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On a hunting trip to Mason County, I saw something on the way back that caught my eye. While driving past a farm outside a little town, along one of the roads a little lamb was frantically running up and down the fence line –not inside the fence, but outside. Somehow this little one slipped through the barbed wire fence and was separated from the rest of the flock on the other side. Several times it tried to get back through the fence, but the openings seemed too tight and it couldn't find the way in. Unfortunately, the fence was pretty close to the road and if the lamb got spooked and ran into the road, I could imagine things ending badly. We rushed past the lamb heading for home and I don't know how it turned out. But my mind started wondering about it as I sat in the truck for the long ride home.

Many times in the Scriptures God's people are called or compared to "sheep", while He is our shepherd (ex: Psalm 23, John 10.) There are even several examples of lost and wandering sheep: Isaiah 53:6; 1 Peter 2:25; Matthew 18:12 & Luke 15:4. But the thing about this particular lost sheep that I saw alongside the road was how desperate it seemed to get back to the fold. As I thought about the scene and related the metaphor to it, I couldn't help but wonder how many "lost sheep" there are desperate to get back into the sheepfold, that is, the Holy Christian Church from which they wandered away. This seems to be the sentiment of the Psalmist when he pleads for God to rescue him: "I have gone astray like a lost sheep; seek your servant, for I do not forget your commandments." Psalm 119:176

It got me wondering what we in the Church can do to help the lost find their way back in and how, if we aren't mindful, we could inadvertently be setting up "barbed wire" barriers to people who want to be in the church. What can we do to be sure that we are ready and to receive someone who is trying to get back to the Church? Do we welcome the stranger, the outsider, the one who maybe looks likes like he or she doesn't belong?

Perhaps you can think of someone who has wandered off? A friend or family member who no longer faithfully attends church and maybe has lots of questions and doubts about God and life. Do you know if this person has ever tried to get back in? –Granted, it isn't the case with many who have left the flock, but maybe some who have left really do want to get back in?

Perhaps this year you can resolve to pray for someone who has left the fold and then look for an opportunity to encourage them and do everything you can to help them find their way. After all, in the Church we are safe, we are fed and nourished, we have no reason to fear, for the Good Shepherd watches over us and leads us beside still waters. He laid down His life for the sheep, and no one can snatch them from Him.

Thankfully, it isn't as though finding and saving the lost sheep is entirely up to us. We know our Lord wants us to work toward this end, (being mindful of the lost,) but we do not work alone. Whenever a sheep is returned to the fold, it is always ultimately, the work of the Good Shepherd. He seeks and finds the lost sheep and returns them, but consider that He might want to use you to do this.
