A Murder Mystery outreach can't be qualified or quantified. It is hundreds of hours of manpower, creativity, church involvement, volunteerism...turning fields and forests, barns and garages, into an atmosphere of love and fun that exceeds expectations year after year.

On high school night, two students got there just as the talk part of the night began. They had been invited by two girls who came with a visiting church last year. 

# From the Desk of the President

here Have All The Miracles Gone?

As the calendar year, 2024, winds down, I wonder how many of us would rather kick it to the curb rather than celebrate it. This particular annum has felt a bit like the ball in Times Square. You know how it starts at its highest point and then slowly descends until it rests on the bottom of its ory?

Now I tend to be a "glass half full" kind of guy. I'm not Pollyanna by any stretch, but I do have a tendency to look for the good in a situation. I'm also not often disappointed with the reality of a situation, but sometimes, it's hard to find the silver lining. In fact, this year has taken many of us beyond our abilities, strength, resolve or emotional wells. That is perhaps where God has always intended to place us. You see, God promises to be in the place I just described. This is because I do not rely on Him to do something when I think I can. Hope springs out of despair. Light springs from the darkness and glory springs from bleakness. Hang in there for a second. I promise this letter will become hopeful.

Crossroads Farm was birthed to meet a great need. People rose to meet the challenges of a rural reality for many in rural America. Here we stand, 25 years after the start, and we look back at those difficult challenges and praise God. He not only has repeatedly delivered, but He has created a thriving narrative. The best stories come at a point of hopelessness. Remember the Red Sea? The Giant who challenged a boy? The God who was hung on a cross? This has been the story of a small start up ministry called Crossroads Farm!

Just last week, Dawn and I traveled to Wisconsin. We participated in an area leaders meeting designed to talk about a future CRF plant. 13 leaders attended! They asked questions. They laughed and smiled and ate lunch together. The meeting wasn't a challenge and these leaders understood that work was coming, but the

excitement in the room was palpable. Two of the pastors in the group told our area champion, "I'm in!"

In these two words we can summarize the nature and hope of the miraculous. You see, people who watched the Red Sea part, but didn't walk through it did not experience the miraculous. They simply saw it. It was amazing to watch but it was better to live through the rescue. These pastors who responded with the, "I'm in," were ready for the barriers because this is where God is preparing to part seas! They desire the experience of knowing the hand of God! I knew God would be at the meeting because God had arranged for one of those pastors to be at a church I was speaking in (and it bears being stated, I only speak there once and occasionally twice a year). He was visiting relatives 500 miles from his home. Our meeting had been set for weeks before. God arranged his, "I'm in."

We recently have accepted a young couple as missionary candidates. God's light. All God's glory. Our platform has grown as we have been extended grace by denominations, colleges and churches. God has spotlit our ministry in order to show his luminance. As more people say, "I'm in," God has poured himself out, and I am convinced His body wields more power in our unity than we ever could imagine. Did you know that in the month of October,

109 students accepted Jesus Christ as their Savior?! Did you know we have begun meetings with several high capacity leaders to help CRF move into the miraculous? Did you know that in the months of October and

November CRF was represented to thousands of people? Many of those have said, "I'm in!"

CRF is screaming, "We're all IN!" God's response has been to demonstrate himself in a more powerful way. In fact, Dawn and I have said we are experiencing God in a way we have not since

our first few years of struggle. I can feel the waters parting. We can see giants being toppled. Even though we understand, with God's blessing comes the attention of the adversary. The desperation will mount as we cry out to our God.





Dontcha Trust Me?



Okay. Let's face it. The answer to that question is probably, "NO!" For some reason however, we feel compelled

to give excuses rather than solutions. Shouldn't it be our goal as parents and as kids to trust our family members. Why is it then, that we seem to have such a difficult time doing it?

In the following paragraphs I hope that we can give some practical steps to building a trust relationship in your home.

#### 1. Trust is a gift that has to be earned!

You can earn trust points by doing what is expected of you. The problem is that we most often have very unclear expectations for each other. In each situation try to be very clear about what is expected from each other. You may even want to write it down. Establishing a set of expectations is often what my wife and I do as we set up our weeks schedule. We then go back and confirm those expectations daily. Example A: "You know that I have a dance fit class on Tuesday and need for you to watch the girls form 4:00 to 5:30."

Example 8: "Dad You know that I have a date for Friday night. I will need the car form 6:30 until 10:00."

Be sure to five each other plenty of lead time and if necessary, ask for permission Communication builds trust points.

2. Whenever possible a phone call helps soften the failure to meet the expectations.

Did you notice that I didn't say it eliminates the problem? There may still be disappointment, but it is better than anger and worry. When we value a family member by

recognizing and respecting their expectations we raise their ability to trust us. Our family member may be very disappointed buy will believe that you had their feelings on your mind. Trust is about someone believing that you have their interests at stake.

Even Jesus informed his disciples about things that He knew would disappoint them. It was not a question of authority for him. It was a matter of caring about how others would feel.

3. Parents need to earn the trust of their children too!

Love is to be given without strings attached. It is automatically given. Honor should be given without rules attached. It is an automatic responsibility. Trust an respect however are earned commodities. Jesus loved his disciples but He didn't give them the authority to do what He did until they had been committed to him and had demonstrated responsibility.

I would not only be crazy, but I would be a bad father if I let my 3 year old daughter drive a car. She isn't ready. She will spend the next 13 years earning the trust of her parents and the state before I hand her the keys to the family car. It should work the same way for dating, friends, free time use, spending money, and so on. The problem is that we most often have not given our kids a gradual road to responsibility. They get to date when they turn 16 but we have never taught them how to behave around the opposite sex. When they are 18 they can vote

but without the process of learning political responsibility. When they turn 21m the law says that they can drink alcohol but if they haven't learned restraint or the strength to say no to things that they don't need they're in trouble.

It is not the case of "too much, too soon."
It is a case of "too much before any".

Here are some ideas as to how you can help each other develop the responsibility of trust.

- I. At a family meeting discuss which activities and events are the most important for each. Find out if your kids or parents would like for you to be there. Calendar those events and then make the appropriate arrangements to be there.
- 2. Discuss what is expected in terms of behavior around the opposite sex. Model that behavior. Dad take your young daughters on dates and treat them the way they need to expect to be treated. Moms take your young sons on a date and show them what they need to act like around young women.
- 3. Talk through trouble scenarios. When you get a flat tire... when you can't find a phone... when your are in a compromising situation.
- 4. Always be willing to talk before you react. One of the best ways to develop trust is to listen, listen, listen. When necessary use discipline but be willing to calmly explain.
- 5. Parents develop your relationship before trying to establish authority. You have the authority. It is a trusting relationship that we all need to develop.
- 6. Be consistent and fair above all. Be willing to make concessions within reason.



The following are statistics of how our kids in the Hillsdale County are doing. Some of these are cause for prayer and them some action. Here we go.

According to the 1998 Kids Count in Michigan Data Book

- ·123 kids, ages 10-17 were arrested.
- •131 girls, ages 15-19 were pregnant
- ·86 gave birth, 25 had abortions

A 1999 study of 8th graders in rural America (NCASA)

 Rural kids are 70% more likely to have gotten drunk than big city kids, 83% more likely to use crack cocaine, twice as likely to smoke, and 5 times more likely to use smokeless tobacco.

It is the commitment of Crossroads Farm to carefully monitor each dollar and to uphold the highest standard of fiscal responsibility.
