Our Stephen Minister team is trained to listen to you with empathy, that is, we let you know that we are really "hearing" you without judging you. In one recent case a Stephen Minister Care Giver (CG) listened as a Care Receiver (CR) expressed a negative feeling about something that had happened. The CG helped the CR move past the negative feeling by prayerfully listening without judgment. We don't try to solve your problems. We know that God will help you with that. Instead we listen and encourage you to express yourself. By doing so you can work your way through the shadow. Esperancita Córdova Celebrating 100 Years of Life

There is something very special about a person living to be 100 years old. On April 6, members of Clairemont Lutheran Church/Iglesia Luterana Clairemont were blessed to celebrate with Esperancita Córdova on her one hundredth birthday. Surrounded by members of her family including her daughter, Martha, and friends from both the Spanish and Englishspeaking congregations, we collectively rejoiced to have Esperancita in our midst. Esperancita was born April 1, 1924, in Teocuitatlan, Jalisco, Mexico and one of four siblings. She married Mr. Primitivo Córdova when she was seventeen years old and they had two daughters, Martha and Guille. From Teocuitatlan, Esperancita and Primitivo moved their family to Cananea Senora, and eventually Tijuana. Living in Tijuana, Esperancita crossed the border daily to clean homes. A woman she was working for became so attached to Esperancita due to her hard work, honesty, and lively personality that she helped Esperancita bring Primitivo and their entire family to San Diego.

Once Esperancita's daughter, Martha, married Álvaro Munevar, Esperancita and Primitivo moved to Los Angeles where Esperancita worked in a sewing factory. In addition to her factory work, Esperancita took loving care of her ailing mother and Primitivo for years until they both passed. After Primitivo's death, Martha and her cousin brought Esperancita back to San Diego to be close to Martha.



At her celebration, Esperancita was seated in a chair in the center aisle facing the congregation. Pastor Elena sat right next to her and while we could hear what she was saying, it touchingly felt like Pastor Elena was speaking directly to her. This is part of what she said. "Today is a very special day because it is the first day you opened your eyes to the world. And although there have been stumbling blocks along the way, you have risen by the eternal grace of God and by your determination saying, 'I will rise again and again with God's help because I know that I was not created to be cowardly but courageous like my Heavenly Father." What a wonderful sentiment to live by. Pastor Elena sent me most of the information for this profile and I laughed Continued on Page 6

Ruth Andersen, The Woman Who Can't Say No

I recently had the good fortune of speaking with Ruth Andersen about her life and amazing history of service to our church. When I told her I wanted to profile her for the Clarion she wasn't too thrilled. Ruth is not a person who seeks attention. She reluctantly agreed but probably only because we've been friends for a long time.

Ruth and her husband, Andy, met on a train heading back to Minneapolis from a Luther League convention in Texas. Of course, being "Lutheran" was likely preordained for both Ruth and Andy since they were both presidents of their respective Luther League church youth groups. For those too young to remember, Luther League is more than 100 years old and served as the forerunner to today's Lutheran Youth gatherings. Married to Andy in Minnesota in 1967, the couple spent their honeymoon hauling a U-Haul trailer to San Diego Naval Air Station Miramar where Andy had just been assigned. After visiting several local Lutheran churches Ruth and Andy settled on Clairemont Lutheran. New to the church and the community, Ruth recalled telling Pastor Charles Christian that CLC needed a prayer chain. She didn't know Pastor Christan very well and he didn't know her well either. He responded by asking her, "Do you really think so?" Ruth replied, "Of course I think so." and our prayer chain was born.

Growing up in Belle Plaine, Minnesota, Ruth considered herself a "farm girl". Her father was a Sunday School Superintendent, so Ruth rarely missed



Sunday church services. However, one summer her father decided to work in the fields instead of attending Sunday worship. While Ruth's mother and brothers continued to attend Sunday services, Ruth decided to skip church too. Ruth was about eight at the time and her dad was okay with her decision, but her mother wasn't. Ruth believes that decision still influences her to attend church every Sunday if possible. Ruth was President of her Senior class in high school. Her graduating class was all of thirty-nine students. After high school, Ruth and two of her girlfriends matriculated to Wartburg College in Waverly, Iowa. A private Lutheran liberal arts college, Wartburg was a destination

out loud at one of the phrases she attributed to Esperancita. When a friend or stranger is leaving Esperancita she sometimes says, "I was very pleased to see you in your right mind...Behave well and if you don't, invite me." None of us always behave well, and those who have misbehaved with Esperancita, have been blessed by her wit and zest for laughter and life.

Pastor Elena shared that Esperancita is a great example of kindness and much like the virtuous woman being described in the book of Proverbs 3:(15) 'She is more precious than jewels and nothing you desire can compare with her. (16) Long life is in her right hand, in her left hand are riches and honor. (17) Her ways are ways of pleasantness, and all her paths are peace. (18) She is a tree of life to those who lay hold of her.

Motioning to the people in the pews, Pastor Elena told Esperancita, 'This Clairemont Lutheran family, these are all rewards for the love and kindness you always give to all of us who know you. You are an example of love, faith, and perseverance.

Thank you Esperancita for your faithful devotion to God, the love you've given to your family and friends and for being part of our congregation. Thank you, Pastor Elena, for providing such rich information about Esperancita and her life.

college for midwestern Lutherans. Trained in Education, Ruth became an elementary school teacher in Woodville, Ohio. She was an ardent believer in the value of real-life experiences as a teaching tool. From Woodville, she organized field trips to Detroit, Michigan so her students could see and experience the Ford automobile factory. As a teacher in Escondido, Ruth took her elementary school students on field trips to the Museum of Man, the zoo and even to Federal Court where she introduced them to Federal Judge Rudy Brewster, a member of our church at the time. Ruth has served our church as a copresident of WELCA and a leader of the Stephen Minister program. Ruth volunteered to open our Stephen Ministry meetings with select Bible verses and a prayer. Her selections always created insightful and reverent moments for the Stephen Ministers. Ruth was also the leader of Morning Star, a group designed for those grieving to share their grief with others. Ruth also opened her home to the church's quilting group when the Fellowship Hall was demolished so they could continue their mission work in providing guilts around the world. Ruth is part of Patience Circle and takes communion to our shut-ins. Asked what she enjoys about CLC, Ruth said, "We have been through so much in the past years and we need to keep praying for each other. Prayer is so important." Ruth also shared she loves the feeling of community she feels from the congregation. It's mutual, Ruth. You have been an integral part of connecting us to each other through your service and friendship to all of us.

• You cared for this church by starting or resurrecting programs that provide services to members and to our neighbors. Programs such as Stephen Ministry, Childrens' Sunday School, Home Communion visitation, Morningstar, Summer Bible school.

• You cared for this church by demonstrating that disabled is not unabled. You showed those on the outside that Clairemont Lutheran Church Iglesia Luterana Clairemont is welcoming to everyone.

• You cared for this church when you presided over worship services that allowed us to move closer to God with moments of silence, creative and thoughtful sermons, invitations for all people to participate in Christ's banquet and with Jesus' cross before us as the symbol of our belief.

• You cared for this church by helping Pastor Elena discern her calling. You encouraged and supported her during her Seminary studies, and as her mentor during her internship and here as a Pastor at Clairemont Lutheran Church Iglesia Luterana Clairemont.

• You cared for this church by providing other ways for us to worship. During COVID you created a Lenten evening worship using Zoom that helped members stay connected during the time of isolation. You continued that program by starting Soup and Sanctuary that merged Spanish and English speaking members and non-members with a meal followed by study and devotion. Last summer at Supper at the Beach we celebrated Holy Communion "At the Water's Edge." You started the Blue Christmas service for those persons who might not feel "jolly" during that season of celebration.

• You cared for this church when you recognized the need to renovate the Parsonage and acted to ensure its successful completion.

• You cared for this church when you followed the words in the Gospel of John where Jesus tells his disciples: "I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold. I must bring them also. So there will be one flock, one shepherd." You responded to the needs of non-members; needs such as companionship, housing, financial planning, food, a delayed service for a deceased husband, those seeking employment, a baptism into Jesus' fold.

• You cared for this church when you honored Paul's advice to the Church in Corinth regarding varieties of spiritual gifts. Some of us have the gift of evangelizing, some of giving, some of visitation, some of worship preparation and participation, some of teaching, some of fellowship, some of making music, some of administration, some of feeding. You helped us recognize and use our gifts.

Thank you, Pastor Cyndi, for the countless ways you poured out extravagant love and care upon this church. We will miss you.

May God continue to Bless you and your husband Bill Stothers.
