



One such composition to have found an established place in the repertoire of the Episcopal Church is his Advent anthem "The Lord will surely come." The anthem is framed by the invocation "Kyrie eleison" sung to the familiar Advent hymn melody *Conditor alme siderum* (Hymn 60). The anthem was written in honor of John Loessi, on the 25th anniversary of his association with the music program of First Wayne United Church in Fort Wayne, Ind.
