## Can We Talk, Honestly?

The key word is 'together' and the reality of together really struck home on Sunday February 18th. That Sunday, the Boy Scouts and their families were in church and the feel of 10 to 15 more people in church, and the visual impact of a fuller sanctuary was striking. Even the volume of the congregational singing with so many more voices was noticeable and an inspiring vision for what we can become. For those who remember the comedian, Joan Rivers, she had a famous line that she'd use repeatedly in her comic routines. She'd say, "Can we talk?" The implication was, 'Can we talk, honestly?' Then she would use her wit and sarcasm to make people laugh.

Well, can we talk honestly? My message doesn't contain wit or sarcasm, but it is honest. The worship service doesn't always leave me tingling with joy or hope. The readings don't always resonate with me. Sometimes my mind wanders during the sermons and even though I sing in the choir, not every hymn touches me. Unsaid in Ms. Rivers' famous line is another implication. It's that the audience listen. She'd run her monologues, and the audience would laugh, but there was no real conversation. In church we listen and sing but that isn't conversation. We read verses or sing, but it's all scripted. But many times, it's not foremost what

is in our minds. Fortunately, when we converse, we listen. We share our immediate concerns.

I talk and listen with several people after every service. What always resonates from those conversations is the sense of care that we have for each other and our church. Listening to you, I get a sense of how you feel about the worship service and that is tremendously important to me. But just as important is what you share about what's going on in your life. Your health, your loneliness, how you're dealing with flood issues, your joy at having relatives coming to visit, or getting a new car are all important. Our unique, personal information connects us with each other in very tangible ways. We all experience similar joys, fears, hopes and sadness. And we are strong enough to listen to each other, embrace each other's pain and be lifted up by each other's joys. We worship and strengthen our understanding of Jesus Christ within these walls. We grow together. That said, the time we spend doesn't always have to have a reminder of our faith. I don't need hymns or sermons or readings at every gathering. Sometimes a simple prayer is perfect.

We need social time together. Just good old-fashion fun times along with our "faithoriented" events. Time to relax, laugh, and talk about whatever. Candidly, we need each other to have those special moments. Church should not always be serious and somber. When we're together having fun, we are living role models for what God wants, namely, to be joyful. I believe our laughter and joy are every bit as powerful as sermons, hymns, and corporate readings. Honestly.



#### MARCH 16, 2024, IS NATIONAL QUILTING DAY,

and we at Lutheran World Relief have a LOT to celebrate! For more than 75 years, compassionate people just like you have put their faith into action and made quilts for people in need around the world — nearly 28 MILLION QUILTS! These gifts of love make life brighter, softer, and a bit more comfortable for our neighbors around the world struggling with chronic poverty, illness, natural disaster and conflict. THANK YOU. A quilt is a type of bed cover, traditionally composed of three layers of fiber, a woven cloth top, a layer of batting or wadding, and a woven back, combined using the technique of guilting. A guilt is distinguishable from other types of blankets because it is pieced together

with several pieces of cloth. National Quilting Day recognizes quiltmakers and their quilt-making abilities. The word 'quilt' comes from the Latin word 'culcita,' which means stuffed sack, it became adapted to the English language from the French word 'cuilte.' Quilting practices can be found in almost every area of the world and it is celebrated on the third Saturday in March every year. The National Quilting Association started National Quilting Day in 1991 and it has grown into a global celebration for all quilt lovers and makers Mission Quilters meet at the home of Ruth Andersen. 
