#### Moving forward with transition conversations

As I hope most of you are aware, there four areas of ministry that have been discerned as the most important to focus on as we move forward in serving God's mission in this place. We have begun conversations around each of those areas, identifying first/next steps. Here's what's happening so far:

- Bi-Lingual/Bi-Cultural Ministry
  The group that met around this decided that first of all we need to get to know one another better and build relationships between the English and Spanish speaking worship communities. So, there is being planned (beginning stages) for an initial event which will involve sharing food, traditions and culture with one another. Teresa Munoz has graciously offered to head up the planning team.

- Worship

There as consensus in the worship conversation that our worship needed some new energy. There was initial planning about reclaiming our liturgical foundations in a way that engage those gathered on Sunday morning. There will be a variety of efforts to renew our understanding of the liturgy, increase lay participation, emphasize hymn singing, and others. (For example, could we reformat the bulletin to better explain what is going on? Could we have a weekly worship question around a particular practice) Be watching for an invitation to join the initial conversation group in moving forward.

There will also be an opportunity for those who find a less formal worship style meaningful to meet and plan. Again, watch for an announcement regarding that.

- Community Outreach
  This congregation has always been known for its outreach into the neighboring community. But in order to be more effective, there is a need to get to know the community and its need. So This team will first focus on making connections with other agencies/ institutions around us, look for opportunities to foster conversations with our neighbors, and think about other ways to connect. The next gathering around this will Saturday, November 18, at 10:30 am. Please join us if you'd like to be involved in this outreach.
- Communication and Community This group will focus on the things that will build a stronger sense of community, relationship, and trust among the congregation. It's a broad category, because there needs to be a broad thinking outside the box to build this. The group has scheduled it's first conversation for Oct. 30....watch for a report after that.

I find all of this to be so very hopeful and faithful. But this congregation is at a pivotal point, and will need each and every one of us to be engaged in these new ventures.

#### Rob Constantine, choir, lay reader and a lot more

If you've been in church or watched our services on YouTube, you have likely seen Robert (Rob) Constantine. Rob sings bass in the Chancel Choir and occasionally serves as one of the lay readers for the 9:30 AM service. But it wasn't Rob's resonant reading voice that first drew my attention to him. It was his wheelchair. Rob sits in a wheelchair on the left side of the choir. Seeing frail older people using a wheelchair is not uncommon. But Rob isn't an older person. He was born in 1964, is only fifty-nine years old and doesn't seem frail. Obviously, he has a disability, but I don't see "frail" when I see Rob. I see a man in a wheelchair.

Singing in choir and being around Rob made me want to get to know him better. I asked if he would share a bit of his life story.

Rob was born three months early. Being so premature, he was small, his body not fully developed. Whether because of being premature, or something amiss during the birth process, Rob's brain was deprived of oxygen long enough to cause brain damage. The result was Rob was diagnosed with cerebral palsy.

Rob grew up in Clairemont and first attended Sunshine Elementary. The school was focused on children with disabilities. Later, the name of the school was changed to Lindbergh-Schweitzer and more recently named Clairemont Canyons Academy. Rob was promoted to Hale Junior High and then Madison High School. He graduated in 1983.

Knowing how cruel kids can be, I asked Rob if he experienced any bullying from his schoolmates. Surprisingly, Rob said, "Most

of the kids at Schweitzer were okay, but when I went to Hale some of the teachers and administrators thought the school was 'too big' for me. They said I'd have to use my wheelchair everywhere to get around but I made it around school with my crutches."

After graduating, Rob enrolled at San Diego City College where he studied broadcasting. Rob's uncle Jim worked with well-known broadcaster Fred Lewis and was likely the inspiration for Rob wanting to become a radio broadcaster "or do something in television." Fred Lewis eventually became one of Rob's teachers and Rob credits him with teaching him how to speak like a

broadcaster. Lewis preached 'speaking from the diaphragm' and it's likely why Rob's voice sounds so strong warm and

mellow.

Rob pursued his education beyond San Diego City College. He obtained a Bachelor of Arts in 'Visual Arts' from UCSD and a master's degree in 'Learning Systems Design' from SDSU.

Despite his education, Rob faced numerous roadblocks after college. Potential employers were "freaked

out" by his disability. They didn't have much experience with employees with disabilities and their common reason for not offering him a job was he didn't have enough experience. Rob eventually discovered that when breaking into the broadcast field, most everyone started at tasks of little value, things like getting the boss coffee or moving boxes. Tasks that required physical abilities that Rob didn't have.

In 1990, Congress passed the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) which prohibited employment discrimination against qualified individuals with disabilities. Rob explained, "After the ADA law came into effect, employers changed their job descriptions to include the requirement that employees had to be able to lift 50 pounds. It wasn't an honest requirement for most positions, it was part of the broadcast industry's effort to circumvent hiring people with disabilities." Rob continued, "The job that I have now had that requirement. I took their test; I was in my wheelchair and I lifted a

box that weighed about twenty pounds. They hired me anyway. I now work for a service agency that serves people with autism and other types of developmental

disabilities. I've been there two years working in their media department as an editing instructor. I teach my students how to edit films. I find it satisfying and love helping my students learn." One of Rob's hobbies was listening to international shortwave radio broadcasts. He described the thrill of being able to pick up events and broadcasts from

halfway around the world as exciting and rich but said the internet killed that. Rob currently enjoys collecting records. He started with old 45s and now collects newer vinyl records.

Rob found Clairemont Lutheran along with his mother and stepfather, Linda and Lynn Ten Eyck. Rob had already connected with Pastor Cyndi before coming here and Linda also had a friend in the congregation. Besides singing in the choir with his parents, He's in a men's breakfast group with Rob Newhouse, Gabriel Munoz and Lee Hintz.

Are there are issues that make him feel disadvantaged? Rob said, "In a lot of ways our culture is not entirely comfortable with people with disabilities despite what people say. It's how they act that makes a difference. There's a difference between being polite and being inclusive."

What's he enjoy about Clairemont Lutheran Church? "People here are very friendly, and many have helped me out. I'm just glad we picked this church."

#### Fall 2023 Bible study: Holy Places


