What Would You Do?

What would I do if an angry mob of protesters showed up at our church and disrupted our worship service on Sunday morning? That is the question that has been bouncing around in my head since I saw the reports of what happened at Cities Church in St. Paul, Minnesota last month. What would you do in such an event? Would you keep cool and composed, perhaps praying silently? Would you try to calmly reason with the uninvited guests? Or, in the midst of so much chaos, would you lose it, start shoving and shouting and giving the crowd a piece of your mind – and thereby also something for them to post online to mark you as a hypocrite? Many questions are raised, but few answers are given. The biggest problem in the situation is, you don't know the intent of the mob. Are they just there to make noise and cause a scene? Or, are they there to harm and destroy? Not knowing the intent, changes the way one should respond, it also makes the solution to the problem elusive. The safety of our worshippers is our greatest concern, but what kind of policy do you put in place to balance safety

against other concerns? For example: How does the church remain a warm and welcoming place for visitors without also being an obvious soft target for evil doers? What message does it send if we hire armed guards or lock the doors as soon as the service starts?

These, and other questions will be raised at our next elders' meeting and we will try and come up with a plan like we did after a number of church shootings occurred a few years ago. If you have thoughts on what the church should do, let me or your elder know and we will take it into consideration. Mercifully, these events are rare in our day and riots at a church in a place like Plano, Texas seems highly unlikely. However, for churches in political hotspots that have seen rioting in recent years, this may be a much greater concern.

These kinds of matters have always been and always will be a concern for the people of God. For example, in 1st Chronicles 9:17-27, we read how certain Levites formed the temple guard and were in charge of locking the doors and keeping watch. Throughout church history and even

In the event of an active shooter at Lord of Life, emergency panic buttons are located around the church and an usher, sound tech or elder will activate them and the police will be on their way. Until then you should:

Run: Know where all the exits are located. If you can safely get out of the building, do so as fast as you can. Call the police and keep a safe distance from the scene.

Hide: If you are unable to run, the next best thing is to hide. Get down on the floor, find a classroom, office, or bathroom. Barricade the door. Call the police. Note that every room in the church has a number over the door. Alert the authorities to your specific location in the building.

Fight: This is a last resort. Some members have a license to carry a firearm and the proper training to use them. On any given Sunday, it is likely that if a bad guy with a gun starts shooting, he will be met with return fire. If you do have a weapon, be sure to put it down and show your hands to the police when they arrive.

in our own day in places where Christians are a religious minority surrounded by hostile people, we can read examples of how Christians experienced persecution and what they did to prepare themselves for it.

In the penultimate chapter of the Bible, the New Jerusalem (Heaven,) is described as a place where no security is needed, for even though the city has gates, they never close. Only then, in the nearer presence of Almighty God will the people of God at last experience perfect peace and safety.

And I saw no temple in the city, for its temple is the Lord God the Almighty and the Lamb. And the city has no need of sun or moon to shine on it, for the glory of God gives it light, and its lamp is the Lamb. By its light will the nations walk, and the kings of the earth will bring their glory into it, and its gates will never be shut by day—and there will be no night there. They will bring into it the glory and the honor of the nations. But nothing unclean will ever enter it, nor anyone who does what is detestable or false, but only those who are written in the Lamb's book of life. (Rev. 21:22-27)

Lenten Theme: Places of the Passion

With our trip to the Holy Land in mind, I thought it might be good to revisit a Lenten series we did eleven years ago called Places of the Passion. This series goes through the events of Christ's Passion chronologically and geographically starting in the upper room, traveling to Gethsemane, Golgotha, and ending at Christ's grave. I based these sermons on a Lenten series written over 100 years ago by a Rev. R.E. Golladay. Pastor Golladay was pastor of Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church in Columbus, Ohio. His book, Lenten Outlines and Sermons was published in 1920 by the Lutheran Book Concern. That publisher was the official publishing house of the Evangelical Lutheran Joint Synod of Ohio and Other States, or, more commonly, the Ohio Synod. The Ohio Synod was a German speaking group out of Ohio that was generally more conservative and was even in fellowship with the Missouri and Wisconsin Synod for some time, but broke away over the Predestination Controversy in 1881 and merged with the American Lutheran Church in 1929. For a brief time we were in fellowship with the ALC, but it eventually merged with the LCA and AELC to form the ELCA in 1988.

Table of Duties: The Forgotten Stewardship Tool

Luther's Small Catechism is a magnificent tool. Joined with a well-used copy of the Holy Scriptures and an orthodox hymnal, and the Christian is well equipped to live a life of faithfulness to the Lord and service to the neighbor. First in German and now in English and just about any language known to man, this handy masterpiece has introduced generations of people to the central doctrine of justification by grace, through faith, on account of Jesus Christ. The Six Chief Parts have proven to be a faithful framework for a clear confession of the truth of the Gospel for nearly five hundred years!

But more than a textbook, the Small Catechism also serves well as a handbook for Christian living. As a part of its treasure, there is an element that teaches an extraordinarily strong message of stewardship. That hidden treasure that needs to be rediscovered is called the Table of Duties.

The Table of Duties is really nothing more than a categorized gathering of Bible verses. These verses are set apart for "various holy orders and positions, admonishing them about their duties and responsibilities." Addressing pastors and people, government and citizens, husbands, wives, children, youth, workers and so many more, it very clearly lays out what faithful stewardship looks like. Even better, these assembled passages teach one important truth: we are stewards of one another!

The Table is much more than a "how-to" tool; it also lays out the interconnectedness that exists within the body of Christ. Pastors are described by what they are to be as stewards of the Word. 1 Timothy 3 highlights the characteristics of a faithful pastor. Even more, Titus 1 highlights the need for the pastor to be faithful for the sake of those under his care.

Those who hear the faithful preaching of the pastor are stewards of the pastor as well. 1 Corinthians 9 talks about the need for the people to support the livelihood of the pastor. Galatians 6 talks about how the hearers share in the good things that the pastor teaches. 1 Timothy 6 talks about the honor that is owed to the pastor, not because of WHO he is, but rather WHAT he is teaching! Hebrews 13 shows the impact of this stewardship on the pastor, that they perform their duties with joy. Joyful pastors and people are always going to be better stewards of the Gospel!

Outside the church this interdependent stewardship is on display as well. Romans 13 highlights the respect necessary for the governing authorities. As citizens, the faithful steward is called to pay taxes (Matthew 22), pray for their leaders (1 Timothy 2) and that they should be ready to serve in the civil realm (Titus 3), because they are in these positions by God's direction (1 Peter 2).

These steward duties are in the home too! 1 Peter 3 and Colossians 3 shape the husband steward. Ephesians 5 and 1 Peter 3 shape the wife steward. Ephesians 6 form parental stewards and child stewards.

The Table of Duties is a wonderful place for the individual steward to learn how much our stewardship is more than just a "me and Jesus thing!" In fact, it ends with these words: "Let each his lesson learn with care, and all the household well share fare." This is interdependent stewardship on clear display. As each learns stewardship in this way, the more faithful we will be as a family, congregations, communities and the church at large.
