SCRIPTURE Acts 9:1-19

Meanwhile, Saul was still breathing out murderous threats against the Lord's disciples. He went to the high priest ² and asked him for letters to the synagogues in Damascus, so that if he found any there who belonged to the Way, whether men or women, he might take them as prisoners to Jerusalem. ³ As he neared Damascus on his journey, suddenly a light from heaven flashed around him. ⁴ He fell to the ground and heard a voice say to him, "Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?"

⁵ "Who are you, Lord?" Saul asked.

"I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting," he replied. ⁶ "Now get up and go into the city, and you will be told what you must do."

⁷ The men traveling with Saul stood there speechless; they heard the sound but did not see anyone. ⁸ Saul got up from the ground, but when he opened his eyes he could see nothing. So they led him by the hand into Damascus. ⁹ For three days he was blind, and did not eat or drink anything.

¹⁰ In Damascus there was a disciple named Ananias. The Lord called to him in a vision, "Ananias!" "Yes, Lord," he answered.

¹¹ The Lord told him, "Go to the house of Judas on Straight Street and ask for a man from Tarsus named Saul, for he is praying. ¹² In a vision he has seen a man named Ananias come and place his hands on him to restore his sight."

¹³ "Lord," Ananias answered, "I have heard many reports about this man and all the harm he has done to your holy people in Jerusalem. ¹⁴ And he has come here with authority from the chief priests to arrest all who call on your name."

¹⁵ But the Lord said to Ananias, "Go! This man is my chosen instrument to proclaim my name to the Gentiles and their kings and to the people of Israel. ¹⁶ I will show him how much he must suffer for my name."

¹⁷ Then Ananias went to the house and entered it. Placing his hands on Saul, he said, "Brother Saul, the Lord—Jesus, who appeared to you on the road as you were coming here—has sent me so that you may see again and be filled with the Holy Spirit."

¹⁸ Immediately, something like scales fell from Saul's eyes, and he could see again. He got up and was baptized, ¹⁹ and after taking some food, he regained his strength.

John Wesley

June 17,1703—March 2, 1791

- J.W.'s grandfathers were both ministers. J.W., his father and both brothers were Anglican Ministers who graduated from Oxford University.
- J. W. was the fifteenth birth of nineteen that his mother Susanna had in twenty years. She was the twenty-fifth birth of her father, married twice. His brother Charles wrote the words to an estimated 6,000 hymns.
- Susanna Wesley home-schooled her children, unheard of for girls and sent three boys to Oxford University. She is often referred to as the "Mother of Methodism."
- John Wesley was <u>never</u> a Methodist. Methodist was a derogatory term to describe how mechanically J.W. practiced the faith in college. Also called the "Holy Club."
- J.W. opposed the colonies' rebellion in 1775, such that Colonial Methodists were suspected of being Tories.
- Methodist scholar Albert Outler realized J.W. added "Experience" to the Anglican
 emphasis on "Scripture, Tradition and Reason" for sources of authority. Although
 referred to as the Wesleyan Quadrilateral it is not original with J.W. Outler also
 noted Wesley is the most published person in English history.
- J.W. rode horseback in England an estimated 250,000 miles, ten times the circumference of the earth. He averaged twenty miles a day for forty years and preached 4,000 sermons.

- Famous J.W. quotes. "My heart was strangely warmed. I felt I had trust in Christ,
 Christ alone for salvation, and an assurance was given me that he had taken away my sins, even mine and saved me from the law of sin and death." (John Wesley, The Bi-centennial Edition Journal and Diaries, Ward and Heitzenrater, eds., Vol. 18, 249-250)
- "Do all the good you can, in all the ways you can, to all the souls you can, in every place you can, at all the times you can, with all the zeal you can, as long as ever you can."
- J.W. was a missionary in Savannah, in the colony of Georgia, as a guest of John Oglethorpe, hoping to deliver "Primitive Christianity" to the Native Americans.
- J.W. was impressed on his voyage to Georgia by the Moravians missionaries who showed no fear of dying during a violent storm. They had something he didn't.
- Realizing his renewal movement would not be acceptable in the Anglican Church, late in his life, J.W. sent Thomas Coke and Francis Asbury to the states as "General Superintendents." Instead, shortly after their arrival they ordained each other, Bishops. The Methodist publishing house is named Coke(A)sbury.
- Sophie Hopkins in Georgia set her hat for J.W. He at first showed no interest, changed his mind and then it was announced she would marry another man. Wesley was shocked and later refused to serve her communion. Her husband threatened to sue him and Wesley fled the Georgia colony. He had trouble with a woman before and another later, before marrying a Huguenot widow at the age of 48. The marriage fizzled and they separated. They probably would have divorced but it was unacceptable in those days. Some would say he had trouble finding a woman as spiritual as his mother.

BECOMING DISCIPLES THROUGH BIBLE STUDY
