THE FIRST LESSON

1 Kings 19:15-16,19-21

The Lord said to Elijah, "Go, return on your way to the wilderness of Damascus; when you arrive, you shall anoint Hazael as king over Aram. Also you shall anoint Jehu son of Nimshi as king over Israel; and you shall anoint Elisha son of Shaphat of Abel-meholah as prophet in your place."

So he set out from there, and found Elisha son of Shaphat, who was plowing. There were twelve yoke of oxen ahead of him, and he was with the twelfth. Elijah passed by him and threw his mantle over him. He left the oxen, ran after Elijah, and said, "Let me kiss my father and my mother, and then I will follow you." Then Elijah said to him, "Go back again; for what have I done to you?" He returned from following him, took the yoke of oxen, and slaughtered them; using the equipment from the oxen, he boiled their flesh, and gave it to the people, and they ate. Then he set out and followed Elijah, and became his servant.

THE SECOND LESSON

Galatians 5:1,13-25

For freedom Christ has set us free. Stand firm, therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery.

For you were called to freedom, brothers and sisters; only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for self-indulgence, but through love become slaves to one another. For the whole law is summed up in a single commandment, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." If, however, you bite and devour one another, take care that you are not consumed by one another.

Live by the Spirit, I say, and do not gratify the desires of the flesh. For what the flesh desires is opposed to the Spirit, and what the Spirit desires is opposed to the flesh; for these are opposed to each other, to prevent you from doing what you want. But if you are led by the Spirit, you are not subject to the law. Now the works of the flesh are obvious: fornication, impurity, licentiousness, idolatry, sorcery, enmities, strife, jealousy, anger, quarrels, dissensions, factions, envy, drunkenness, carousing, and things like these. I am warning you, as I warned you before: those who do such things will not inherit the kingdom of God.

By contrast, the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. There is no law against such things. And those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires. If we live by the Spirit, let us also be guided by the Spirit.

THE NICENE CREED

Lector We pray for those with any need in this parish and community, especially for Michael Bland [and _____]. May we love our neighbor as ourselves in seeking, aiding, and comforting those in hunger, poverty, loneliness, fear, and any distress. God will show us the path of life;

People **May we take refuge in the Lord.**

Lector We pray for the departed, especially for Susan Sutton, Robert Stone, [_____,] and Timothy Travis. In God's presence there is fullness of joy; therefore, may their spirits rejoice, and their bodies rest in hope. God will show us the path of life;

People **May we take refuge in the Lord.**

Lector Let us pray for our own needs, and for those of others.

Silence is kept.

Celebrant Holy Lord, you protect and uphold your people: Hear our prayers, and grant to us only those things that would be for our good above all other. Set yourself before us, O God, and the paths we walk, that in blessing you for your counsel, the Spirit would teach our hearts to choose the path that brings life; through the same Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

CONFESSION OF SIN

Celebrant Let us confess our sins against God and our neighbor.

Silence is kept.

Celebrant Most merciful God,
All **we confess that we have sinned against you

Celebrant Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

MUSIC NOTES Seattle composer Jessica French (b. 1984) has received considerable national acclaim in recent years. Two of her anthems premiered at the 2022 National Convention of the American Guild of Organists, and she has received numerous commissions from a wide range of choirs including the prestigious New York churches of St. Thomas, Fifth Avenue, and Trinity, Wall Street. The St. Peter's Choir had the honor of premiering her "Tantum ergo" in September 2021. A memorable, tuneful setting of a famous eucharistic text by Thomas Aquinas, this motet has become French's best-selling anthem since its premiere at St. Peter's.

The Canadian composer Stephanie Martin (b. 1962) is associate professor of music at York University in Toronto. She has received awards in composition from the Exultate Chamber Singers and the Association of Anglican Musicians. Martin explains, "I composed 'Ave Verum Corpus' for the Gallery Choir of the Church of St. Mary Magdalene, Toronto in 2008 during a snow storm which forced us to cancel choir practice."
