

Our Savior from Sin December 7, 2025 Questions for Study and Group Discussion

- ** Before you begin, please read Matthew 1:18-25 as a group. (These questions will focus primarily on Matthew 1:21.)
- 1. In this series, we're focusing on truths about who Jesus is, in anticipation of Christmas. Why is taking time to intentionally prepare our hearts for Christmas important?
- 2. Share a time when you misdiagnosed something (e.g. a physical illness, a problem with your car or around the house, etc.).
- 3. Why is an accurate diagnosis important before a problem can be treated?
- 4. Based on what you heard in the message, what is humanity's greatest problem? Support your answer with what you see in Matthew 1:21.
- 5. As a group, craft a brief definition of sin. Support your definition with Scripture.
- 6. How does the Bible's diagnosis of our greatest problem compare with other suggestions people have about our greatest problem(s)?
- 7. Read Jeremiah 17:9; Romans 3:10-18 and Romans 3:23. What do these verses add to your understanding of our greatest problem?
- 8. Read Romans 5:6-8; 2 Corinthians 5:21; and 1 Peter 2:24-25. What has Jesus done to address our greatest problem?
- 9. Jesus didn't just come to save us from our sins. He also saved us for true and eternal life. Make a list of things Jesus saved us for that are included in this "true and eternal life." (Need some help? Check out the following passages to get you started: John 10:10; Romans 6:3-4; Romans 8:1; Romans 8:15; Galatians 4:6-7; Ephesians 2:10; Titus 2:11-12; 1 Peter 1:3-5; 1 Peter 2:4-5, 9-10; Revelation 21:1-5.)
- 10. What is a practical step you can take to keep the message of Matthew 1:21 at the front of your mind this week?
- 11. What other questions or comments do you have about what you've looked at in the Bible today?
- 12. What was your biggest take-away from the message? Why?
- 13. **Challenge Memorize Matthew 1:21**: She will give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins.
