

FROM OUR STUDENT AND CONNECTIONS PASTOR...

I think most of you reading this probably know this about me, but I grew up in a small town. When I say "small town" I mean for the first 16 years of my life, there were two stop lights in the entire town. When I was 16, we moved to another small town that only had one stop light in town. Growing up in such small towns, I missed out on certain amenities that people living in larger cities take for granted. For example, I was about 45 miles to the closest bowling alley. It was 27 miles up a two-lane highway to the closest McDonalds. It was about 50 minutes down a different two-lane highway to get to the closest movie theater. It was 53 minutes down yet another different two-lane highway when we went to Walmart.

But even without all these places (and so much more), let me tell you what we did have. We had 5 different gas stations. We had a Piggly Wiggly grocery store. We had two different fast-food restaurants, Wards and Bumpers. To this day, nothing beats a quarter pounder with cheese from Wards. Of course, as in every small town in Mississippi, there were a few different dollar stores. There was even a park with a playground. I remember playing on that playground and almost every time, we had to leave early due to either me or my brother getting injured on the metal slide or the merry-go-round. Basically, one would get on the merry-go-round while the other would spin it as fast as he could. After a couple minutes you either flew off or got sick due to dizziness. Looking back, I don't know how someone didn't die. However, I loved this playground. I remember having a birthday party there when I was young. We played on the playground, had cake and ice cream, and drank ourselves into a sugar induced coma with knock-off sodas from Fred's Dollar Store.

We didn't keep many sodas in our house growing up but when we did, it was either Cola (not Coke), Dr. Thunder (not Pepper), or Mt. Lightening (not Dew). We drank these because this is what was sold at Fred's and my mom always hated the "crowds" at the Piggly Wiggly. I put crowds in quotations because, remember, we lived in a town that had less that 1,000 people in it. It was a special treat when we had sodas but an even more special treat was when we would stay at Granny's house because she always had Coca Cola and Mt. Dew. Whenever I'd ask my mom about why we didn't get the real stuff, she always told me what we got was real, it cost less, and it basically tasted the same. The reason why I'm telling this story is because I can't help but think this is how many people view their walk with Christ. We settle for less than what Christ demands because "it costs less and is almost just as good." I love what Dietrich Bonhoeffer says on the subject of cheap grace. He says, "Cheap grace is the preaching of forgiveness without requiring repentance, baptism without church discipline, Communion without confession...Cheap grace is grace without discipleship, grace without the cross, grace without Jesus Christ, living and incarnate." Jesus demands our everything yet we are too often willing to settle for a watered down version of Christianity. Today, fully surrender yourself to Christ. Today, stop settling for less than what Jesus offers and demands of us.
