

FROM PASTOR MICHAEL

Tis the season of mail at the Casa de Precht. Every day, the improbably loud clatter of the mail slot in our front door announces the arrival of a new 5x7 postcard from a college that would absolutely love to be the first choice of our daughter Elsa when she applies to schools next year. The college selection process is much changed from when I was her age, just as my own experience was much different than my parents'.

My dad, in particular, has given me a half dozen, half-true explanations of how he ended up at Northwestern St. University in Natchitoches, Louisiana. When telling college stories in the company of other editors and writers, Dad would joke that someone at his high school told him Northwestern wasthe best journalism school in the nation... but he didn't realize they meant the school in Chicago. I expect the truest explanation I'll ever get was that he won a scholarship to go anywhere in the state of Louisiana, and so he chose the one school that was too far away for his parents to make him help with the 5 AM milking on the dairy farm.

All of this is to say, the reasons and the seasons of my day-to-day are now two generations removed from the rhythms of plowing, planting, and harvest (or tilling, planting and baling the hay for livestock). Some of us in Fairhope still live by a farmer's calendar; many more of us have calendars circumscribed by tax season, or travel sports, or retail sales.

Almost as soon as the early Church began to settle in to a regular pattern of worship, they also began to order their worshiping life around their own special seasons. The earliest Christian "holy day" was Easter, to which Christians soon added the preparation season known as Lent. Pentecost was also part of the Christian year from the very earliest stages (since it was already established as a Jewish festival before it was a Christian one). Christmas came a little later (it is first mentioned in the fourth century), and within 100 years it had been extended by its own preparation season of Advent.

Somewhere along the way, the Catholic and Orthodox churches began to realize that the sequence of celebration could allow Christians to re-encounter the life and ministry of Jesus, year after year. As the the Protestant denominations rose in prominence, they continued practicing the Christian year as a way of sharing in all Christ's work. Each year, the cycle repeats, inviting us to remember Jesus' birth, his public ministry, his death, resurrection, then his ascension and reign through the Holy Spirit.

As we enter the month of November, it has been a long time since we celebrated the "big three" of Christmas, Easter, and Pentecost. Ordinary Time is loooonnnnnggggg, three times longer than any other season in the Christian year. But here at its end, we have two more celebrations to remind us that there is still more life ahead of us in Jesus Christ.

All Saints' Sunday and Christ the King Sunday point us forward and remind us that all of creation can become a sign of the Kingdom. All Saints' is a celebration of "firstfruits." Just as an ancient farmer would throw a feast when the first stalks of wheat were ready for harvest, so we celebrate that anyone who dies in Jesus Christ has become the first fruit of the promise God offers to all (2 Thessalonians 2:13, 1 Timothy 4:10). And just as the early pilgrims threw an even grander feast to celebrate when the harvest was complete, so, too, we look for the day when all Christ's mission will be accomplished, as every knee bows and every tongue confesses that Christ is King (Philippians 2:10).

You could define your present season in any number of ways. Perhaps it has felt like a season of joy or sorrow; maybe it has been busy or lonely (or perhaps it's strange to admit that both are true). Maybe feel as though Nov. 2 will be the beginning of "standard time" in more ways than one. However you define this current season, remember that Jesus can re-define all that you dread and deepen the meaning all that brings you joy. As you flip through this month's edition of The Link, you find all manner of different opportunities to invite others into this season, as well.

The point of the seasons is never to limit how we think about or worship God, but to show us all the ways that we can "be prepared in season and out of season" (2 Timothy 4:2) to share the good news.

"For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink."
– Matthew 25:35

Hunger and thirst are among the most basic human necessities. No matter our age, background, or circumstances, we all know what it feels like to need nourishment. Food sustains us, but it also connects us. Around kitchen tables, in fellowship halls, and at community gatherings, food becomes more than a meal. It becomes a bridge. It opens the door for conversation, friendship, and belonging.

Jesus knew this well. Throughout the Gospels, he shared meals with all kinds of people: disciples, tax collectors, believers, and skeptics. He fed the crowds when they were weary and made sure his disciples were fed before sending them out to serve others. In every case, the table became a place of grace. When we share food, we are reminded that God meets us in the ordinary. A simple meal can become holy ground.

This month, I am celebrating the simple yet sacred act of sharing food with others. Alongside the many ways we already help feed our community, we have begun providing a monthly meal for the Fairhope Coastal Alabama Community College students next door. Each time we've served, it has been a beautiful reminder that ministry isn't confined to what happens inside the church walls. Sometimes ministry looks like casseroles, to-go plates, and quick check-ins over the food line—and what a joy it has been!

I am also excited to share that the **Alabama-West Florida Conference Board of Higher Education and Ministry has accepted our request for a grant to help cover the cost of these meals.** What a blessing!

These students may never step into a worship service at Fairhope UMC, yet through your generosity and the help of the conference, we have already made a difference in their lives. As Matthew 25 reminds us, when we feed one another, we are fulfilling the love of Christ

A huge thank you to Katie Robertson and her volunteer crew for preparing 100 extra meals for the students, and to Cindy Sams, Melanie Boykin and her grandson, Oliver Stuckey, and Steve and Suzan Christensen for showing up to serve with such joy.

Our last meal for the semester will be **November 5**, and we look forward to continuing this ministry in the spring. Be on the lookout for ways to get involved – feeding people always makes an impact :)

One Body, Many Ages

"Just as a body, though one, has many parts... so it is with Christ." - 1 Corinthians 12:12 "Let the young and the old together praise the name of the Lord." - Psalm 148:12–13)

Church isn't parallel programs under one roof; it's **one family** learning to follow Jesus together. The Bible's image is a body: many parts, many gifts, one Lord. That includes **many ages.** When children, teens, adults, and seniors worship and serve side-by-side, each of us reflects a piece of Christ's love the others need.

- Little ones bring wonder they remind us the gospel is good news worth smiling about.
- Elementary kids bring joyful energy they help us practice patience and celebration.
- Preteens bring emerging leadership they're ready to help and be trusted.
- Youth bring **courage and voice** they ask honest questions, serve boldly, include outsiders, and model faith-in-action on campus and online.
- Adults bring **steadiness and wisdom** your presence anchors the room.
- Seniors bring **prayer and perspective** you help us remember God's faithfulness across decades.

You don't need to be a teacher to strengthen the body. Try one or two of these simple practices this month:

- Learn three kids' names. Say hello by name on Sundays. Belonging starts with being known.
- **Sit near a family.** Offer a smile, share a hymnal, whisper "You're doing great." Your grace makes room for theirs.
- Cheer on next-gen leaders. When a child reads Scripture or helps serve, celebrate it: "I loved hearing you read today!"
- **Pray specifically.** Pick one age group and pray for them by name if you know it. A quick note or high-five says, "I'm in your corner."
- **Serve occasionally.** Greet at check-in, prep supplies mid-week, or join intergenerational service projects. (For roles with kids, we'll guide you through our safety steps—easy and important.)
- Tell your Jesus story in one minute. Kids borrow courage from honest, simple testimonies: "When I was worried, God gave me peace..."

A healthy church doesn't measure success only by quiet rooms or full calendars but by **holy interdependence**: Are all ages needed, not just noticed? When a fifth-grader helps a kindergartner find a seat, or a grandparent kneels to tie a shoe, the gospel becomes visible; it's love taking the first step.

Let's be the church where every generation can say, "I belong here, I am needed here, and together we follow Jesus." Thank you for lending your smile, your story, your steady presence. In Christ, we truly are one body, many ages and that's very good news.

Prayer: Jesus, make us one body of many ages. Teach us to notice, honor, and receive the gifts You've placed in every generation. Knit us together in love so that our life together would preach a sermon stronger than words: Christ is among us. Amen.


Celebrating Quarterly Birthdays

Celebrating 15 Years of Service:

Durable Medical Equipment Loan Closet by Charlie & Michelle Scearce & Hazel Odom

The Durable Medical Equipment (DME) Loan Closet is a ministry of Fairhope United Methodist Church which began in 2010. It is designed to support members of the congregation and the wider community by providing access to gently used medical equipment on a temporary or long-term basis. The purpose of this ministry is to assist individuals recovering from illness, injury, or surgery, and to promote independence and mobility for those with ongoing medical needs.

The ministry's mission is to demonstrate Christ's love through practical service—meeting physical needs, promoting independence and easing financial burdens for individuals recovering from illness, injury, surgery, or those living with disabilities—all sharing God's love to those in need through acts of care and compassion.

The DME closet maintains an inventory of commonly used items such as wheelchairs, walkers, canes, bedside commodes and other assistive devices. Availability is subject to donations and current inventory. Equipment is provided free of charge as a loan or gift, depending on need and item condition.

The impact of this ministry reduces the financial burden for families facing temporary or long term disability, keeps medical equipment out of landfills through reuse, builds community relationships and provides an opportunity for volunteers to live out their faith in tangible ways.

Thanksgiving Devotional: "A Heart of Gratitude"

"Give thanks to the Lord, for he is good; his love endures forever." - Psalm 107:1 (NIV)

Thanksgiving isn't just a day on the calendar—it's a posture of the heart. Psalm 107 calls us to give thanks not because everything is perfect, but because God is good. His love endures, even when seasons change, when blessings feel distant, or when we're walking through hardship.

Too often, we tie our gratitude to our circumstances: a good harvest, a full table, or a smooth year. But biblical thankfulness digs deeper. It acknowledges that even in the wilderness, God provides. Even in silence, His love is constant.

Gratitude shifts our perspective. It doesn't deny struggle—it reorients our hearts toward God's faithfulness. Whether we're in a season of abundance or one of waiting, we can pause and say, "Thank You, Lord."

Teach us to be thankful not just in abundance, but in all things.

Admittedly, the Barnhardts are people that celebrate and look ahead to things well in advance. For example, our Christmas tree will likely be fully decorated by the time you're reading this. I enjoy celebrating and looking ahead to things that I love, and Student Ministries is already looking ahead to something that's a whole month after Christmas: Discovery!

Discovery Weekend is a spiritual formation retreat that is intended to be holy and fun at the same time. The weekend experience creates an environment in which middle schoolers can better listen to God and be aware of God's presence. The weekend celebration of God's love is designed to involve much of our church family in planning, leading, and providing resources:

- High schoolers work with small groups of middle schoolers (Disciple Groups), lead worship, share their faith stories, and provide leadership throughout the weekend.
- Parents share gifts of love and presence, attend the Prayer Service, and serve in other ways.
- Our Youth and clergy staff provide overall leadership, direction, and supervision.
- Sunday school classes and small groups offer prayer support, snacks and many other things.
- Clergy work with youth who are considering baptism, assist with worship planning, help with teaching and mentoring, and are available for spiritual guidance.

As someone who has been a part of Discovery as a student and leader, I can personally speak to how powerful of a weekend it is. Discovery Weekend is a grand opportunity to fulfill the vow all congregations make in some form with every service of baptism and confirmation that "We will surround these persons with a community of love and forgiveness, that they may grow in their trust of God, and be found faithful in their service to others. We will pray for them, that they may be true disciples who walk in the way that leads to life" (UMH, 35).

That first year, a group of 5 women and 1 gentleman gathered together to share a meal after each had lost their spouses during 2016. You see, they each ventured into the CLC on Fridays to have lunch, meeting one another and building community. Leading up to that day they decided instead of spending their first Thanksgiving alone, they would gather at the church and share a Thanksgiving Meal together. It was a very emotional day for all of them, but they were so happy to have each other. We certainly have our regulars that attend each Thanksgiving, but we also have years of drifters who have found their way to us on that day. We have shared Thanksgiving with bikers traveling cross country, a guy who was recently released from jail, widowers, a dad who had not seen his kids in several months, our homeless friends, the stories go on and on. Every year the Lord brings someone through our doors that reminds us why HE called us to serve on Thanksgiving.

We are so grateful for this church family, who continues to support this outreach. This year we plan once again to provide Thanksgiving Lunch to our community on November 27 from 11:00am-1:00pm. In addition to providing lunch in the fellowship hall, we will be delivering meals to Ecumenical Ministries Meals on Wheels clients, our Community Cafe' homebound, law enforcement serving Fairhope, Daphne, and Spanish Fort, as well as those working in gas stations on Thanksgiving.


