
Yes, we have begun our new church year!

President's message 2023

By Gary Jaus 2023 has likely been a challenging year for most of us. Both Deacon Margy and Pastor Cyndi have expressed that we are a congregation in transition. Their words are accurate but not surprising.

We know we are undergoing challenging and significant changes in this amazing journey that will shape the future of our church for years to come. The road we've been on, like a cross country trip, hasn't always been smooth.



At times we have felt lost or anxious. But while we were feeling lost or anxious, we weren't alone. God has always been with us, and we have been there for each other.

In June, I accepted Clyde Prem's request to serve as the interim President until December 31st. In November you elected me to continue as President for an additional year. I'm honored by your vote. With that decision I feel an obligation as your President to focus and act on issues affecting the welfare of the congregation. In my long career in law enforcement, I was trained to think about how to solve problems, not just accept the status quo. I've continued to carry that mindset with me. I've learned, sometimes the hard way, that the best long-term solutions were developed when working as part of a collaborative team. Seldom did I or any one person always have the best ideas. Before I joined the collaborative team that is your council, you had already put in place a solid and engaged council.

Their collective wisdom and dedication to the business of the church has served you well and made my job easier. This year the Council and the Executive Committee (President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer) along with the congregation voted for and facilitated the sale of both duplexes. You voted to have Elena Enriquez be called as an Associate Pastor.

The Organist Selection Committee, headed by Katy Lundeen, identified Charles F. von Gunten as our organist. The Council approved hiring Charles and hopefully, we get to experience his musical skills for years to come. The Council also hired Francisco Plascencia as the new custodian for the church. I hope you've noticed the excellent attention to detail that Francisco and his wife Teresa have in keeping our facilities clean.

We are all aware of the changes to our facilities with the demolition of the old Fellowship Hall. The normal wear and tear to our facilities is something we should all pay attention to while anticipating the routine but major repairs. Your Council is paying attention to the use of our facilities and while there is always more work to be done some changes have already taken place. The German School which closed earlier this year is close to vacating rooms 7&8 of Luther Hall. Those rooms will soon become available for future use. Regular communication with the Head Start program has also been reestablished. They have been good partners with the church for years and with our reinvigorated communication we

Gather Bible study leader continues work in Jerusalem

Following the October 7 Hamas attack on southern Israel and the Israeli siege of Gaza, many Gather readers contacted Women of the ELCA churchwide staff to ask about the safety of Gather Bible study author the Rev. Dr. Meghan Johnston Aelabouni and her family. Many of the inquiries came after the ELCA's difficult decision to evacuate the ELCA Young Adult in Global Mission (YAGM) volunteers serving in the West Bank and country coordinators ELCA pastors Adam

and Jordan Miller-Stubbendick, with their young children.

Johnston Aelabouni reported: "We are safe in Jerusalem and continue our work [accompanying the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land (ELCJHL) and other partners], which is now more important than ever." Johnston Aelabouni serves as ELCA Theologian in Residence for the Middle East and North Africa desk. She and her spouse, the Rev. Gabi Aelabouni, Area Desk Director for the Middle East and North Africa, have

three children.

"We remain incredibly thankful for the outpourings of prayer and love for our family and for all the people of the Holy Land," Meghan and Gabi shared in an Oct. 21 special update. "We have felt the power of your prayer; it has sustained us. We truly do feel safe where we are; and we also feel deeply called to be where we are ... to offer whatever help we can as we accompany our local partners on behalf of the ELCA."

"These are such heavy, terrible days in Jerusalem," Johnston Aelabouni said in her sermon that day. "Such unthinkable violence against children, parents, grandparents, young people. So many lives ended—and every one of them a human being with a name, a story, a place in this world. They are Jewish, Muslim, Christian; Palestinian and Israeli. Dancers in the desert, families huddling together, moving from house to house only to find that no place is safe. And now in Gaza, there is a war—a war not against Hamas only, but a war against 2.3 million people who have nowhere else to go and whose water, food, electricity and medicine are running out. Half of them are children."

Yet death and violence will not have the last word, Johnston Aelabouni said. "The last word belongs to the God who will swallow up death forever. To that hope may we cling, even as we mourn, and pray, and wait. May it come soon, O God. May it come now."

Women of the ELCA

On October 1st, we celebrated Thankoffering Sunday, blessing of the Mission Quilts and held a fundraiser for both the Piece and Sew and Mission Quilts groups. We collected \$2,000.25 for the Thankoffering; \$450 for Piece & Sew; and \$865 for Mission Quilts. How are these funds spent?

The Thankoffering is sent to church wide WELCA (in Chicago) to help their ongoing life-changing ministries. (WELCA is not an auxiliary of the church, so is financially independent and responsible for its own financial affairs and that is why our offering from CLC/IL is so important.) The Piece and Sew group offers financial support to a variety of groups. In the past, they have made donations to: Interfaith Shelter, Birthline, Kenya Orphanage, Raise the Roof campaign, CCSA, Sandwich Ministry, the Pastor's Discretionary Fund, etc. The Mission Quilt group is very resourceful about collecting necessary supplies, however, their biggest expense is probably the batting which costs \$331.54 for two large rolls/shipping expense.

Most importantly, thank you to everyone who continues to support us both financially and prayerfully so we can continue our ongoing mission to "mobilize women to act boldly on their faith in Jesus Christ."

Eyeglasses for Lions Optometric Vision Clinic (LOVC)

The women continue to collect eyeglasses (prescription, readers and sunglasses) for LOVC. Recently, 107 pairs were delivered to them. A huge thank you and hug to everyone who supports this effort to bring low cost vision help to San Diegans.
