From the Pastor's Desk...

The new calendar year has begun and we are finally putting the Christmas season behind us. (I just took down my Christmas

tree during the last weekend of January.) As we experience extreme winter weather, it is easy to feel like we are in a season of slowness as the joys of Christmas fade.

As we journey through this new year, let's remember that Easter, a season of hope and joy, is not too far away. It's a time to celebrate the gift of Jesus' incarnate presence on earth and the promise of resurrection and eternal glory.

The church calls this "ordinary time", but nothing is ordinary. We are in a season of preparation. During this time, we can reflect on the life and ministry of Jesus Christ as he lives out his Gospel with his disciples on his journey to the cross.

And soon, we will enter Lent, a season that intentionally aligns us with Jesus. Lent is not a rush towards Easter morning, but a purposeful walk alongside Jesus in His journey of love and sacrifice. It's a season for self-reflection, renewal, and recommitment to the Gospel, a time to slow down and witness God's work.

Reflection often leads to Lament when the human condition appears in stark contrast to the Life of Jesus. The Bible is rich with expressions of grief and anguish, reminding us that God welcomes our raw emotions. From the cries of Job to the poetic laments of the Psalms, Scripture shows that faith is not the absence of struggle but the willingness to bring our struggles before God. These passages teach us that lament is a sacred act, an honest conversation with the One who knows our hearts fully. This is why the season of Lent exists; to slow down and see God working.

In The Sickness unto Death, Søren Kierkegaard explores the concept of despair as a sickness of the soul—a disconnect from our true selves and God. Kierkegaard argues that despair is not the end but a pathway to discovering our dependence on God. Similarly, biblical lament acknowledges this tension between human frailty and divine sufficiency. In Psalm 13, David cries, "How long, O Lord? Will you forget me forever?" This vulnerability models a healthy way to process emotions, leading to deeper trust in God's steadfast love.

Like Kierkegaard's idea of embracing despair as part of spiritual growth, lament reorients us toward God. It transforms anguish into faith, affirming that our relationship with God can withstand honesty. Through lament, we discover the profound truth of God's presence and redemption in every season of life.

Bishop Moore-Koikoi has called for a season of healing for the Eastern Pennsylvania Conference. In her first few months with us, she traveled throughout the conference listening to stories of pain and grief from members of our churches. So, for Lent, we will explore the gift of Lament to prepare our hearts and minds to fully receive the gift of the resurrection on Easter morning. In addition to a sermon series, I invite you to go deeper with a Bible Study. (more details to come)

"Lead Team" Model Comes to Covenant

In 2025, Covenant leadership will look slightly different. The Book of Discipline allows for an alternative committee structure to meet missional needs as long as the administrative functions of the church are met. (paragraph 247.2) We are adopting a new model for our leadership structure, The Lead Team. Some churches call it the "One Board" model. In Kay Kotan's Mission: Possible, this Simplified Accountability Structure aligns church governance with its mission by replacing multiple committees with a single leadership team focused on vision, strategy, and accountability.

This structure offers several benefits. It streamlines our decision-making so we can have robust conversations and make strategic decisions in a single meeting. It also allows fewer meetings freeing members to serve in ministries that directly engage the community. We have consolidated the administrative committees (Church Council, Finance, SPRC, and Trustees) into one committee, while the Child Care Board, Nurture, Outreach, and Worship remain the same to focus on the missional needs of the church.

Our newly appointed Bishop Cynthia Moore Koikoi, after listening to the needs of United Methodists in the Eastern Pennsylvania and Greater New Jersey Conferences, invites us to embark on A Journey of Healing: From Lamentation to Praise. This initiative is a sacred opportunity to acknowledge the lingering wounds from the past, to seek God's healing, and to move forward in praise and unity.

The key verse for this journey comes from Jeremiah 17:14: "Heal me, O Lord, and I shall be healed; save me, and I shall be saved, for you are my praise." The journey will unfold over the coming months, culminating in opportunities to praise and celebrate the work of God in our lives during District Conferences and at our Annual Conference in May.

The timeline for this journey began in January and continues as follows:

February: Praying Over the Wounds (lifting up the received prayer requests by the Bishop, Cabinet, clergy and laity)

March: Cleansing the Wounds (holding Lenten gatherings with communion and healing services)

The West District will host two such sacred gatherings:

February 27, 2025, at Wesley UMC in Strasburg

March 18, 2025, at Zion of Iona UMC in Lebanon

April: Protecting the Wounds (utilizing prayer litanies and reconciliation resources)

May: Praise! (celebrating with praise at District Conferences and Annual Conference)

A Year of Possibility?

"When the Disciples heard (that Jesus said) "It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for someone who is rich to enter the Kingdom of God," they were greatly astonished and asked, 'Who, then, can be saved?" With this, Jesus said, "With man this is impossible, but with God all things are possible." (Matthew 19:24-26)

I happen to do a lot of "What If ,,,?" thinking, or Possibility Thinking.

You may have heard of Dr. Norman Vincent Peale. Dr. Peale was an American Protestant clergyman who lived from 1898 to 1993. He was an author best known for popularizing the concept of positive thinking, especially through his best-selling book *The Power of Positive Thinking*.

With this article, I'm inviting all who read it to join me in considering, "What if we were to focus on a theme for the New Year?" The theme I'm thinking of is, "2025: A YEAR OF POSSIBILITY."

Being a positive person requires refusing to give in to negative circumstances. We, Covenant UMC, are not the only church family to experience challenging times. When Jesus said, "Come, follow me", he never promised that it would be easy. He never promised us a life free of "bumps in the road." Instead he promised, "And surely I am with you always?, to the very end of the age." (Matthew 18:20)

I believe it's POSSIBLE for this church family to walk together toward "the light at the end of the tunnel." For example, what if ...

- ... this church were to have a reputation in our neighborhood and beyond as a church that cares deeply?
- ... this church were to grow in our respect for one another, dwelling in unity and accepting that we may see things differently at times?
- ... this church were to feel we belong to God, and that we belong to one another?
- ... this church were to double our average worship attendance by this time next year?
- ... this church were to increase the percentage of church members who actively engage in meaningful volunteer opportunities?

As we approached Christmas, I discovered a book in our church library, titled *The Glory of Christmas* written by Charles Swindoll, Max Lucado and Charles Colson. I'd like to share one of the articles, written by Charles Colson, and titled, "Persevering Through Good Times and Bad."

Take away from us our wealth and we are hindered. Take away our health and we are handicapped. Take away our purpose and we are slowed, temporarily confused. But take away our hope, and we are plunged into deep darkness ... stopped dead in our tracks, paralyzed. Wondering, "WHY?" Asking "How much longer? Will this darkness never end? Does he know where we are?"
