2025 Florida United Methodist Church Annual Conference

The theme of the 2025 Florida United Methodist Church Annual Conference was "Awakened to Grace" (Ephesians 2:8-9.)

It was exciting to see Pastors and Laity—people of all ages and diverse backgrounds from across our state—gather in Lakeland to 'awaken to grace' and connect, participate in training, Communion and worship opportunities, and conduct the business of the Annual meeting.

Many ministries and initiatives including Diversity, Rising Hope, Campus ministries, Zoe Empowerment, Disaster Relief, and our Conference goal of trying to complete 5,000 Buckets of Hope were celebrated. I attended a prayer vigil (picture below) on Anti-Racism and a beautiful Visio Divina prayer experience, which I would love to share at Trinity in a small group setting.


As part of Conference, I attended a grant writing workshop and gained insights from the speaker who said that charitable foundations do not always want to give grants to religious groups because "we might try to preach to them!" (And we might!) She noted that grants are excellent, but sometimes a church has congregational members with contacts in the community that may help us to gain access more easily to certain resources. An example given was of a church trying unsuccessfully to get community members to come to their weekly prayer session. A member of the church, who had connections with McDonalds, arranged for a local McDonalds to provide free food each week so people came to eat and pray at their church. (We of course have Carroll Hatfield whose connections with Publix allows us to give the breads they donate to the needy.) I wondered if we had more members with contacts that might help us pursue other ministries.



Every 3rd Saturday—no matter the weather—a group of Trinity volunteers stands in the parking lot and accepts donation of non-perishables. We box them and deliver to Church of the Palms Food Pantry and/or Remnant Café.

Both of these organizations have expressed gratitude for the faithful donations every month.

Next Community Food Collection will be on Saturday, July 19th, 9—10:30 am, Trinity Parking Lot. Come by to help sort and pack, to drop off nonperishables, or just say Hi!

Nonperishables for the Food Pantry or hygiene items for Remnant Café can be dropped off at the Church on Sundays or in Haley Hall during the week.



BUCKETS OF HOPE

As often happens, Trinity members and friends were abundantly generous when asked to supply the items need for the Flood Buckets for the Florida Conference. We committed to building 5. We've almost completed a total of 10! Join us as we assemble the buckets between worship services on July 13th

The following is excerpts from Disaster Response Coordinator Trish Warren's speech at the Annual Conference, which highlighted the vital, life-affirming work that the volunteers provide in times of despair and loss.

"This is the Church in action. This is hope, rebuilding what was broken. And this is why we're here: to stand in the gap, to remind families they are not forgotten and to be living proof that God is with us—even in the storm," she said. "That is our calling. That is our covenant." There is no "off-season" for the Disaster Response Ministry in The

Florida Conference of The United Methodist Church. Between wildfires, tornadoes, severe thunderstorms that cause flooding, and, of course, hurricanes, the response team must always be prepared to respond where Floridians are in need.

And if this hurricane season is anything like last year's, the need could be great. ERTs are often first on the scene, stepping into chaos with compassion and resolve. Wearing their iconic lime green shirts, ERTs bring a powerful reminder that the Church is present even in the most broken places," Warren said.

"In 2025, we've trained over 50 participants through nine sessions, and we'll continue equipping churches to respond. ERTs are often the first face of recovery and the first reminder to survivors that they are not alone." Last year, more than 500 Early Response Teams and Disaster Recovery Ministry volunteers removed debris, tarped roofs, cleaned out flooded homes, and offered invaluable emotional and spiritual support. It's been a journey of resilience, collaboration, and commitment to rebuilding lives and communities," she said.

One thing everyone can get involved with is the **Buckets of Hope** Challenge. It's a partnership between the **Disaster Recovery Ministry and the Creation Care team**.

The goal is to fill 5,000 5-gallon buckets with emergency supplies, including liquid laundry detergent, household cleaners, dish soap, air freshener, insect repellent, cleaning tools, reusable wipes and towels, trash bags, dust masks, and gloves.

Here's what I need you to understand: Disaster recovery is not a side project or a seasonal ministry. It is part of the Church's call to be the hands and feet of Christ. Long after the cameras are gone and the headlines fade, this ministry continues—quietly, faithfully—walking alongside survivors for the long haul. This is holy work. And it's not possible without every one of us," Warren said.

"Disasters don't discriminate, but recovery often does. That's where the Church steps in. We bring justice to the places that are overlooked. We bring mercy to the ones forgotten. We bring hope where despair had moved in. And when we do this together, in the name of Jesus, lives are transformed."

Inhabit the Garden Centering Prayer Group

The Garden of Hope is a place for prayer in all seasons. The Inhabit the Garden Centering Prayer Groups gathers each Friday morning from 8:30 to 9:30 AM. July is our anniversary month as we began praying together in this location in July 2020, so we are celebrating our fifth anniversary.

You may remember that in July 2020 we were in the early months of the Covid-19 pandemic. Our vision was to gather in person while abiding by all public health guidelines. The Trustees of Trinity were very accommodating in welcoming our group, and we continue to be grateful for their generosity.

This group has evolved into a very ecumenical gathering. At last count we had six denominations represented. Together we have a shared intention to consent to God's presence and action within. As Christians we believe that our prayer of silence is rooted in the indwelling Trinity. In our silence our focus is the self-emptying love of Jesus. At its best our silence is not a method of seeking consolations, though they may come, and neither is it a



time for figuring stuff out, though that may happen as well. At its most focused our shared silence is a method of letting go and surrendering to the love of God. We don't create this love. It is pure grace, a gift of God. And one of the gifts of the Holy Spirit is to recognize the beauty of God's love wherever it is expressed, even in the most unlikely places.



Florida Conference Study



This week Bishop Berlin has invited all United Methodists in the Florida Conference to be aware of how the proposed legislation currently being debated in Congress will negatively impact our siblings in Florida who especially rely on SNAP Benefits to alleviate hunger and

those who reply on Medicaid to have access to vital health care. These proposed cuts would have an especially severe effect on children, those living with disabilities, and senior citizens. We have been given resources and urged to be in touch with our Representatives and Senators about this vital issue.

During Lent, many of us learned how to do this through the Offering of Letters sponsored by Bread for the World. We are learning that the reality of hunger in our nation and internationally is a tenacious problem, but at the same time there is real hope. We do have both the capacity and the capability to end hunger. We need to be open to new ideas and strategies.

Toward this end, in July, The General Board of Church and Society of the United Methodist Church has invited us to join in their Summer 2025 Pages for Progress Book Study. Together we will read and discuss The Painful Truth About Hunger in America, diving deeper into the oftenoverlooked realities of food insecurity in the United States.



Blessing Kaene Empowerment Group, Kenya Report



Blessing Kaene Empowerment Group, Kenya

First Year Group Report as of January 2025

Group Income Projects/Activities

Merry-go-round: The group members initially agreed to contribute 100 ksh (.75 usd) during each meeting as a way to develop habiyts of saving. The money is either used to purchase a household item for members on a rotational basis or when there is great need in the family, they will give them the cash.

Table banking: In this project, members contribute 200 ksh (1.54 usd) at each meeting and lend it to participants at a 10% interest rate for a short tem, a rate that is more affordable than other financial institutions in their community. Members share the dividends at the end of each year. Currently they have 42,104 skh (\$325 usd) in the table bank.

Farming/Agricultural Projects: The group rents an acre of land on which they plant maize, beans, and cowpeas. Last season they harvested 302 kg of maize, 166 kg of beans, and 101 kg of cowpeas. Half of the harvest was shared for family consumption and half was sold. They used the proceeds to boost their table bank.

Community outreach: During the December holiday, the group held sessions in their local churches to sensitize other youths on drug and substance abuse.

^{*}Families often earn additional funds from their agricultural activities, but they are not considered businesses

Vocational training: 12 participants attended vocational training 4 in hairdressing, 3 mechanics, 4 tailoring, 1 welding. Zoe provide funds for 10 youth to be trained and the group members negotiated for an additional 2 youths to receive training.

Household Agricultural Activities: Before Zoe, the young families lacked food security and often had to miss meals. There were 4 families that attempted to plant crops, 7 had vegetable gardens, and 8 had a small number of livestock, but these efforts were not enough to support the families. Through Zoe, the youth received training and inputs of certified seeds and tools to harvest sufficient amounts of food for their families' consumption. The quality and quantity of meals for all families have improved and all 25 are now considered food secure eating 2 to 3 meals a day.

- All 25 households plant crops like maize, beans, pigeon peas, Irish potatoes, millet, bananas, and black beans. The harvest was good.
- All 25 households have kitchen gardens where they grow amaranth, spinach, cabbage, onions.
- 17 households are raising livestock like goats, sheep, chickens, pigs and rabbits.
