Rediscovering the Authentic Christ Reveals Your Authentic Self

We are on the precipice of change right here, right now. Accordingly, my M-B Type is ENFJ. Extrovert –

The Church model that was effective for ministry in the '60s, '70s, and '80s is long gone. I mean that we are no longer in the Age of Association. What was that? It was the reality that for a person to feel a sense of belonging to a community, they would have to interact on a weekly, bi-monthly, or monthly basis with the organization. We know, even if we hate to admit it, that in today's society, that is no longer the case. There are so many competing things that draw our attention away from something that we might find meaning in, especially the Church. Does that mean we should abandon everything we have done in the past? Absolutely not!

Nonetheless, we are in something new right now. We are in the Age of Authenticity. People want to experience an organization or a church as authentic. They want to come and be with people who are earnestly themselves. Whose struggles aren't hidden away, never spoken about, only kept in a box on a shelf. Many people want to wade in the muddy muck of the shoreline because that's where people are sometimes. It's okay to be there. If you are there, I want to wade there with you, just like Christ is doing! We don't always get to swim in the crystal-clear blue part of the ocean.

So, let me be a little authentic with you. As a millennial, few things make me angrier than when someone is nice to my face, acts like nothing is wrong, but talks behind my back. I want the authentic you. Not the face mask you are trying to wear. One way people better understand themselves is by taking verified and validated tests like the Meyers-Briggs Personality Test.

Accordingly, my M-B Type is ENFJ. Extrovert – Intuitive – Feeling – Judging – which, according to data collected by the Lutheran Alban Institute, ENFJ is the most common of the 16 Personality Type combinations for pastors.

A person who is an ENFJ is also known as the Protagonist. It is said that ENFJs take great pleasure in leading and guiding others to be the best versions of themselves. Offering assistance, advice, and a listening ear amid life's circumstances. Similarly, ENFJs tend to value authenticity highly, altruism, speaking up when something has happened unjustly to a person or group, and working diligently for the common good of all people. I share this because these truths about ENFJs are true about me.

The Advent Season will soon be upon us. It allows us to recall the story of God choosing to come among us authentically. Now, do not hear me saying that God had not authentically interacted with God's people before. God walked among Adam and Eve in the garden. God worked through Noah and his descendants during the Flood. God called Abraham and Sarah out of Ur to go to the Promised Land. God worked through Joseph. God called Moses and Aaron to lead God's people out of the bondage of slavery into freedom.

God led those people for forty years in the desert by a cloud in the day and a pillar of fire by night. The stories of God interacting authentically with the Chosen People could continue. But you understand my point.



What's so unique about this part of God interacting with humans is that God physically came to be among us. Through the power of the Holy Spirit, the Incarnation of the Word of God, Jesus Christ was born to the Theotokos, the "Mother of God," the Virgin Mary. Instead of working through a human being like the Lord had done with the prophets of old, God, in the Second Person of the Trinity, Jesus Christ came physically into our reality. Through Christ, the Lord took on our nature and our lot. A divine choice whereby Jesus Christ's humanness was now susceptible to all of the emotions and feelings of the human form. The Creator of the Universe had deigned to leave the Heavenly Courts to feel, touch, react, love, and care like us, who are the ones created.

"And how shall I describe this Birth to you? For this wonder fills me with astonishment. The Ancient of Days has become an infant. Christ, who sits upon the sublime and heavenly Throne, now lies in a manger. Who has broken the bonds of sinners, is now bound by an infant's band...taking my flesh, He gives me His Spirit, so Christ [is] bestowing and I [am] receiving." ----- St. Cyril of Alexandria (b. 376 – d. 444) ----

As Bishop Cyril of Alexandria, who presided at the Council of Ephesus in 431 A.D. (which affirmed the Nicene Creed), reminds us, Christ bestows, and we receive. Christ is the gift, and all God desires for us is to receive that holy and precious gift.

Rev. Dr. Martin Luther spoke frequently about receiving Christ as a precious gift. Where might we encounter the authentic Christ? Luther often said that the Bible is like "the manager that holds the Christ child." People are depicted kneeling around the manger, but it is out of reverence for the Word of God, Jesus Christ, who lies within. Likewise, we do not worship the Bible. We worship the precious gift of Christ that is revealed in and through the stories of the Bible.

Dear Church, I invited you, in this Advent Season of waiting for Christ to be born, to open up your Bible. Pick one of the Gospels and read the story of Jesus' birth, life, ministry, suffering, death, and resurrection again. If you start on Dec. 1st, reading a chapter a day, you will easily be done by Christmas Eve. After all, Mark is 16 chapters; John 21; Luke 24, and Matthew 28.

Along the way, listen for how Jesus authentically speaks and calls you into this incredible story. Listen for how Christ offers you the precious gift of his authentic self. Thus, when you arrive as your authentic self for worship on Christmas Eve, you will have prepared your heart, mind, body, and soul in such a way that the wonder and astonishment of Jesus Christ's birth may take on a new meaning. But until then, may your waiting be filled with hope, as the most precious gift of all will soon be offered freely to and for you, again.

Bethesda Council Update

Hello Bethesdians!

I hope you are well. Autumn is here, with some of Bethesda's biggest annual events. On October 4 the Stewardship Committee hosted another successful dinner that featured Bill and Deb Fennelly speaking about their own personal giving. Thanks to all of you who attended, and have already returned your pledge forms for next year.

Another successful Scandinavian Coffee brought a huge crowd through the doors of Bethesda on Saturday, Oct. 21. A big thank you to the Women's Ministry team for continuing this amazing tradition. It is Bethesda's biggest annual fundraiser.

Council members have received several inquiries about two items of consideration that have recently been discussed around Bethesda: the desire for a new outdoor digital sign, and the recently scaled down bulletin. The Council has discussed both questions at length in recent meetings. Here is a short report on both topics.

•Outdoor Digital Sign: We have a significant memorial gift that was earmarked for an outdoor digital sign. You can see an example of such a sign at the Northminster Presbyterian Church here in Ames. There are two primary considerations relating to Bethesda installing this type of sign. The first is design. Should we utilize the existing sign box and install a digital sign in it? Or should we go for an entirely new sign that would be double sided, positioned at a right angle to the street, allowing it to be read by passersby going in either direction. Whichever option is used, the new installation will have to comply with City signage rules. The second consideration is funding. While the bequest for the sign was certainly generous, it would only cover a fraction of the total cost, which is estimated

to be \$30,000 -\$40,000 or more. The current balance in the fund designated for the sign is \$10,220. Due to the lack of funding available for the project, the Council has decided to table the question until more funds become available.

•New Church Bulletin Design: The bulletin was downsized a few months ago. The intent was to reduce the amount of paper used, in order to be better stewards of our natural resources. The change reduced the cost and staff time required to produce the bulletin each week. The primary concern voiced to Council members is that the new layout does not include the order of service. In response the Council has asked that a new design be developed for the bulletin that would include the order of worship. Watch for the new bulletin format coming soon.

Also, we want to commend our incredible Facilities Ministry team for the bright new yellow lines that have been repainted on our parking lot. The job was done expeditiously and very economically. Thank you!

Lobo Family **Finds Home** in Ames

Tadeo (5), and Ana Paula
(2) all survived, by foot,
the Darien Gap--the
world's most dangerous
tropical forest pathway. It
combines natural terrain,
poisonous creatures,
and guerrilla murderers.



The 50 kilometers linking Panama and Columbia is the only Gap that still preventpletion of the Intercontinental Highway from Alaska to the tip of Chile. National church organizations (ELCA, UCC, and Episcopalians) helped the Lobo family prepare to cross into the U.S. legally and assisted with finding sponsors and housing.

The Lobo family arrived on June 9th in Ames at the bus terminal. The family was in temporary housing with an ASIP couple who spoke fluent Spanish. Now, the family is ready to move into a three-bedroom duplex their sponsor found. The family's new residence is about one block from the back of Meeker Elementary, where Tadeo is a kindergartener; he loves school so far, and Head Start is coming to the home once a week to meet with Ana Paula.

While Yennifer and Jose are learning conversational English with help from a few volunteers, we could use more. You do not have to speak Spanish to teach conversational English; our current helpers can help get you started. We have earbuds that will help with translation communication for anyone helping with the family as soon as we can figure them out.

Yennifer will be taking English classes at a later date, likely within the new year and will need transportation. Contact Diane Pierce with any questions. (515) 509-4326. dcf.pierce@gmail.com.


