JOURNEYING TOGETHER
TO THE CROSS THIS LENT

FROM PASTOR MICHAEL

By now, I hope you've heard the news: "The Bishop is coming to visit!"

Bishop Holston's highest possible endorsement comes from my eldest daughter, Elsa. Elsa usually has a Sunday afternoon commitment for school or theater, and so she most often worships with the other Rev. Precht in our family, over in Mobile. But when Elsa saw that Bishop Holston is coming to preach at Fairhope, she said "Do NOT let me miss that. He is so great. I'll be up in time to drive over the bay and hear him at the 8:30 service; I promise. Just don't let me forget."

I'm delighted to welcome the kind of bishop who inspires a 16 year old to wake up even earlier for church, and whether you worship early or late, you will know we are blessed to have him here. You may also have questions as we get ready for Sunday, most importantly: "What's a Bishop?"

The English word "bishop" comes from the Greek word *episkopos*, (sometimes translated as "overseer," especially when translated churches without bishops!). *Episkopos* shares a root with other Greek words that all signify visitation, inspection, and care. So, an *episkopos* is someone who visits, and while visiting, the *episkopos* checks in.

As the Gospel spread in the second and third generations of the church, many regions included more congregations than any *episkopos* could visit, so the *episkopos* also became responsible for laying hands on *presbyteroi* ("elders" or "presiders over the assembly") and sending them to preach the Good News in the places a bishop could visit less and less often. 2000 years later, through various twists and turns of language, we United Methodists commonly use the word "bishop" in place of *episkopos*, and "pastors" in place of *presbyteroi*.[^]

Throughout history, Christians (like most people) have sometimes resented listening to or depending upon someone they don't see every day. And throughout history, the episcopacy (that is, the office of the bishop) has sometimes misused its power (like in any human system). So, at various points in Christian history, some churches have decided the biblical words *episkopos* and *presbyteros* are really just two different words for the same thing, and those churches have decided "We don't need no stinkin' bishops!" Those churches say every pastor is fulfilling the Biblical role of an *episkopos* and *presbyteros*.

However, the Anglican, Lutheran, Methodist, Orthodox, Roman Catholic, and (obviously) the Episcopal traditions still hold the more historic reading of scripture, distinguishing between bishops and elders (many, but not all, Pentecostal traditions have bishops as well). Throughout the Church's history, most Christians have had a bishop, and even today most Christians around the world do, too.

What those bishops actually do varies a bit. In nearly every tradition, bishops do the work of "making" new pastors; the bishop is the one who lays hands on new pastors and gives them their commission.

In the Roman Catholic and Orthodox traditions, bishops also have a significant role in setting the doctrine—the officially supported interpretations of scripture—of their Churches. The United Methodist Church is more democratically organized, so our doctrines can only be established by the General Conference, in which the bishops do not even have a vote.

United Methodist bishops have less authority over teaching and doctrine than other traditions, but more authority than almost any other bishops over who teaches in a United Methodist pulpit. This comes from our missional and frontier history. In the early days of the Methodist movement, our bishops noticed that preachers sometimes chose comfort over the mission (can you imagine!). Especially in America, where people kept moving around and pushing the frontiers, someone needed to make sure the Gospel went out to meet them. So, the

Methodist bishops became responsible for sending pastors to wherever they were most needed. To this day, every United Methodist pastor vows to go where the bishop sends us, whenever they send us. Over the years, this has meant there are Methodist churches in all kinds of places that other denominations overlook. For instance, at my most recent count, Bishop Holston oversees about 500 churches (with the help of his superintendents). By comparison, the local Roman Catholic Bishop oversees about 50 churches, and the local Episcopal bishop oversees about 60.

And even though a United Methodist bishop rarely has time to do the kind of teaching that's expected of other bishops, there are moments when our bishops have a unique role in applying our understanding of scripture to the news of the day. A bishop hears from every corner of their conference, and collectively, the Council of Bishops means that any United Methodist is only 5 degrees of separation (closer than Kevin Bacon!) from every United Methodist in the world. As Paul reminds us, "when one part of the body suffers, we all suffer with them" (I Corinthians 12:26). For that reason, a bishop will often write a brief letter in response to events within their region, or collaborate with the Council of Bishops in explaining how our Book of Discipline and Social Principles can apply the scriptures to the events of the day.

Just this very week, the Council of Bishops released a statement on the recent violence in Minnesota, to which Bishop Holston added his own thoughts

I had a few thoughts of my own—more prayerful and less doctrinal—that I shared at michaelprecht.com, if you wonder (as I did) how to reconcile the goodness of our Discovery Weekend with the brokenness that kept breaking in through news alerts on Saturday. In a world of division continues to become violence, the world needs us to love *boldly, casting the light of Jesus into the world.*

“Yet even now, says the LORD, return to me with all your heart, with fasting, with weeping, and with mourning; rend your hearts and not your clothing. Return to the LORD your God, for he is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, abounding in steadfast love, and relenting from punishment.” Joel 2:12-13

February 18, 2026 begins one of the holiest seasons of the Christian year. Lent is a gift of forty days to slow down, listen closely, and walk intentionally with Jesus on the road that leads to the cross. Lent is not an invitation to get it all right, or to prove our faithfulness, but an invitation to return.

Joel’s words remind us that God meets us right where we are, even now, with everything we carry. Whether our hearts feel tired, distracted, hopeful, or unsure, God is already present. As Lent approaches, we are invited to pause, set our intentions, and reflect on what it might look like to return to God. *What do I need to release? How do I hope to grow? Where is God inviting me into deeper trust, repentance, and hope?*

This season is not about doing more just to stay busy, but about making space. Space for prayer. Space for reflection. Space for God to meet us as we are. As we begin this journey together, I invite you to consider how you will mark these forty days as holy and how you will walk alongside Christ and one another.

In addition to our Sunday morning worship services, there are many ways to engage in our shared Lenten journey this year at Fairhope UMC:

- On Ash Wednesday, February 18, we will offer ashes at the pier at 4:00 p.m. and gather for worship in the sanctuary at 6:00 pm.
- Throughout the season, we will also share a Lenten devotional book made up of 40 devotions written by 40 volunteers from all ages and stages of life. This collection has been a gift to me, and I believe it will be a gift to you as well. The devotionals will be available in print and emailed daily throughout Lent.
- Lastly, I will be leading a five week Lenten Bible study on, *Remember: God’s Covenants and the Cross*, on Wednesday at 6:00 pm beginning February 25. If you would like to register, please use the QR code below!

Wherever you find yourself as Lent begins, know that this is a journey we take together. My prayer is that these forty days draw us closer to Jesus and prepare our hearts to receive the joy of resurrection. Grace and peace,

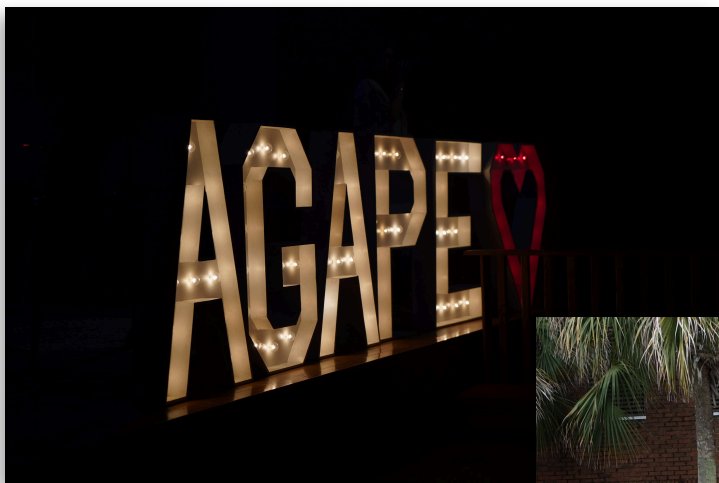

Christian Faith and the Art of Jazz

From its earliest beginnings, jazz has carried the echoes of Christian faith. Born in African American communities shaped by Scripture, spirituals, and the rhythms of worship, jazz emerged as a musical language of both lament and hope. The blues notes, call-and-response patterns, and improvisational freedom found in jazz reflect the lived faith of people who trusted God amid hardship. Much like the Psalms, jazz has always made room for honest emotion—joy, sorrow, repentance, and praise—held together by a deep confidence in God’s sustaining grace.

Across the decades, many jazz musicians have openly drawn on their Christian convictions. Duke Ellington famously described jazz as “my religion,” composing sacred works that brought worship into concert halls. Artists such as Mary Lou Williams, John Coltrane, and later figures like Wynton Marsalis explored themes of redemption, prayer, and divine order through their music. Improvisation itself mirrors a life of faith—listening closely, responding faithfully, and trusting the Spirit’s movement in the moment rather than rigidly following a script.

As we gather for Jazz Sunday, we celebrate more than a musical style; we honor a testimony of faith woven into sound. Jazz reminds us that God can be glorified through creativity, cultural expression, and communal joy. I wish to give special thanks to our wizard of the keys, John Richardson, whose gifts help lead us in joyful praise, as well as to the many local musicians who share their talents with generosity and heart. In their music, we glimpse the beauty of discipleship—rooted in tradition, alive with the Spirit, and offered freely to the glory of God.

CHILDREN'S MINISTRIES

What Children Have Taught Me

When people ask what I've learned from working in children's ministry, I'm tempted to talk about curriculum, programming, or leadership lessons. But the truth is, the most important things I've learned didn't come from books, conferences, or meetings. They came from the children themselves.

Children have taught me how to wonder again. They ask the kinds of questions adults often stop asking. Questions without an agenda or a need to sound smart. "Why does God love us so much?" "How does Jesus hear everyone at once?" "Will my dog be in heaven?" Their curiosity reminded me that faith doesn't begin with certainty. It begins with awe and wonder.

Children have taught me that belonging comes before understanding. Long before a child can explain theology or recite a creed, they know whether they are safe, seen, and loved. They need to know if they matter. I watched children flourish simply because someone remembered their name, saved them a seat, or noticed when they were missing. Again and again, they have shown me that love is the soil where faith grows.

Children have taught me how to be brave in honesty. They are remarkably unafraid to name big feelings - joy, fear, grief, excitement - all in the same breath. They don't pretend everything is fine when it isn't. In their openness, I have seen simple prayers as they are meant to be: real, unfiltered, and deeply trusting that God can handle whatever we bring.

As I write this, my time serving as Children's Director is coming to an end - not along a path I would have chosen, but one I am trusting God to hold with care. While this goodbye carries an emotional weight, it also carries deep gratitude: for the children who have trusted me, the families who have partnered alongside me, and the volunteers who have shown up week after week with love and faithfulness.

One last thing that your children have also taught me that joy is holy work. Laughter during a game, singing at the top of their lungs, movement, mess, and creativity—these are not distractions from faith formation. They are part of it. Children remind me that worship doesn't have to be stiff to be sacred.

Scripture reminds us, "Let the children come to me... for it is to such as these that the kingdom of God belongs" (Mark 10:14). My prayer is that we never stop learning from the faith, courage, and wonder of our children and that we continue to create spaces where they know, without question, that they belong to God. May we find those godly moments where joy, wonder, and faith come together in such a way as to plant seeds that will forever impact our children.
