- Why is it significant that Hagar is not referred to by Abram or Sarai, but the Lord does call her by name?
- Why would God tell Hagar to do such a hard thing?
- At the end of the chapter, do you think that Abram was convinced that Ishmael was the son of promise? Why or why not?

APPLICATION.

- What are some characteristics of a humanly engineered solution?
- Faced with an obstacle, which question more naturally comes to mind and why?
 - a. "What does God want me to do?"
 - b. "What can I do?"

- How does God's concern for Hagar inform our concern for others, especially those who are outside our faith and culture?
- Why would God call us to endure the uncertain misery of today? What is the goal?
