The First Lesson

Acts 16:9-15

During the night Paul had a vision: there stood a man of Macedonia pleading with him and saying, "Come over to Macedonia and help us." When he had seen the vision, we immediately tried to cross over to Macedonia, being convinced that God had called us to proclaim the good news to them.

We set sail from Troas and took a straight course to Samothrace, the following day to Neapolis, and from there to Philippi, which is a leading city of the district of Macedonia and a Roman colony. We remained in this city for some days. On the sabbath day we went outside the gate by the river, where we supposed there was a place of prayer; and we sat down and spoke to the women who had gathered there. A certain woman named Lydia, a worshiper of God, was listening to us; she was from the city of Thyatira and a dealer in purple cloth. The Lord opened her heart to listen eagerly to what was said by Paul. When she and her household were baptized, she urged us, saying, "If you have judged me to be faithful to the Lord, come and stay at my home." And she prevailed upon us.

The Second Lesson

In the spirit the angel carried me away to a great, high mountain and showed me the holy city Jerusalem coming down out of heaven from God. I saw no temple in the city, for its temple is the Lord God the Almighty and the Lamb. And the city has no need of sun or moon to shine on it, for the glory of God is its light, and its lamp is the Lamb. The nations will walk by its light, and the kings of the earth will bring their glory into it. Its gates will never be shut by day–and there will be no night there. People will bring into it the glory and the honor of the nations. But nothing unclean will enter it, nor anyone who practices abomination or falsehood, but only those who are written in the Lamb's book of life. Then the angel showed me the river of the water of life, bright as crystal, flowing from the throne of God and of the Lamb through the middle of the street of the city. On either side of the river is the tree of life with its twelve kinds of fruit, producing its fruit each month; and the leaves of the tree are for the healing of the nations. Nothing accursed will be found there any more. But the throne of God and of the Lamb will be in it, and his servants will worship him; they will see his face, and his name will be on their foreheads. And there will be no more night; they need no light of lamp or sun, for the Lord God will be their light, and they will reign forever and ever.

Lector In observance of Memorial Day, we remember those who have given their lives in service to our country. In mercy, may they be at rest. Let all war and earthly pride be banished from our midst, so that all life would be honored, and that true freedom and justice would descend from the King of Peace. May God be merciful to us;

People May God give us his blessing.

Lector We pray for the departed in God, especially for Christopher "Kit" Bond, [______,] and Mary Heffner. As they dwell before the throne of God and the Lamb, may they rejoice in that place where there is no night, where the Lord God is their light. May God be merciful to us;

People May God give us his blessing.

Lector Let us pray for our own needs, and for those of others.

Celebrant Hear our prayers, O God, and as we confess that Christ, the Savior of the world, lives with you in glory, grant that we may perceive him as present among us through the love and work of the Spirit, now and to the end of the ages; through the same Christ our Lord. **Amen.**



THE GREAT THANKSGIVING

Eucharistic Prayer A

MUSIC NOTES The author of the opening hymn, Edward White Benson, was a notable and influential figure in the Anglican Church. Benson founded the Cambridge Association for Spiritual Inquiry (known around Cambridge as the Ghost Society) and served as the Archbishop of Canterbury from 1883 to 1896. But he is chiefly remembered in the annals of Anglican church music for drawing up the first order of Nine Lessons and Carols for Truro Cathedral in 1880 while serving as bishop of that diocese. Twenty years prior to creating that memorable liturgy, Archbishop Benson penned the hymn "O Jesus, crowned with all renown" (Hymn 292), which has an association with the Rogation Days, traditionally observed on the Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday before Ascension Day. It is paired with the familiar English tune "Kingsfold." When Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872-1958) first encountered this tune in Lucy Broadwood's *English Country Songs* in 1893, he exclaimed, "here's something which I have known all my life–only I didn't know it!"

Maurice Duruflé (1902-1986) was the organist of St-Étienne-du-Mont in Paris from 1930 until his death. Though his compositional output is small (some fifteen compositions) each is highly regarded to this day. Many of Duruflé's compositions were inspired in various ways by Gregorian chant. In the motet "Ubi caritas," the inspiration is rather overt: the eighth century chant melody is sung in its entirety, and lavishly harmonized throughout. From Duruflé's Opus 10, this is one of four motets on Gregorian themes that were dedicated to Auguste Le Guennant, the director of the Gregorian Institute in Paris.
