Street Corner Meetings

During my time in law enforcement, I met all sorts of interesting people. Victims traumatized by horrific crimes, witnesses traumatized by what they'd seen, some truly great cops, a few bad cops, and all sorts of criminals. Juvenile delinquents, drug dealers, robbers, murderers, gang members, and my favorite type of criminal, the prostitutes. As a new sergeant, I was working in the Sports Arena area. The area had a major prostitution problem. One night there were four prostitutes standing on a major corner, and my conversation with the group went like this.

"Hello, ladies. How's everyone doing tonight?"

"It's not a money-making Friday if that's what you're asking."

"No, ladies, I know it's not Friday, and that's not what I'm asking. I'm just curious how everyone is doing. You know, watching out for each other, keeping your pimp happy, and trying to stay safe. Your business is dangerous, and I'm just asking if you're okay."

"We're fine, sergeant, but we'd be better if you left us alone."

"Ladies, you know I can't do that."

"Sure, you can. Just get in your police ride and leave." (Her words weren't as nice.)

"Wow. Nice attitude. What's your name? I haven't seen you out here before. Are you new in town?"

"Nope. Just good at staying in the shadows where you don't see me."

"We both know you can't make money staying in the shadows.

So, saying you stay in the shadows isn't true.

And you didn't answer me. I asked for your name."

"Roslynn."

"Do you have a last name, Roslynn?"

"Wilson."

"How old are you, Roslynn Wilson?"

"Twenty-four."

"Date of birth?"

"Zero-one, zero-two ninety-eight."

"Roslynn, it's amazing to me how many girls out here were born on January-first or January-second. Makes your fake DOB easy to remember when lying to the cops, doesn't it? Do you have ID?"

"Nope."

"Of course not."



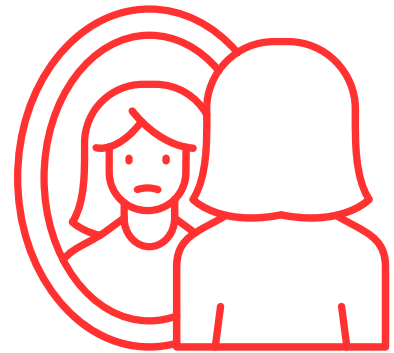
I talked with the group for several minutes, then left. That encounter was unremarkable and typical of the interactions I had with prostitutes on a regular basis.

In talking with the women, I wanted to know more about them than just their names. I wanted to create a relationship with them, for selfish and professional reasons. Selfish, because I wanted to understand how they had been drawn into prostitution. Professional, so I could convince them through arrest, education, or conversation to get out of prostitution and escape the degradation they were experiencing.

I frequently saw Roslynn working the streets, and we continued to have casual conversations. Roslynn eventually shared with me how she had become a prostitute. She'd lived in a mother-only broken home, been molested by a relative as a pre-teen, met a man who'd befriended her with false promises and then groomed her into a life of prostitution. I could tell she was more than just street smart; she was insightful, funny, and beneath it all, struggling with where she was in life. She had an external attitude that reflected the tension between cops and prostitutes, but she was also fearful of her pimp, and her words revealed she felt trapped by her circumstances.

After many conversations, I told her, "Roslynn, deep in your heart, you know all these sex acts with men you don't know are disgusting. Something is missing in your soul. This isn't you, and it's not what you want. This is destroying you, your spark, the real you." My statement to her was shaped by my Christian values, starting with my parents bringing me to church. My faith grew from what the pastors preached and what our Sunday school teachers taught me. I'd learned that God gave us the gift of deep, intimate love not only for the creation of life, but also to have love and joy in our souls. Knowing what Roslyn was doing saddened me because it was a perversion of the gift God gave us and was destroying Roslynn's sense of self-worth.

I didn't preach about God to Roslynn. I met her where she was, on a street corner selling her body and soul to men. Nothing remotely emotional or spiritually fulfilling for Roslynn or her 'customer' and ultimately destructive to both people. I talked with Roslynn for almost a year, giving her encouragement and options to escape the life she was living.



One Saturday she came to the police station where I worked. I was shocked to see her and assumed she was in trouble. She said she wasn't; she just needed to do something good with her life. Roslynn knew all sorts of criminals, including a person who had committed murder. With her help, we were able to arrest and convict that person. I remember watching as the prosecuting attorney hugged her and said, 'We couldn't have done this without you.' Roslynn had tears in her eyes and said, 'I have never felt this worthwhile.'

I believe the Holy Spirit guided every one of my interactions with Roslynn. Her immediate and very real need was to do something good with her life. Faith, eternal life, and the love of Christ are real and abstract. Roslynn needed something tangible and immediate. Her help in solving a murder was tangible and immediate. It was what she needed for where she was at, and our loving God knew that.

My connection to Roslynn didn't start by asking her if she was a Christian, giving her a Bible, or publicly praying with her. We started where she was at – on a street corner selling herself. My relationship with Roslynn, guided by The Holy Spirit, started slowly, with conversations and listening. It deepened, not through judgement or condemnation, but by respecting each other. I modeled honesty, compassionate listening, and dark humor, something both cops and prostitutes understand. God knew that what Roslynn needed first was a relationship with a person she trusted. God used me to be that instrument.

Our ultimate hope as Christians is to have a vibrant personal relationship with our Heavenly Father. But sometimes, we need to be a careful listener and a caring, compassionate person, a servant, to walk with others as they find their path to the Holy Saviour.

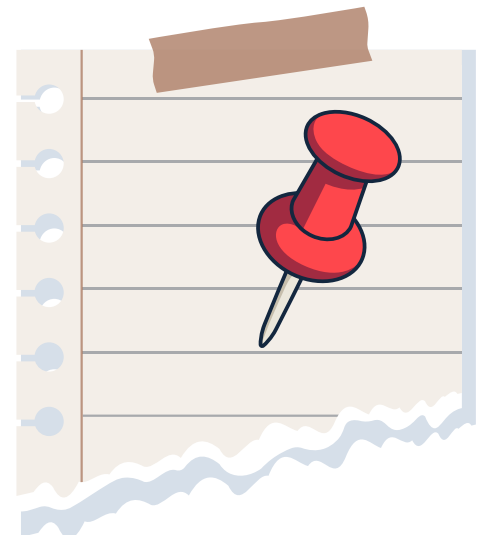

Summer Gather Bible Study: “I am Worthy”

This summer, Women of the ELCA participants will gather in Des Moines, Iowa, under the theme **“I am worthy.”** When Nobel Peace Prize winner Leymah Gbowee spoke in 2017, she invited WELCA participants to reclaim space for women and girls to lead and love in bold ways. This three-part Bible study will help us to define who we are, what we can be, and what we do in the world, in light of our God-given giftedness, identities, and relationships.

The theme for the 2026 Triennial Gathering is based on Psalm 139:14: “I am fearfully and wonderfully made.” This statement serves as a reminder of God’s promise to be with us, even in times of devastation and division. By repeating the phrase **“I am worthy,”** we can recognize the Holy Spirit’s ongoing work in our lives. This practice of self-affirmation opens up opportunities for healing and restoration within ourselves, our church, society, and the world. When we declare, “I am worthy,” we align ourselves with God’s promises. There is great power in our resolve.

ALL are invited to attend the Gather Bible Study.

Session One: June 8 – 10:30 a.m.: Bible Study Leader will be Pastor Manuel.

“I am created in God’s image. No matter what anyone else says.”

We’ll begin with the story of God’s creation and the “very goodness” that is spoken over every human being. The study will then turn to various Scripture texts that have been used to undermine, silence, and degrade women for centuries. Unpacking the ways these verses have been read against women shines a light on the realities of sexism and the ways that, for too long, the Bible has been used to prop up the oppression of women. But we will also hear how those same scriptures can be read as invitations to new freedom, community and vocation for people, regardless of gender, for all people were made in God’s image.

Session Two: July 14 – 10:30 a.m.: Bible Study Leader will be Pastor Elena.

“I am more than one thing: Honoring our many identities.”

In her TED talk, “The Danger of a Single Story,” Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie names this truth: We are much more than one thing. All of us have intersecting identities, roles and responsibilities. Beyond our ethnicity, the color of our skin or our birthplace, we may also be a sister, a mother, a daughter, a friend. We have various vocations, hobbies and joys.

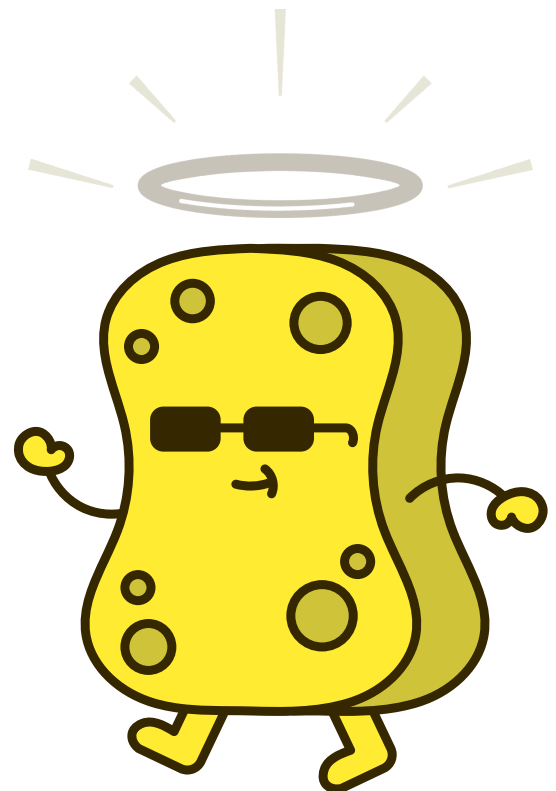

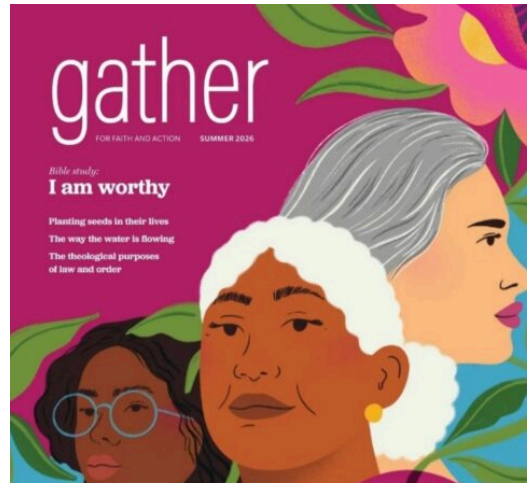

NOTES FROM THE MUSIC MINISTRY:

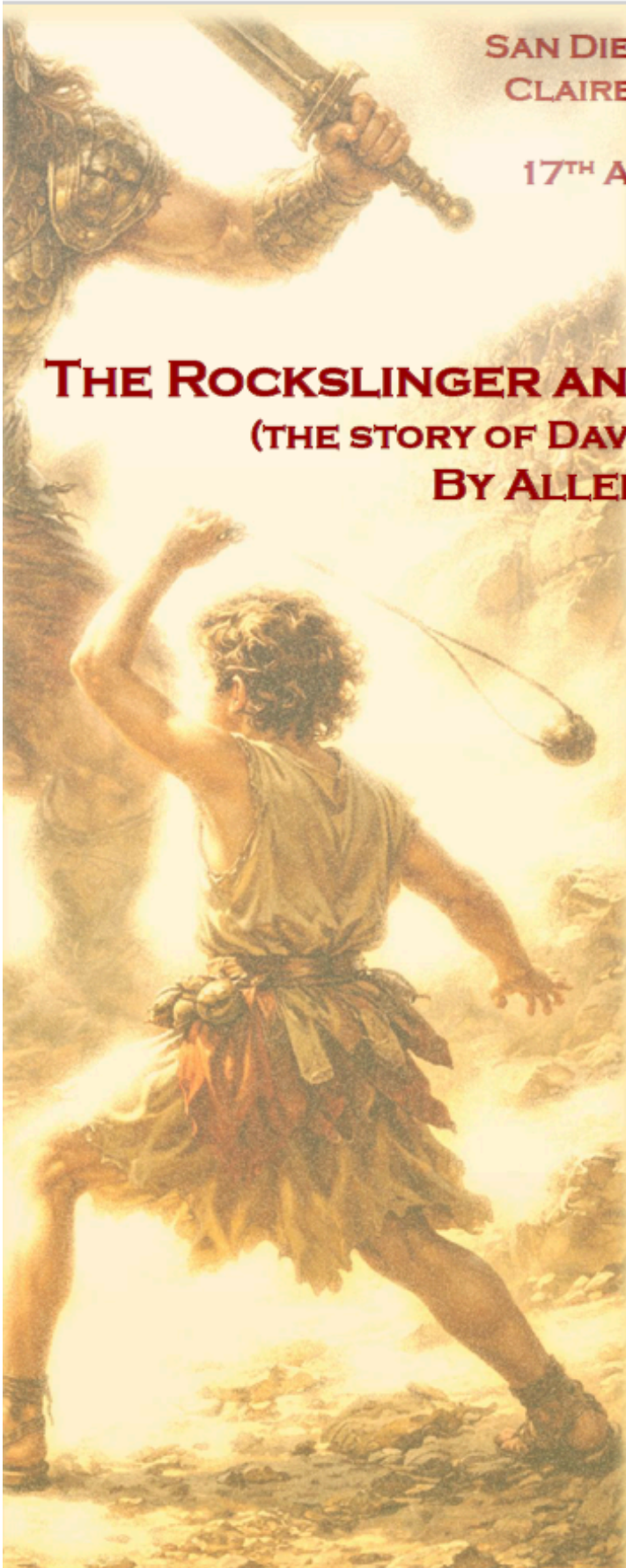

Remember that the ministry of caring is at the heart of the church's life.

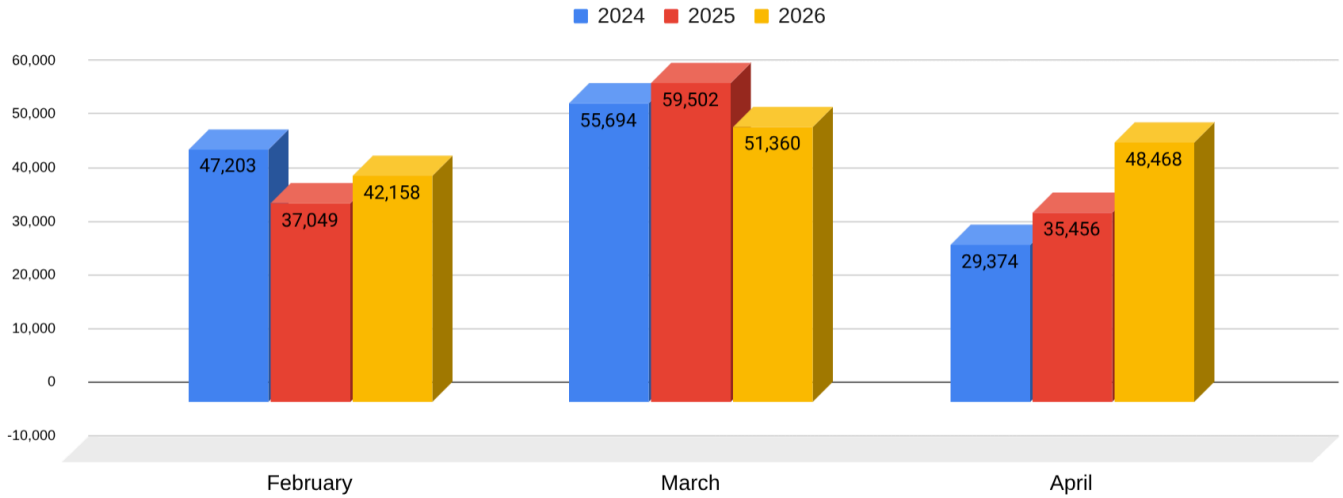

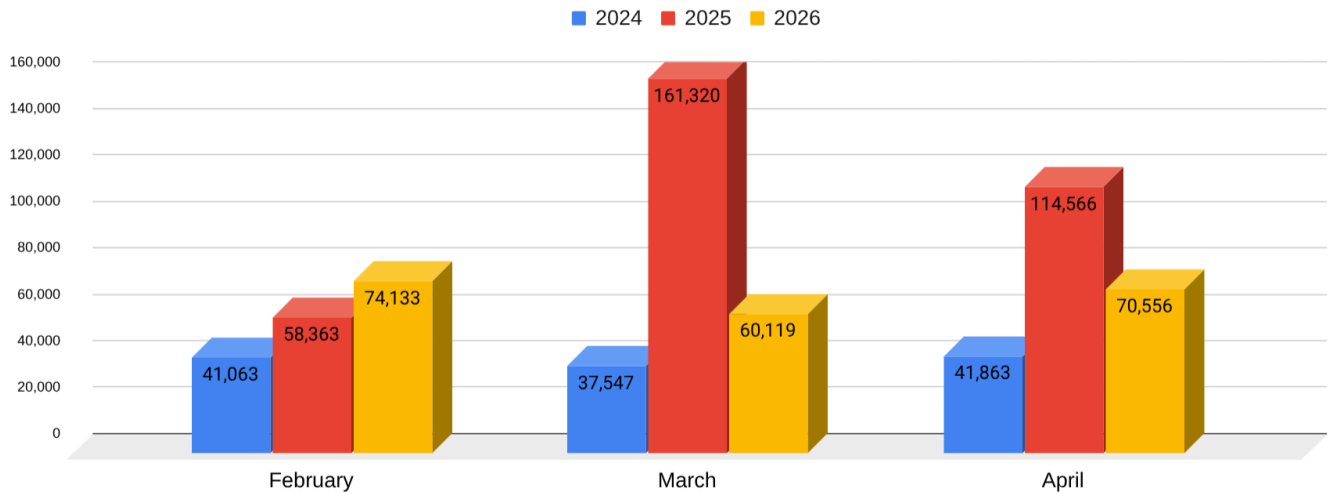
February, March, April

The Faithful Servants Table

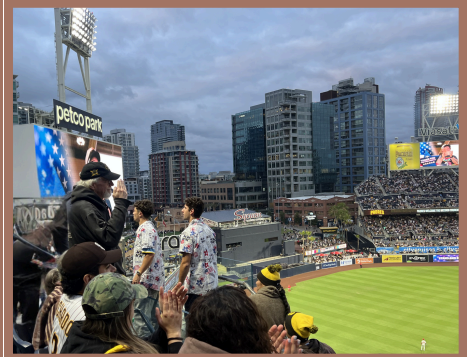
Honoring those who served and continue to serve.
