services again. Just a little thing.

Smiling when you encounter someone may help the person have a happier day. Just a little thing.

Saying just the right little thing during a disagreement can save or enhance the relationship. Just a little thing.

I'm sure that many of you have had such experiences. Treasure them. Just a little thing.

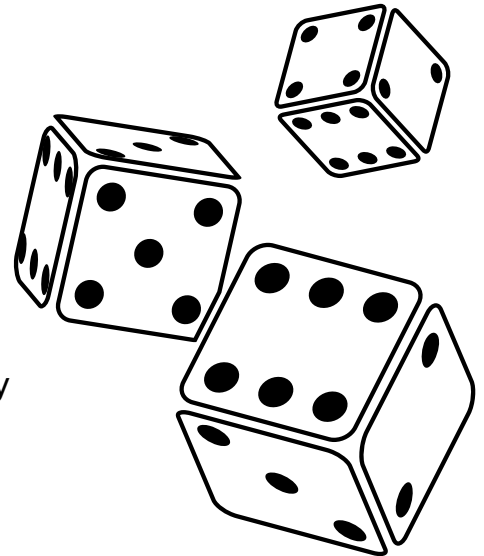

# Bunco

We have been playing bunco at our church since 2006, according to the notes in the bunco folders kept by the Women of the ELCA (Welca). What is bunco? It's a social dice game typically played with 12 or more players, divided into groups of four, who try to score points by rolling three dice in a series of six rounds. It is a game of pure luck with no complex strategy, making it easy for anyone to play. We gather to play on the second Friday of every month from 1-3 p.m. in the fellowship hall, so we play 12 times a year. You might see women and men from our congregation, along with relatives, friends or neighbors. We are pretty successful with starting and ending on time in order to be respectful of everyone's schedules. There is a suggested donation of \$5.00 used for prizes and various charitable causes.

There are too many groups to list that have received monetary contributions or needed supplies; however, here are some examples: CCSA, Teresa Center in Tijuana, Sandwich Ministry, Building Fund, Heifer International, Children's Choir, Maui fires, Pajama project for Tijuana Orphanage, Stained Glass Fund, etc. So far in 2026, we purchased sheet sets, pillows, and towel sets for the recently hosted Interfaith Shelter at our church. Over the years, we have donated over \$9,000 and plan to continue with this benevolence.

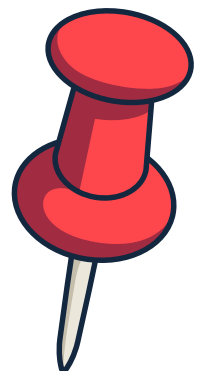

## Welca's "Piece and Sew Group"

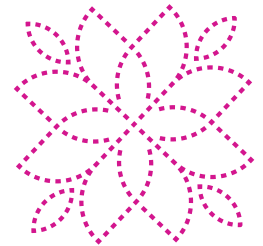
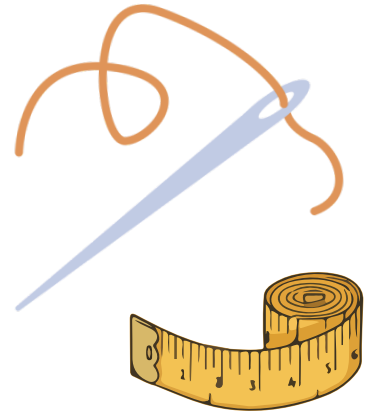
The group gathers on the **first Wednesday of the month in room 4 at 10 a.m.**, followed by a social lunch at a local restaurant around 12:30.

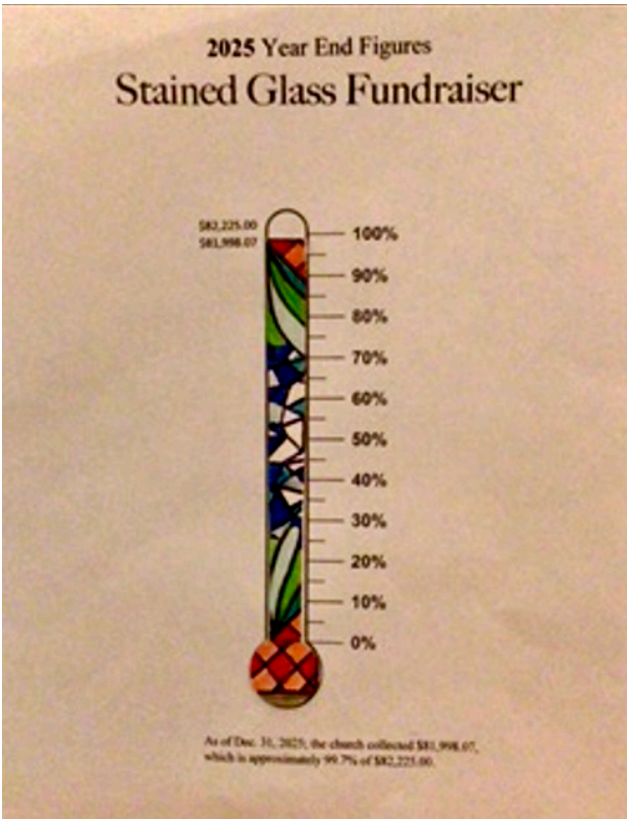
## CLC/ILC MEN'S GROUPS

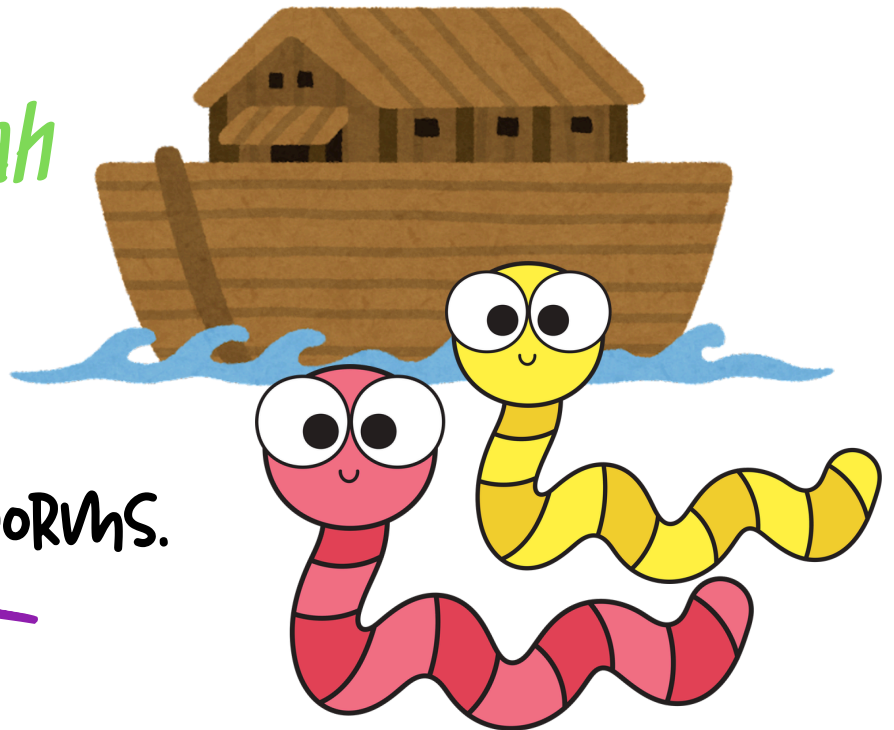

**Remember that the ministry of caring is at the heart of the church's life.**



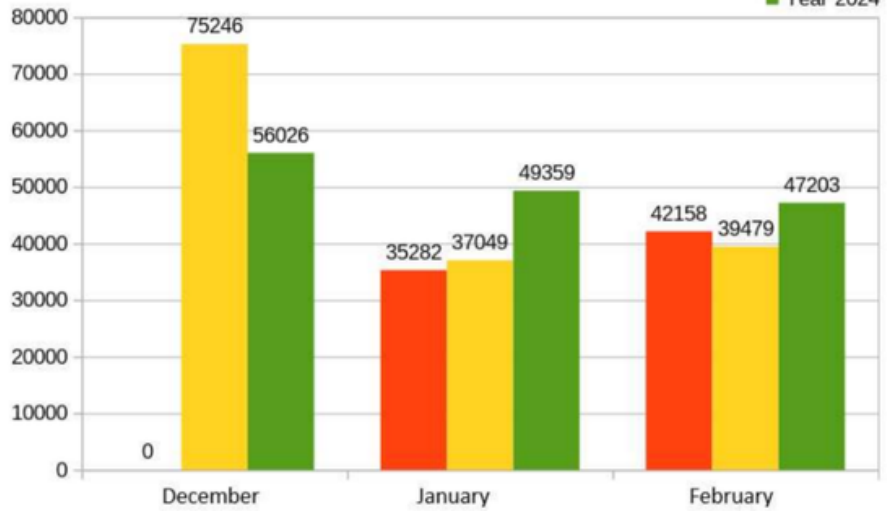

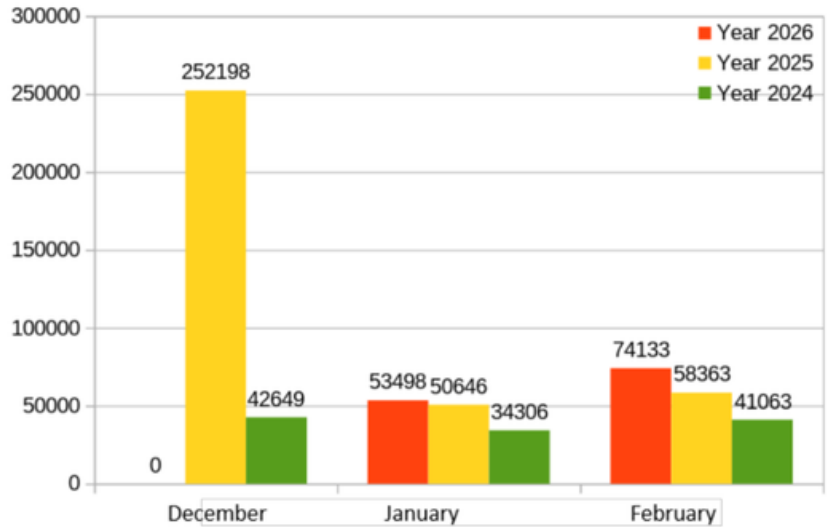

## Celebrating 60 years of love, faith, and commitment

### ***Sixty Years Together***

Our first experience with marriage was in the spring of 1961, when both of us were actors in the Palmyra High School Senior class play. In the final scene, you and I were married --- each to other characters.

In December 1963, while we were both working at Mr. Hostetter's store, you and I planned a sledding party on Chestnut Hill. By the end of the workday, the party had dwindled down to just you and me. Now we consider those four trips we took together on my Flexible Flyer down the snow-packed hill to be our first date.

In the summer of 1964, my midshipman cruise took me to the Mediterranean Sea. The Turkish midshipmen aboard the ship taught me how to say, in their language, "I love you very much." My letters to you ended with the phrase, "Seni seviyorum, cok cok."

In September 1965, after getting permission from your nervous father, I proposed, and you said yes. We were engaged.

On March 26, 1966, your Uncle Harold, a pastor, married us at Palm Lutheran Church.

In the fall of 1967, we drove across country to San Diego, in our new Chevy Impala Super Sport, with hippie flowers pasted on both sides. In 1968, my ship deployed to WESTPAC, where for the next six months, we were part of the Vietnam War. During my absence, you made a lifetime friendship with our next-door neighbor, Janey. On arrival back home to San Diego, I resigned from active duty, and we entered civilian life.

Over the next 5 ½ decades, we both had successful careers. We enjoyed all the local attractions, trekked many miles of trails in Death Valley, Zion, Bryce, Teton, Yellowstone, Glacier, & the Grand Canyon, Hawaii, where we snorkeled in the warm water and explored the insides of a dormant volcano. We hiked the Athabasca Glacier in Canada, the Jungfrau Glacier in Switzerland, where we toured the tunnels carved inside, and the Fox Glacier in New Zealand. We explored Western and local deserts; Cuyamaca, Palomar, and Laguna mountains.



## 60 years of love...

In London, on one of our walks, we passed by the young Prince's William and Harry, who were playing in the park. We traveled to many other parks, states, and countries, exploring and visiting friends whom we had made over the years.

We raised two wonderful children, love three blessed grandchildren, and maintain strong relationships with family and friends whom we left behind on the East Coast. For 55 years, we have been active members of Clairemont Lutheran Church/ Iglesia Luterana. We made a lot of friends here, many of whom are with us today.

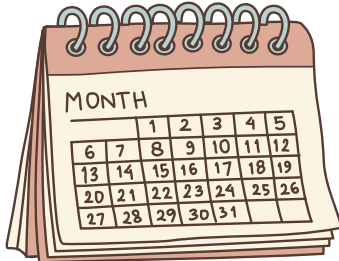
Finally, no relationship is without scars. Despite those scars, our love for each other has made it through 60 years without faltering. I love you and I always will.
