The Third Sunday of Advent is historically known as Gaudete Sunday. Gaudete, Latin for "rejoice," refers to Philippians 4:4, "Rejoice in the Lord always," which was chanted in part as the introit for this Sunday. Rose, the traditional liturgical color for this day, symbolizes a lightening of the more penitential tone of Advent, anticipating with joy the nearness of celebrating Christ's nativity.





MUSIC NOTES The St. Peter's Choir sang Alan Hovhaness's "Watchman tell us of the night" for their 2020 recording Longing for Home (Regent Records) and have sung it at an Advent Carol Service, but this morning is the first time that it will be sung at a service of Holy Communion at St. Peter's. Hovhaness, who died 25 years ago, was a prolific composer who wrote more than 500 works during his lifetime. Many of Hovhaness's works are suffused with a unique kind of spirituality; they are "hushed, reverential, mystical, nostalgic." His anthem "Watchman, tell us of the night" combines simple materials in different ways to great effect. At the center is a more rhapsodic bass solo.

American composer Aaron Copland (1900-1990) wrote his Four Motets while a student of Nadia Boulanger in Paris. In the first of the set, "Help us, O Lord," Copland chooses phrases from Psalm 36 that speak to waiting and hope that are themes of the Advent season. In the Gospel reading, Jesus references a "reed shaken by the wind." The organ prelude is drawn from a suite of pieces that are meditations on wind by the German-born American composer Samuel Adler (b. 1928), who studied composition with Copland at Harvard University.

The final organ voluntary, from the Great Eighteen Chorale Preludes of J. S. Bach (1685-1750), is one of the more familiar settings from that collection. Perhaps due to the frequency with which they are now heard, modern listeners may not fully appreciate the kind of apocalyptic treatment of the familiar Advent chorale melody "Nun komm, der Heiden Heiland" receives in Bach's hands. The third setting in the Great Eighteen, BWV 661 is a terrifying setting for full organ. The initial subject scrambles disjunctly and eventually careens down from E-flat to F-sharp, relishing the uncompromising intensity of its minor-key tonality. The melody, when it enters, thunders forth from the pedal and is today undergirded by a 32-foot reed stop that Bach so admired in the large organs of his day.
