Placing the Colors

Pastor Dave: The changing colors throughout the church year highlight the meaning of each season. Advent marks the beginning of a new church year, and the advent color is purple. Purple represents the Advent themes of anticipation and promise as we await the arrival of the Christ child.

Setting the Garlands and Wreaths

Troy Smith: Green represents renewal, new life, freshness, and rebirth. Plants such as pine, fir, holly, ivy, and mistletoe are called evergreens because they seem not to die. Through the seasons of the year they remain ever-green, ever-alive. Thus they are seen as signs of things that last forever. The Hebrew prophet, Isaiah, tells us that there will be no end to the reign of the Messiah. Therefore, we hang these wreaths of evergreens shaped in a circle, which also has no end, to signify that the kin-dom of God, which Jesus proclaimed, is also without end. The kin-dom of God is realized wherever justice, love, and peace prevail.

Lighting the Candles

Troy Smith: The candles have stood for Christ and for his sacrifice. 'The flames', one writer has said, 'the most universal of all symbols, burns and illuminates by offering itself. When Joseph and Mary presented Jesus in the temple, Simeon referred to the baby as "a light for all people." So, faithful disciples of Jesus have used candles to symbolize the light of Christ shining throughout a broken world. As we light these candles upon our altar and the Advent wreath, we symbolize Emmanuel, meaning, "God with us," whose transforming power heals the world of sin and evil, war and strife, stress and turmoil, suffering and despair. Jesus embodies hope and help for those held captive by oppression. His ministry guides us to personal peace and joy through the illumination of his message of the love of God for all creation.
