## <sup>11</sup> Jesus continued: "There was a man who had two sons. <sup>12</sup> The younger one said to his father, 'Father, give me my share of the estate.' So he divided his property between them.

1. This was highly unusual. There was no cultural precedent for this request.

There would have been repercussions of the boy's request.

1. The father would have the right

2. The father \_\_\_\_\_\_ would have been expected to drive the boy out of the house with "verbal and physical blows."

Look at how the father responds. The father does not respond in the traditional manner. In the face of unthinkable disrespect, the father demonstrates \_\_\_\_\_\_. People listening to this story would have been amazed at the father's response. The father loves the son enough to extend his son the costly grace of the son's right to choose. God gives us the right to choose,
