- There is an exploration of how we can better show gratitude to all who serve
- We are looking for folks with expertise in social media, who could help to tell our story in a more effective way
- Questions are being asked about how to make better use of the Clarion
- Work on updating directory and contact info.

Thanks to all who were a part of the Jan. 13 gatherings! Many of you are already at work on these ideas. Be watching for other follow up info.

The President's report, and more roof news

On Sunday January 28th, Council Vice President, Bill Fredericks, presented the 2024 operating budget to the congregation. Bill worked as a Certified Public Accountant for fifty-three years before his retirement. Bill worked with the Executive Committee and Heidi Acosta, who'd been part of the Budget Committee, to craft an honest and understandable budget.

In the congregational meeting, Bill explained our sources of income, our anticipated expenses and changes the committee made to make the budget clearer. After a period of questions

and answers, you, the congregation, voted unanimously to accept the budget as proposed. I was thrilled with your unanimous vote and believe the work of the committee resulted in the most transparent budget our church has ever experienced

The week before the congregational meeting, San Diego experienced one of the most significant atmospheric rivers, aka rainfall, in decades. The roof above our church office leaked and after Tanya observed water filling up the light fixtures she made the wise decision to close the office for the day. The next day we reached out to our insurance carrier to open a claim for the potential damage to the roof and the ceiling above the office. The Council was concerned that with the prediction of heavy rain beginning in February we needed to get something in place quickly to protect the office from

any additional damage. Our insurance company quickly responded, and their appraiser agreed to cover the flat roof over the office while assessing the roof for damage.

The appraiser subsequently recommended the church replace the entire roof including the pitched roof above the sanctuary. Tanya also contacted a local roofer who also recommended replacing the entire roof. Our roof has exceeded its expected life span and their recommendations seem reasonable. Replacing the roof needs to be addressed quickly but we don't have to panic. As of this writing we are still awaiting their cost estimates.

I've since spoken with the insurance company, and they are not going to pay for any of the cost of replacing the roof. Their justification was that the recent storms didn't cause any storm related damage to the roof - the leaks were the result of the deteriorated condition of the roof. Had a tree fallen on the roof from the storm or if our steeple had fallen on the roof, it would have been a different situation; they would have been responsible for repairing the roof and replacing any damage inside the church. Going forward, we will pay for the appraiser's work in covering the roof. I will be working with the Council to quickly establish a fund-raising drive for the cost of the roof replacement and will let the congregation know what that cost is once we know it is. In the meantime, check your sofas and piggy banks for funds for the roof replacement. Better yet, pray we don't have any more damage from the coming storms.



How we categorize income donations

There was some confusion about offering income in our budget meeting, we were running short on time, so I'm not sure everyone understood the distinctions. Here is an explanation:

Pledge income means a person has planned to donate X amount of money to the church for the Lord's work. Folks fill out the white pledge cards, we add them up and that's where the budget pledge amount comes from. When a person who pledged puts the funds in the offering plate, and writes their first and last names on the envelope so we know where it came from, we record the amount in pledges given under that person's name. Pledges, like a budget, are plans; we don't track how much any individual has or has not given (well, the software does), we don't go to anyone and say "you promised X and only gave Y," we understand life happens and sometimes people cannot do what they planned. We send a 1099 at the end of the year to the people who pledged for tax purposes.

Non-pledge income means we received funds in the offering plate in an envelope

with someone's first and last name on it. These are people who weren't able to submit a plan, but give for the Lord's work anyway as they are able to. We record the amounts under their names, and are therefore able to give them a 1099 for tax purposes.

Plate income means loose cash in the plate, not in an envelope, so we don't know who gave it. We actually get a fair number of envelopes with no name on them, too. If there is a check in it, we can attribute the funds to a giver, but if it is just cash, it goes under the category of anonymous plate income.


