FROM PASTOR MICHAEL

Holding Christmas Together

"He is before all things, and in him all things hold together." – Colossians 1:17

More than any other season, Advent fills my heart with so many things that I wonder it does not bust right out of my chest. I'm filled with memories of Christmases past; I'm filled with hope and excitement for the coming New Year. I love the crowds of the Fairhope Tree lighting and Christmas parties, but I also long for silent nights, for a moment where everything feels calm and bright. Maybe you sometimes feel the strain of trying to "hold Christmas together." We work hard to keep traditions alive, manage gatherings, navigate griefs, and search for joy. But the miracle of the Christmas has never been about how we learned to hold everything in place. Instead, this is the season to discover how God holds us together, even when we cannot.

This Advent, we'll begin a new sermon series titled "Holding Christmas Together," an invitation to rediscover the mystery at the heart of our faith. Scripture often uses the word *mystery* to describe truths that cannot be solved, deduced, or proven—realities we only know because God has revealed them. Whenever we take communion, we announce the mystery of faith. "Christ has died; Christ is risen; Christ will come again." No detective work can uncover this. No scientific formula can explain it. We can only receive it as gift.

There is another mystery at the heart of Christmas: the mystery of the Incarnation. In the birth of Jesus Christ, God became fully human while remaining fully divine. How does that work? We will never figure it out. But we can celebrate it, and we can trust that because "The Word became flesh and moved into our neighborhood" (John 1:14), that God is holding together all the things that we cannot.

The worship historian Lester Ruth says you can always tell a Methodist hymn because it will include a mystery, something we cannot explain but can only celebrate. Charles Wesley, one of the great poets of the Christian tradition, loved paradox—those surprising pairings of truth that sit side by side, refusing to be squeezed into tidy explanations. While some theologies describe God in superlative terms (bigger, better, stronger), Wesley was captivated by God's beautiful contradictions:

- God's kingdom is already and not yet here.
- God is exalted in glory yet revealed most clearly in humility.
- Christ is entirely everywhere.

These paradoxes don't cancel each other out; instead, they reveal the kind of God who can hold all things together. These paradoxes give us hope that God will meet us in the places where our own lives feel torn or unresolved. The Gospel meets us there, not with easy answers but with a Savior who binds together the frayed edges of our lives.

Even when we cannot hold everything together, Christ does. And in the mystery of Christmas–already come, not yet complete–we find strength, wonder, and hope.

And as we prepare for this season, I want to offer a special thank you to the members of our worship design team and altar guild, who put such thought and creativity into our worship throughout the year. Pam Vincent, Katie Robertson, Tom Hood, Jamie Waldhour, Jeff White, Shea White and Pastor Kristen pour their hearts into every aspect of our worship together. How they make it all happen is a mystery to me; I'll never figure it out, but I celebrate them always!

"...You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength." Mark 12:30

These words from Jesus, echoing the Shema in Deuteronomy, remind us that loving God involves the whole of who we are. It is not a partial commitment. It is a way of life that draws in our emotions, our spirituality, our actions, and perhaps most surprisingly, our minds.

It is such an interesting and beautiful idea that we are called to love God with our minds. We use our minds every day to make decisions, solve problems, plan our schedules, and navigate the many responsibilities that fill our weeks. Jesus's command reminds us that those same minds are also places where love for God can grow. When we open Scripture, when we sit in a classroom or around a table, when a new idea challenges us or stretches us, we are practicing a real and essential form of devotion.

And in a world that often pits faith against thinking, Jesus brings them together. He invites us to bring our questions, our curiosity, and even our doubts into our relationship with him. Our minds were never meant to sit on the sidelines of faith. Loving God includes learning, wrestling, and wondering.

This fall, our adult discipleship ministries have lived this out so well. Dozens of people chose to invest their time and energy in a study or Sunday school class. You showed up ready to think deeply, to ask honest questions, and to pray with and for one another. What a gift to see our church family embody a whole-life love for God—heart, soul, mind, and strength.

If you were not plugged into a study, Sunday school class, or small group this fall, be on the lookout for opportunities coming in early 2026. And if you have ideas or interests you'd like to see offered, I would love to hear them.

A special word of gratitude to those who led our fall studies: Wanda Winfree and Martha Barricklow, Tony Caminiti, Emily Garner and Michelle Graham, Dr. Ann Pearson, and Rev. Michael Precht. Your leadership and care made this season possible.

Faith at the Kitchen Table (Advent Edition)

"These commandments that I give you today are to be on your hearts. Impress them on your children. Talk about them when you sit at home and when you walk along the road, when you lie down and when you get up." - Deuteronomy 6:6–7

"Mary treasured up all these things and pondered them in her heart." - Luke 2:19

"Taste and see that the Lord is good." - Psalm 34:8

Advent arrives not only in candlelight and carols, but in the ordinary places where we live-especially the kitchen table. God chose a home, a family, and a feed trough to cradle the Savior. That means the sacred doesn't wait for sanctuaries and stained glass; it sits down with us among cereal bowls, lunchboxes, and evening dishes.

Deuteronomy 6 pictures faith woven into daily rhythms: when you sit at home, when you walk, when you lie down, when you get up. Luke tells us Mary treasured and pondered the story of Jesus. Those two verbs, talk and ponder, describe Advent discipleship at the table: simple words spoken, quiet wonders held.

This month, let your table become a small Bethlehem-an ordinary place where Christ is welcomed. Try one or two gentle practices:

- One-Line Advent: Light a candle (any candle will do) before dinner and say, "Jesus, You are our light." Then ask, "Where did you notice God's kindness today?" Keep it brief; keep it joyful.
- Nativity Near the Napkins: Place a small nativity on the table. Let kids move the figures as you retell
 the story in your own words. Wonder together: How did the shepherds feel? What did Mary hold in her
 heart?
- **Gratitude & Giving:** Keep a mug of slips and pens. Each night name one gift received and one gift to give (a prayer, a chore, an encouragement). Drop them in as an offering of thanks.

For leaders, parents, grandparents, and friends, remember **kids learn the gospel in small, repeated moments.** They borrow our words, imitate our tone, and feel our reverence for God. When we laugh together, pray a sentence prayer, or forgive quickly at the table, we are telling the truth about Jesus: He is near, gentle, and good.

Success this season isn't a perfect plan but a **patient presence.** If dinner is noisy, God isn't worried; He was born into a barn, after all. If schedules get messy, whisper this grace: "We start again, because Jesus came for us." Advent is the story of a God who comes close-close enough to hear our table talk and bless it.

Prayer:

Emmanuel, draw near to our homes. Make our tables places of light, laughter, and holy conversation. Teach us to treasure and to talk, to notice Your presence in simple meals and simple prayers. Let every child, and every adult, taste and see that You are good. Amen.

Cancer Care Angels Shining the Light

"Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of lights, with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change." - James 1:17

In 2006 several women in the Fairhope community were being treated for different types of cancer. The ladies approached Dr. Ann Pearson with their idea of starting a cancer support group, and with her assistance, the Tough Dogs Cancer Support Group opened to the community. The group offers support, knowledge, and prayers. Every second and fourth Tuesday, the meetings are open to cancer patients and their caregivers. Over the past 19 years, the ministry has expanded to preparing comfort bags for patients receiving chemotherapy, providing gas cards for patients needing assistance, and children being treated in Mobile for cancer or sickle cell anemia.

Most recently, Mary Hodgkins was inspired to create a ministry that would provide financial assistance to those battling both cancer and financial difficulties. Hence, the birth of "Cancer Care Angels". The financial assistance grant includes expenses not covered by health insurance, such as pharmacy bills, cosmetic devices, nutritional supplements, co-pays, gas cards for travel to treatment, etc.

A team of five, Patti Hanafourde, Mary Hodgkins, Nancy LeBlanc, Mary Kathryn Metzger, Bud Walden under the direction of Dr. Ann Pearson, developed an application process for prospective recipients from the following local cancer centers: **Southern Cancer Center, Mitchell Cancer Institute, Infirmary Cancer Care in Fairhope, and USA Health Children's and Women's.**

The application process for recipients is thorough and requires documentation of a diagnosis and treatment program as well as the need for financial assistance, yet it is designed not to be overwhelming to the patient. The cancer center representatives work with the applicant in preparing the application.

Our goal in the infancy of this program is to provide a minimum of \$500 to one cancer patient in each facility twice a year. Prayerfully, we anticipate increasing the amount as more funds become available. Two applications were received in October, and the team was able to grant \$1,000 to the applicants. The next deadline for applications is April 15, and we anticipate many more applicants at that time. The burden of cancer treatments on someone already financially strapped can be overwhelming and has the effect of having to make the choice of continuing treatment or supporting a family.

The Soundtrack of Christmas

Every year around this time, the world gets a new soundtrack. You hear it in the grocery store aisles, in the car on the way to work, and drifting from speakers while you wait in line for coffee. It's everywheresometimes to the point that we hardly notice it anymore. But when you stop and really listen, there's something remarkable about the way the music of Christmas works on us. Even in a season that can feel busy or stressful, a familiar carol has this gentle way of grounding us, reminding us of a story we know by heart but still need to hear again: God came close. God stepped into our world. God arrived among us in the most unexpected way.

In worship, these songs do even more. They shape our hearts. They draw us into the mystery of the Incarnation before we've even opened a Bible or lit a candle. Think about "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel"that longing built into every note. Or the quiet humility of "Silent Night," where the whole sanctuary seems to breathe in unison. Or "Joy to the World," which reminds us that Christmas isn't just nostalgia; it's anouncement. When we sing these songs together, we aren't just revisiting memories. We're participating in a story that keeps unfolding. The music helps us step into hope, peace, joy, and lovesometimes even when we don't feel those things on our own.

What's beautiful is that the soundtrack doesn't stay in the sanctuary. It follows us home and hums its way into our days. Sometimes it surfaces at just the right moment-a lyric that pops into your head when you least expect it, nudging you toward gratitude or reminding you of God's nearness. And maybe that's the real gift of this season's music: it keeps preaching to us long after the service ends. It invites us to notice the melody of God's presence woven into the ordinary moments-wrapping gifts, driving through traffic, sitting quietly at the end of a long day.

So this Christmas, don't rush past the songs you've heard a thousand times. Let them slow you down. Let them speak to you. Let them draw you back to the heart of why we celebrate at all. The soundtrack of Christmas isn't just background noise-it's an invitation to worship, to remember, and to rejoice that Christ is still singing hope into our world.

Christian Life Center Temporary Closure for Improvements

COMMITTEE REPORTS

TRUSTEES Submitted by Jennifer Jones

"THANK YOU!" from Pastor Barry and the congregation of Fairhope Church of God in Christ. Our response: "It's what neighbors do!" The Fairhope Church of God in Christ has been meeting for prayer and worship in Wesley Hall since September while they make plans for replacing their church building which developed unsafe structural issues. Leaning on one another during tough times is one of the many blessings we have as members of the family of God. Well done, church!

At our November meeting, the Trustees evaluated a proposal from a local waterproofing company to repair and seal the masonry of the bell tower as well as additional walls on the Sanctuary building and Education Building. Additionally, the proposal includes re-caulking around windows and at joints. The trustees have a prioritized list of the walls most in need of repair and will endeavor to include as many of those walls in the scope as funds will allow.

In 2026, we will review our policies guiding the use of our facilities by outside groups. One of the hallmarks of our church is that we open our doors to the community, and we want to continue to do so in a way that is safe and sustainable.

FINANCE Submitted by Allen Mitchell

Our financial position is good as of the end of October. Our income is a little ahead of last year, and we are on track to finish the year with a slight surplus. Although we are meeting our annual operating expenses, we are behind on scheduled maintenance of our buildings.

We are at the end of the expected life of several of our air conditioning units, and we have additional expected roof and flooring expenses. The Board of Stewards approved our recommendation to conduct a capital campaign in the Spring to pay off our existing mortgage. The payments that we have making on the mortgage will then be able to cover the ongoing repairs and replacements.

Our current Stewardship Campaign is going well. We are in line with the pledged amount for last year. We do, however, need to increase our budgeted expenses for 2026, so we are hoping for an increase in giving. If you have not submitted your 2026 pledge, please do so as soon as possible so that we can finalize our plans for next year.

The additional detailed reporting is now in place. One of those reports enables the Finance Committee to better track the funds that flow outside the budget, primarily designated giving. Another new report is the Comparative Balance Sheet. This report lets us compare the current month and year-to-date with the same period last year. This report does away with seasonality and lets us know how we are doing vs last year.

We are still anticipating additional funds from the IRS for the Employee Retention Credits (ERC) for which the church made application several years ago. We have received the funds for one calendar quarter but still have several quarters outstanding

The Finance Committee wants to again thank the members for their faithful giving.


