FROM PASTOR MICHAEL

Sometimes we can't talk about the Good News without talking about "the news," and no topic is more prevalent in our news than the ever-changing technologies of algorithms, artificial intelligence, and the computers we carry and wear every day.

Our culture's conversation about technology has moved beyond lifehacks and how-to tips. The most pressing questions we now ask about technology are existential—and even spiritual—in nature. Will technology take our jobs? How do we raise children in a world that seems to change faster than we can understand it? What does truth mean when information is endless but trust feels scarce?

These questions reveal something important: we cannot navigate this moment simply by memorizing rules or mastering the latest apps. Technology evolves far faster than any set of guidelines we could write. What we need instead is something older, deeper, and more durable. We need wisdom.

Wisdom is not about having all the answers. It is about learning how to do the right thing in unprecedented conditions. Wisdom forms our character, shapes our habits, and trains us to discern what is good when the path forward is unclear. That is good news for the church, because cultivating wisdom has always been at the heart of who we are.

The Bible itself is, at its core, a wisdom book. Scripture does more than give us information; it forms us. Through stories, commandments, poetry, and parables, God shapes us into people who can live faithfully amid complexity and change. In our upcoming worship series, *Authentic Intelligence*, we will explore how Scripture mentors us in acquiring wisdom for a technological age, forming our character so we can discern what is truly good and how to pursue it together.

Importantly, this series is not rooted in fear. We are not here to scaremonger or reject the modern world. Instead, our hope is to offer a faithful and empowering vision for navigating change with constancy, courage, and virtue. Over the first four weeks, we will focus on the ancient "cardinal virtues," habits of life that help us respond wisely in uncertain times. In the final sermon, we will celebrate the theological virtues of faith, hope, and love—gifts that will remain essential to our lives when everything else has become obsolete.

In many ways, this is a conversation Fairhope United Methodist Church is already putting into practice. We nurture wisdom every time we gather for worship and open ourselves to God's transforming Word. We practice wisdom in Sunday school classes, small groups, and Bible studies where questions are welcomed and faith is deepened in community. We encounter wisdom through intergenerational relationships, where experience and curiosity meet, and through acts of service that help us love our neighbors thoughtfully and well. Wisdom is not something we add on; it is something God is already cultivating among us.

This season also invites us to deepen that work through *Discovery* on January 23-25 as our older youth pass on their wisdom to our junior high students, and the entire church. *Discovery* is a perfect example of what it means to seek wisdom by choosing formation over reaction in our spiritual growth.

We are especially grateful that this season of wisdom-seeking will be marked by a unique opportunity in worship. On February 1, we will welcome Bishop Jonathan Holston to Fairhope UMC. His presence reminds us that we are part of something larger than ourselves, a connectional church seeking God's wisdom together across communities and generations.

In a world overflowing with information, wisdom remains God's gracious gift to guide us. We invite you to lean into this season with curiosity, hope, and trust, confident that the Spirit who has guided the church for centuries is still at work, forming us for faithful living today.

In John 1:39, Jesus extends one of the simplest invitations in Scripture: "Come and See."

Jesus says this to two disciples who had first been following John the Baptist. They've just heard John point to Jesus and call him the Lamb of God, and their curiosity is stirred. They begin trailing behind Jesus, not with confidence, but with tentative steps, unsure of what they're getting into and still trying to figure out who Jesus really is. When Jesus turns and sees them, he doesn't question their motives or test their readiness. He doesn't give them a lecture or a list of expectations about discipleship. He doesn't ask them to prove anything. He simply invites them to come closer. Come and see. Come spend time. Come as you are.

It is an invitation that creates space. Space to ask questions. Space to belong before everything makes sense.

Christian hospitality begins the same way. It's not about polished presentations or perfect plans; it's about helping people feel seen, known, and loved. It's the ministry of saying, "There's room for you here." When we practice that kind of hospitality, we reflect the heart of Jesus: the One who invites people to come and see what a life of faith is all about.

In that same spirit, we want to create a space where people can come and see who we are, meet one another, and feel at home. On January 15, we will host a Welcome Dinner for new members and for visitors who have been worshiping with us and would like to learn more about our community before taking the next step. Member Cheri Forte shares her experience below:

"The dinner is designed to enlighten new members on ways to become involved in the life of the church while socializing with other new members and getting to know our staff. If you are contemplating joining this dinner is a great next step."

BEGIN AGAIN: A NEW YEAR WITH JESUS

Bible Words

“God’s love never ends... **His mercies are new every morning.**” (Lamentations 3:22–23)

“**Teach us to number our days** so we become wise.” (Psalm 90:12)

“**Forgetting what is behind**, I press on toward Jesus.” (Philippians 3:13–14)

A new year is like opening a fresh box of crayons ... so many colors and chances to try again! God doesn't ask us to be perfect. He promises new mercy every morning. That means when we mess up, we can tell the truth, ask for help, and begin again with Him.

Psalm 90 says to “number our days.” That means our time matters. God can use normal moments like breakfast, car rides, or even bedtime, to grow our hearts. We don't need big, fancy plans. We need small, loving habits we do again and again.

Here are simple family rhythms for January:

- **Blessing at the Door:** Put a hand on a shoulder and say, “God loves you and goes with you today.” Kids can bless parents too!
- **Verse of the Week:** Write one short verse on a card. Read it at the table. Ask, “What word do you notice?”
- **Sorry & Start Over:** When voices get loud, try: “I’m sorry for my words. Let’s start again.” Then take a deep breath together.
- **One Small Help:** Choose one quiet gift of love: hold the door, sit by a new kid, return the cart, feed the pet without being asked.
- **Sabbath Snack:** Pick a tiny time to rest each week. It could be tea and a story, a device-free walk, or singing one song to Jesus. Rest says, “God is in charge; we can breathe.”

Families, here's good news: Jesus isn't waiting at the finish line. He walks with you right now - on the playground, at practice, in your room, at church. When you feel proud, thank Him. When you feel worried, tell Him. When you make a mistake, remember His mercy is new this morning and the next one too.

Parents and grandparents, your steady presence is powerful. Your calm tone, quick forgiveness, and gentle prayers teach the gospel louder than any speech. Keep it simple. Keep it kind. Keep it going.

Family Prayer:

Jesus, thank You for new mercies and a new year. Teach our family to use our days wisely. Help us bless, read Your Word, say sorry, help others, and rest with You. When we mess up, remind us we can begin again because You love us. Lead us this year, one small step at a time. Amen.

A devotional is given each Tuesday at Country Place Senior Living with 15 residents attending weekly.

Durable Medical Loan Closet

Over 225 pieces of equipment have been loaned out this year. They have also supplied adult diapers, nutrition drinks as well as other items to home health organizations.

Knit/Crochet for a Purpose

Supports ministries within the church and community. The team has created 308 items including blankets, shawls, lap robes, chemo hats, pillows, scarves, crosses.

Tough Dogs/Tough Pups Cancer Care

This group has provided support and comfort to adults and children with cancer and sickle cell anemia at Baldwin and Mobile cancer centers.



365 Adult & Child Comfort Bags were assembled and given out in 2025. 10 gas cards were distributed to USA Hope Center cancer patients. 2 grants were awarded to individuals going through cancer treatments.

Listening for God's Voice Between the Notes

Music has a unique way of inviting us into worship beyond words. Through melody, harmony, and rhythm, our hearts are opened to prayer and reflection in ways that spoken language alone often cannot accomplish. In worship, music creates space for attentiveness, reminding us that praise is not a one-way offering, but a holy conversation in which God speaks and we respond.

Scripture reminds us that God's voice is often heard in unexpected places. When Elijah encountered the Lord, it was not in the wind, earthquake, or fire, but in the sound of sheer silence. Music ministry teaches us a similar lesson. The rests between phrases, the quiet after a final chord, and even the freedom found in jazz improvisation can become sacred moments of listening. As we prepare for a special jazz service in the coming weeks, we are invited to experience how God's presence can be revealed through many musical expressions and styles.

Many opportunities exist in the coming year to be part of this shared ministry of listening and praise. Whether through Chancel Choir, Children's Choir, Praise Team, Handbells, or Youth Ensemble, each group offers a way to serve God and the church using the gifts we have been given. No matter the ensemble or style, every offering helps shape worship and encourages the congregation to listen more deeply for God's voice. As we gather week by week, may we bring both our voices and our hearts, trusting that God continues to meet us—often most clearly—between the notes.

Over the course of a game day or game week, more than 400 family members step onto our campus, turning each week into a vibrant gathering point for connection and community.

Every practice and game is an opportunity to grow both athletically and spiritually.

I want to express my deepest gratitude to everyone who supported our Christmas Outreach this year! Together, we were able to provide Christmas gifts to over **120** children and **20** elderly individuals in our community. Our “Angels” came from various locations, including Foley, Fairhope, Barnwell, and Baldwin Family Village. They ranged in age from 3 months old to over 70 years old. A special thank you goes to our youth and SWIFT programs for their efforts in shopping for several of our “Angels.”

In December, a small group of college students served in Costa Rica, December 14-18. We had the privilege of serving alongside the same ministry we serve in May. The Amor en la Calle ministry serves over **1700** “Angels” during the Christmas season. They organize Christmas parties in rural areas of Costa Rica and extend their reach into Nicaragua. Because of your generous support, we were also able to assist “Angels” in Costa Rica and on the Nicaraguan border by providing clothing to over **20** children. Additionally, the team prepared numerous bags of candy to be distributed.

To conclude our SNAP outreach, food boxes, along with turkeys and hams, were given to **28** families at Summerdale Elementary School. Furthermore, **45** \$50 gift cards were provided to families in need at Fairhope West Elementary.

The list goes on and on! I am reminded of Luke 12:48, which states, “To whom much was given, much will be required.” The Lord has given us so much and therefore, He has trusted us to do the same for others. This congregation continues to answer the call to meet the needs of others. We are incredibly grateful for the selfless hearts of this church family!

JANUARY 17TH & 18TH!




COMMITTEE REPORTS

TRUSTEES

If, during that rainy Sunday morning in early December, you felt a drop of water hit your head as you walked from the Breezeway, under the Bell Tower, and into the Sanctuary or took the back entrance into the Choir Loft, that's not because of a roof leak. The rain water is seeping through the brick of the Bell Tower and the adjacent walls. Thankfully, our Trustees already had a repair plan underway. At our November meeting, the Board of Trustees approved another phase of masonry repair and weatherization that will include the Bell Tower, the Conference Room/Offices, the east and west walls of the Sanctuary, and the walls on both sides of the Breezeway. This work is scheduled to begin in mid-February.

Also, the Trustees scheduled a church-wide work day for the afternoon of Sunday, March 1st. There will be tasks, big and small, all over our church buildings and grounds. As the date gets closer, please be on the lookout for sign-ups. Many hands make the work light!

Thanks to sustaining pledges and generous gifts, we were able to include salary increases for our staff—providing appropriate raises for the first time in several years. In addition, all staff received love offering bonuses, for which the Staff-Parish Relations Committee is deeply grateful. We are blessed with a hard-working, dedicated staff, and we give thanks for the generosity that makes this support possible.

FINANCE

The good news for December is that we received over \$300,000 from the IRS for our Employee Retention Credits that we filed for during COVID. Last year we received \$50,000, and we will probably receive an additional \$80,000 in 2026 to complete our request.

As reported last month, our financial position is good as of the end of October. Our income is a little ahead of last year, and we are on track to finish the year with a slight surplus. We are slightly ahead of projected receipts and well under projected spending.

If you have not submitted your 2026 pledge, please do so as soon as possible so that we can finalize our plans for next year. We have received more pledge dollars with a fewer number of pledges. We would welcome additional pledges to help meet our proposed increase in spending. The Board of Stewards approved the Finance Committee recommended 2026 Budget. That budget called for deficit spending in the amount of \$149,000 to make urgent repairs to our building. We previously had enough in reserves to cover the deficit, but now, with the ERC funds, we will have an even larger reserve going into 2026.

We look forward to our 2026 Capital Campaign to retire our debt in order to be able to fund needed repairs and replacements on our buildings over the next ten years.

As always the Finance Committee is appreciative of the faithful giving of our members.
