About this Service

HIS ADVENT SERVICE is closely modeled on a service held at St. John's College, Cambridge since 1956. This Service of Lessons and Carols for Advent has been held annually at St. Peter's since 2016. The Mander organ of St. Peter's, built in 2001, was inspired, in part, by a Mander organ at St. John's, which was built in 1994.

This service is in four sections: 1) the Message of Advent, 2) the Word of God, 3) the Prophetic Call, and 4) the Christ-Bearer. The pattern of this service reflects the season's growing anticipation, both of the first coming of Christ and of that day when the prayer "Thy Kingdom come" is finally and fully answered.

This year is the 125th anniversary of the birth of American composer Aaron Copland (1900–1990). His motet "Help us, O Lord" is sung after the Second Lesson. Another American composer, Alan Hovhaness (1911–2000), died 25 years ago this year. His anthem "Watchman, tell us of the night" is sung before the Fifth Lesson. This year is also the 500th anniversary of the birth of Italian composer Giovanni Pierluigi da Palestrina (c. 1525–1594). His five-voice motet "Fuit homo missus a Deo" is sung after the Fifth Lesson.

In the Days John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness of Judea, proclaiming, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near." This is the one of whom the prophet Isaiah spoke when he said, "The voice of one crying out in the wilderness: 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight.'" Now John wore clothing of camel's hair with a leather belt around his waist, and his food was locusts and wild honey. Then the people of Jerusalem and all Judea were going out to him, and all the region along the Jordan, and they were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins.
