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## Welcome!

GCA considers it a privilege to partner with families on their homeschooling journey. At GCA, teachers, parents, and students build community together focused on Christ. GCA's unique program combines the benefits of classroom learning and the flexibility and joys of homeschooling. We serve families who want the freedom to homeschool while benefiting from a supportive community and high-quality, Christ-centered academic instruction.

GCA offers a full range of a-la-carte core and elective classes for preschool through high school. Students can take just one or two classes and complete the remaining subjects independently at home OR they can fulfill all their credit requirements via GCA classes. To select your child's classes, we suggest you start by viewing the GCA Class Schedule; then, read the relevant course description in this Catalog to confirm your choices.

At GCA, we view the relationship between teachers and parents as a partnership. The teacher's role is to provide classroom instruction, communicate with parents and students, assign homework, distribute quizzes and tests, and assign grades (for graded classes). However, because GCA classes meet only one day per week, much of the instruction and learning happens at home. The parents' role is to commit adequate time each day to educating their child(ren). This could include reading a textbook to/with the child, reviewing concepts to ensure understanding, helping the child study for a test, offering feedback on a writing assignment, etc. When parents are engaged in the education of their children, students will gain the maximum benefit from GCA's classes.

## Overview of Registration Process and Fees

## REGISTRATION

General enrollment information: Enrollment information for each upcoming school year is available on our website. Registration begins in May through https://factsmgt.com/ (formerly renweb.com). A non-refundable enrollment fee ( $\$ 35$ for each class; $\$ 15$ per each Zone) will be applied to your FACTS account about ten business days after your enrollment is processed.
NEW Families: Online Application and Enrollment Process

1. Go to www.redlionca.org/gca and click Apply Now to start the application process.

IMPORTANT NOTE: Students transferring from Red Lion Christian Academy do not need to submit a new student application. Contact gca@redlionca.org so we can make an internal transfer.
2. Attend New Family Interview - Once the completed application and all required documentation have been submitted, the family will be contacted to schedule an interview. The $\$ 85$ non-refundable application fee must be paid at the time of the interview.
3. Upon acceptance, the family will receive email notification containing enrollment instructions.
4. Complete online enrollment process in FACTS Family Online: request classes and complete all paperwork. To view the class schedule grids and course descriptions, visit www.redlionca.org/gca, click "Academics," and then "Class Information."
5. Create payment FACTS account and set up a payment plan: Tuition is processed through the FACTS payment processing website. ALL registration, tuition, and incidental payments will be handled through FACTS. An annual FACTS fee will be incurred, depending on your payment plan. Students will not be placed in classes until a payment plan has been selected. The non-refundable enrollment fees will be
applied to your FACTS account no earlier than ten business days after completion of enrollment; all other fees will be deducted based on the payment plan selected. RLCA at Glasgow and Umbrella School registration fees will be included in your payment plan. The online enrollment packet includes instructions for creating a FACTS account.
6. Receive confirmation of enrollment/tuition charges and selected payment schedule via email from FACTS. This confirmation will not be received immediately as the completed enrollment for each student in the family must be processed before fees are applied in FACTS (could take up to 15 business days).

## RETURNING families: Online Re-enrollment Process

1. An enrollment email will be sent to returning families.

Note: If enrolling a new student at GCA, click "Apply" in your FACTS Family Online account to create and submit a new student application. The new student application fee will apply.
2. To view the class schedule grids and course descriptions, visit www.redlionca.org/gca, click "Academics," then "Class Information." You will need each Course name and ID number during the enrollment process.
3. Log into your FACTS Family Online (formerly ParentsWeb) account on www.factsmgt.com using your existing username and password.
4. Complete enrollment process in FACTS Family Online: request classes and complete and submit enrollment packet.
5. Log into FACTS to confirm personal and banking information is correct. If you wish to change your payment plan, please contact Mrs. Danyelle Wilson: dwilson.gca@redlionca.org.

Payment Plans: Tuition is processed through the FACTS payment processing website. All registration, tuition, and incidental payments will be handled through FACTS. Using the FACTS system allows families the flexibility to choose one of two tuition payment plans. An annual fee will be incurred, depending on your payment plan. All class registration fees will be due immediately upon re-enrollment (processed within ten business days) through FACTS. RLCA at Glasgow and Umbrella School registration fees will be included in your payment plan.

## Miscellaneous Fees

- A fee of $\$ 35$ per student will be applied for any registrations received after Monday, July 31st.
- •A fee of $\$ 35$ will be applied for any classes dropped after Monday, July 31st.
- The deadline for refund of tuition due to cancellations or changes in registration is September 30th. Enrollment and registration fees are non-refundable. Payments are not refunded for classes canceled due to weather.
- We strongly discourage registration for high school students after December 31 due to the difficulty of achieving academic success when entering mid-year. Admission for new students entering after this date will be considered on an individual basis.

Art class should be a time to explore creatively without stress or pressure. Not all of us were gifted with natural artistic talent, but all of us CAN learn! In this class, we will discover God's truth, beauty, and goodness through a variety of artistic elements and principles of design. We'll experiment with several mediums -- from watercolor and acrylic paint, oil pastel, collage, sculpture, mechanical drawing, and textiles, to still-life and self-portraiture. We'll study the history of particular artists and their collected works through "museum time" -slideshows or presentations designed to help students think critically about an artist's intentions or style. (This might just be an excuse to turn the lights off and quietly ponder beautiful works of art for a minute!) This curriculum runs on a three-year rotation, so no matter when you join art class during middle school, you'll never repeat a project. The only requirements for this class are a positive attitude and a sense of humor. This is not a graded class.

This class aims to give students the opportunity to discover the essentials of scripture in its entirety from a bird's eye view. Using The Most Important Thing You'll Ever Study series, students will work through all 66 books of the Bible in three years. During the 2024-25 school year, the class will focus on the 2 nd portion of the Old Testament. The Most Important Thing You'll Ever Study leads students through the story of the Bible chronologically. Lessons explore central themes and important narratives of scripture. Students who take this class will have a foundational knowledge of the continuous story of scripture from Genesis to Revelation and will be prepared to study God's word in High School and beyond.

Throughout the year, students will engage with God's word in a variety of ways: lesson guides, regular scripture journaling, and in-class discussions and activities. Graded memory verses, open book tests, and participation points will account for the majority of a student's grade.

In this class, we will be diving DEEP into the four Gospels: Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John. During class, students will watch a short video scene from The Chosen series, and then dig into the Biblical account of the event portrayed in the scene. Classroom discussions will challenge students to look past the "Sunday School answers." We will be spending time focusing on tools that will equip them for their entire spiritual walk journaling, highlighting, prayer, comparing translations etc. Each week there will be a memory verse test.

Every new generation asks the same fundamental questions... Who am I? Where do I fit in? How do I find meaning, belonging, and acceptance? Jesus answered all these questions in a radically simple way: "Follow me."

In this study, students will dive into Scripture alongside The Chosen series to:

- Discover who Jesus says they really are
- Understand what it means to follow Him
- Learn how to surrender in both good and bad times
- Find what their hearts are truly longing for

With reflection questions and discussion guides, along with QR codes that link directly to clips from the show, students will begin to understand the freedom that comes from knowing none of us have life totally figured out-but Jesus does. Through Scripture, the show, and this book, students will learn how to get used to different."

## Overview of GCA's Middle School Language Arts Program:

A complete Language Arts program for middle school students consists of grammar, writing, literature/reading, vocabulary, spelling, and handwriting. Note: A student who takes one of GCA's middle school writing classes (ID \#208, 212, or 214) AND Literature \& Vocabulary (ID \#212 \& 215) will fulfill all language arts requirements except handwriting and spelling.

GCA's elementary and middle school writing classes -- Beginning Writing, IEW Writing \& Grammar - teach students grammar and the art of writing using the method developed by the Institute for Excellence in Writing (IEW). IEW's unique approach introduces students to many different structural models (such as taking notes, writing paragraphs, stories, essays, research reports, and creative writing). In addition, students are taught "stylistic techniques," which develop and improve the style and sophistication of their writing (see full class descriptions below). Please note that parental guidance at home is required in order to optimize students' mastery of concepts taught in class. For more information about the IEW method, please visit the website: iew.com.

GCA other middle school classes - Fundamentals of Writing and Grammar A (ID \#212) and B (ID \#214) - take a more traditional approach to teaching writing. These classes, using the Essentials in Writing curriculum, benefit all students, but especially the beginner writer, the student who needs a stronger foundation with grammar, mechanics, and sentence structure, or the student who simply struggles with writing.

The Literature and Vocabulary class for $6^{\text {th }}-8^{\text {th }}$ graders (see full description below) will cover literature and vocabulary.

Important Note about Literature: GCA's approach to literature could be described as "inoculation" rather than "isolation." As believers living in a sinful world, we desire to educate our covenant children using a classical, apologetics methodology (similar to the approach taken by Sonlight Curriculum). The books students read in Children's Literature (Class ID \#204), Literature \& Vocabulary (Class ID \#212 \& \#215) and the high school English classes (Class ID \#216-220) are chosen primarily for the quality of the writing: well-written plots, strong sentence structures, and well-defined themes. Most classic literature contains themes which spur readers to wrestle with deep issues like pride, power, courage, prejudice, and good vs. evil. These themes unfold through the thoughts and actions of the main characters. We do not choose books that glamorize evil or explicitly detail objectionable elements. Discussing these books in the classroom gives our teachers the opportunity to infuse a Christian worldview into the study of these themes and situations. Students will be faced with complex issues throughout life and need to be able to think Biblically about them.

A collection of short stories and novel studies will be used to provide students with a basic understanding of literary elements. Students will learn to identify and analyze each author's use of figurative language, compare and contrast literary pieces, identify cause/effect, and analyze each author's use of characters, conflict, point of view, and tone within literature. Class time will focus on going deeper with each element through group activities and class discussion. Homework will include a weekly reading selection, comprehension guides, and occasional projects designed to illustrate the student's understanding of the literature. Vocabulary enrichment will be incorporated in class instruction as well as assigned homework. Students will engage in reading a minimum of one novel per semester. This class can be either graded or audited.

## Overview of GCA's High School English Program:

GCA's High School English classes provide students with an incremental progression of instruction in both writing skills and literary analysis, as each grade level focuses on a specific genre of classic literature:
American (9th), British or World (10th or 11th), and a combination of genres (12th). Each course fulfills GCA's requirements for a college-prep English credit for its specific grade level.

Important Note about Literature: GCA's approach to literature could be described as "inoculation" rather than "isolation." As believers in a sinful world, we desire to educate our covenant children using a classical, apologetics methodology (similar to the approach taken by Sonlight Curriculum). The books students read in Literature \& Vocabulary (Class ID \#215 ) and the high school English classes (Class ID \#216-220) are chosen primarily for the quality of the writing: well-written plots, strong sentence structures, and well-defined themes. Most classic literature contains themes which spur readers to wrestle with deep issues (i.e. pride, power, courage, prejudice, and good vs. evil). These themes unfold through the thoughts and actions of the main
characters. We do not choose books that glamorize evil or explicitly detail objectionable elements. Discussing these books in the classroom gives our teachers the opportunity to infuse a Christian worldview into the study of these themes and situations. Students will be faced with complex issues throughout life and need to be able to think Biblically about them.
*All high school English classes will incorporate grammar instruction, vocabulary enrichment, and a research paper project. An optional Honors track will be offered and explained in the syllabus at each grade level.

Homework will include a weekly reading selection, comprehension guides, and occasional projects designed to illustrate the student's understanding of literature. Vocabulary will include literary terminology as well as general terminology. Students will engage in reading a minimum of one American Classic per semester. Note: This class fulfills RLCA at Glasgow's requirements for $9^{\text {th }}$ grade CP English. Students can earn honors level credit by completing additional writing and reading assignments as detailed in the RLCA at Glasgow Handbook. All honors work is to be completed under the supervision of the parent and presented to the academic adviser. This class may be either graded or audited.

NOTE: English 10 and English 11 will both focus on college-level composition and in-depth literary analysis through the study of British literature. Students should take the classes in order; however, the classes will follow a similar syllabus (some specific writing assignments and/or literature selections may

Students should be proficient in algebra prior to taking this course. Class time will be spent reviewing concepts learned in the book and completing experiments. The classroom lab component will fulfill the necessary laboratory instruction hours. The course covers the following concepts: significant figures, units, classification, the mole concept, stoichiometry, thermochemistry, thermodynamics, kinetics, acids and bases, solutions, atomic structure, Lewis structures, molecular geometry, the gas laws, and equilibrium. Students who take and understand this course will be very well-prepared for a university chemistry course. This class may be either graded or audited.

## Explanation of 'Graded' vs. 'Audited' Classes

Elementary courses are not graded. Courses for Middle School and High School core subjects are graded, with the option to audit (see 'Audit-Only' below). If auditing is chosen, parents must communicate that decision directly to each teacher. Please see the individual course descriptions to determine the grading options.

Graded Course (traditional option): The student is accountable to the teacher (parents provide guidance as necessary at home). The teacher establishes the tests/assessments, assigns homework, and formulates the grade based on the student's performance. Any graded tests or quizzes administered at home should be taken "closed book" in the presence of a parent unless otherwise directed by the teacher. Tests/quizzes will be returned to the teacher in a sealed envelope signed by a parent. Late assignments and lack of participation in class may impact the overall grade based on the teacher's grading expectations. Teachers use FACTS Classroom to document grades. Parents may view their student's grades online at any time via their Family Portal account using their existing username/password. Parents and students should regularly monitor academic progress through FACTS.

Audit-Only Course (non-graded option): The auditing option is offered to provide flexibility for students who wish to participate in a class without being required to fulfill all of the requirements established by the teacher. The auditing student is accountable to the parent, rather than the teacher. Auditing students are still expected to participate in class instruction, discussion, and labs but may complete assignments as assigned by the parent. Students will be expected to limit questions to the subject matter currently being addressed by the teacher (off-topic questions will be handled at the teacher's discretion). Individual assignments may be graded by either the parent or the teacher; however, the teacher will not record the student's scores in the FACTS online gradebook or assign mid-term/final grades for the class. Parents are responsible to assign any grades needed for the student's permanent records. Payment of class registration fee and tuition is still required. The decision to audit a class must be made by completing the Auditing Request Form by the 10th week of the year although exceptions may be made for extenuating circumstances. [Students enrolled in the RLCA at Glasgow diploma program MUST choose the graded option for Bible and for at least one core class (English, Science, Math or Social Studies). For audited classes, parents are responsible to assign any grades needed for the student's portfolio. All graded work must be shown at the portfolio review.]
