REFLECTION

Insanely Excessive Love

∼Father John Muir

Recently I was with my little dog Libby at a retreat center in the Arizona desert. I sat in a chair near a ravine filled with shrubs. Unbeknownst to me, Libby wandered down there and disappeared. Suddenly an animal's wild shriek erupted from the area. Without thinking, I bolted down into the ravine fully expecting to see coyotes, javelinas, or rattlesnakes. I didn't care. I desperately wanted to get Libby out of there, without any self -regard. Before I could face whatever danger lay hidden, my dog blissfully trotted out from an entirely different area, utterly unaware that I had (quite heroically) just placed my life on the line.

When the adrenaline wore off, I thought to myself: how far would I have been willing to go to save her? I don't know. But I do know, if I had literally died, my friends and family would have certainly thought me insane for dying for a dog. No offense, Libby.

How passionately Jesus wants us to know him and his willingness to die for us! This week he says, "I know my own and my own know me," and "I lay down my life for the sheep." Here we encounter an insanely excessive love for us. Christianity is a relationship and not simply a religion or ethical code. In Jesus, God rescues and saves us. He laid down his life for you and me and he has taken it up again. So often we are like Libby — blissfully ignorant of the reality of both our spiritual danger and his saving love. This Easter season, the risen Jesus calls us to be more conscious than ever before about his love. He never ceases to lay down his life for us.

Church HVAC Replacement

You may be wondering about the black pipes being installed in the north narthex. They are the supply and return lines for our new heating and cooling system in the church.

HVAC highlights

- Replaced aging boilers in the school with units that had the capacity (and then some) to also heat the church
- Four Church AC units have been limping along and must be replaced
- Four Church furnaces are aging out and are tied to the new AC units
- Replacing the furnaces with an air handler at the same time to:
 - ° Take advantage of boiler option
 - ° Reduce overall cost of the project
- Black pipes will be hidden in strategic areas
- School heating being addressed as part of the overall project

Timeline and Funding

- Work will continue into June
- We will be without heating and cooling for a period of time
 - ° Timing of work selected to minimize the risk
 - ° Please pray for "average" temperatures
 - ° Exploring contingency options
- Funded through the Love One Another Capital Campaign proceeds.

Jesus left us the Holy Spirit as an Advocate. He knew that we would need help in living according to The Way. The Advocate worked among members of the early Church to spread the message of Jesus Christ throughout the world. The Advocate works among us today, keeping the Church alive and fruitful. "We recognize the presence of the Holy Spirit by the effects the Spirit has on people. People who are filled with the Holy Spirit show the effects of the Spirit's presence in their lives. We call these effects the fruits of the Holy Spirit" (Living the Mass: How One Hour a Week Can Change Your Life, Grassi and Paprocki, Loyola Press, 2011, p. 168-170). There are twelve fruits.

- Love: selfless service to others by words and action. Also known as charity
- Faithfulness: keeping one's promises to God and those whom we have committed ourselves
- Joy: deep and constant gladness in the Lord that circumstances can't destroy
- Modesty: moderation in all our actions, especially our conversations and external behavior

- Peace: serenity knowing that all will work out well because God is with us
- Patience: love that is willing to endure life's suffering, difficulties, and routines

- Self-control: discipline of physical and emotional desires by being modest and respectful of others
- Chastity: the integration of our physical sexuality with our spiritual nature
- Generosity: willingness to give, even at a cost to ourselves
- Gentleness: strength tempered by love leads us to be gentle, peaceful, and gracious.
 Forgiveness over anger.

This weekend marks the one year anniversary of St. Dominic sharing The Way with our community. Today's Gospel Reading


Take a moment to sit with today's Gospel: John 10:11-18. Allow the Spirit to work in you, with you, and through you.

Jesus speaks to the relationship between a shepherd and his sheep in today's Gospel. Knowing more about this relationship helps in appreciating his message. Sheep are a prey animal that is rather defenseless, therefore, they tend to stay in a group. Sheep have great hearing, a keen sense of smell, and monocular vision which allows them to see a full 360 degrees. This all helps to identify a "friend" or a "foe." Due to their ability to imprint at birth, if hand-raised apart from their mother from birth, they know and only respond to their shepherd. The shepherd's role is to take care of them and defend them from harm.

Jesus speaks about how He is the Good Shepherd, not just a shepherd, but good. It can be hard sometimes in life to believe in the goodness of God. How do you see the goodness of God in your life?



April 21-27



SAINT OF THE WEEK



St. Paschal Baylon

St. Paschal Baylón (1540-1592) was born in Spain and worked as a shepherd from childhood until his 20's. He often prayed while working in the fields. He was known for his work ethic and honesty.

Baylón taught himself to read so he could pray the Little Office of the Blessed Virgin. He would give parts of his dinner away to those in need when he was shepherding in the field. He also had great compassion for the sick.

At age 24, Baylón joined the Friars Minor and although invited to study to be a priest, he chose to be a brother. In this vocation he served as a chef, door man, gardener, and official beggar.

St. Paschal found particular solace while praying before the Blessed Sacrament. He was known to spend most of his free time in adoration and would occasionally experience visions after all-night prayer. He is the Patron Saint of Eucharistic Congresses and Societies. ©LPi

Ten Tips for Protecting Children and Offering Outreach to Victims/Survivors

Sexual abuse is about the victim.

Many people are affected by abuse but the individual most impacted is the victim who has suffered a violation of trust that can affect his or her entire life.

2 The residual effects of having been abused can last a lifetime.

The sense of violation goes deep into a person's psyche and feelings of anger, shame, hurt and betrayal can build long after the abuse has taken place. Those who have been abused can heal, but if often takes time, therapy, and the support of loved ones.

No one has the right to have access to children.

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6

No one, no matter who they are, has an automatic right to be around children or young people who are in the care of the Church without proper screening and without following the rules.

Common sense is not all that common.

Dioceses, schools, parishes, and especially families, must educate themselves and others on how to protect children.

5 Child sexual abuse can be prevented.

It is critical to build safety barriers around children and young people to keep them from harm—such as protective guardians, codes of conduct, background evaluations, policies and procedures, and safety training programs.

Feeling heard leads toward healing.

Relief from hurt and anger often comes when one feels heard, when one's pain

and concerns are taken seriously, and a victim/survivor's suffering, pain, and anger are acknowledged.

You cannot always predict who will be an abuser.

Experience shows that most abuse is committed by someone who has gained the trust of a victim/survivor and his/ her family.

There are behavioral warning signs of child abusers.

Some abusers isolate a potential victim by giving him or her undue attention or lavish gifts, others allow young people to participate in activities which their parents or guardians would not approve, such as watching pornography, drinking alcohol, using drugs, and excessive touching, such as wrestling and tickling.

People can be taught to identify grooming behavior.

Grooming behaviors are the actions which abusers take to project the image that they are kind, generous, caring people, while their intent is to lure a minor into an inappropriate relationship. Offenders can be patient and may groom their victim, his or her family, or community for years.

10 Background checks are important.

Background checks in churches, schools and other organizations keep predators away from children both because they scare off some predators and because they uncover past actions which should ban an adult from working or volunteering with children.



Keeping Children and Teens SAFE ONLINE

Computers and mobile devices can be helpful tools for children and teens to learn and grow in faith and fellowship. Unfortunately, the digital world is also full of unsafe and explicit content. You wouldn't hand a teen the car keys without first teaching them how to drive. The same should be true for using technology teach them how to keep themselves and others safe while using it.

You can use the following tips to better protect young people from harm online:

Model appropriate online
behavior for young people. Children
look to their parents to teach and show them the
ways to appropriately use technology. The biggest
influence on what children see as acceptable or
unacceptable is you.

Teach your children not to share private information or images online.

Strangers posing as online friends can try to gain the trust of minors. Personal information such as name, address, and phone number should never be shared with an unknown person. Tell your children to immediately tell a trusted adult if anyone makes them feel uncomfortable.

Limit usage of computers and mobile devices to public spaces in the home.

Not only will this help to prevent young people from accessing unsafe websites, it will also help them to develop safe browsing habits later in life.

Install software that can block or monitor explicit website use. Open access to harmful websites, like those that include pornography, is a constant threat to



young people. Website filters can prevent access to harmful and explicit sites and some can even alert you when such a site is accessed.

Review and discuss the websites yourchild has visited and apps they have

used. Oversight of your child or teen's browsing history and app usage can help to keep them safe online. If you notice your child has browsed an unsafe website or app, discuss why that behavior is harmful. Learn about current apps that could be harmful to children and teenagers, especially those that involve image sharing, private communication, or the illusion of privacy.

Report online exploitation of minors to public authorities. If you become aware of explicit content involving minors, such as solicitation, explicit images or videos, you should submit a report to law enforcement or through resources like CyberTipline from the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children.
