As Deaconess Clarion Fritsche explained it to me: a deaconess helps the pastor to connect with church members, and helps

all people connect with the Church. Julie, our deaconess intern, has also expressed an interest in using music to serve the church, and so we will incorporate her musical gifts as well. Our goal is to help prepare her for service in the church and provide lots of opportunities for her to use her gifts and grow. 



During the last week of April, I spent some time with family and friends on a semi-annual fishing trip to Port O'Conner, TX; a small fishing town on the Texas Gulf Coast about halfway between Houston and Corpus Christi. We had good results and returned home with several bags of filets of Black Drum, Redfish, and Flounder. While on this trip, I began to think of what Jesus said as he was calling the first disciples in the gospel of Matthew, "Come, follow me and I will make you fishers of men" (Matt. 4:16). Jesus referred to fishing

as a way to describe what making disciples will be like because there are many similarities between the two. Consider what it takes to be a good fisherman, there is quite a bit more involved than you think.

First of all you should realize that it's going to take work. Fish live in places that are not part of the comforts of home, you have to go out and find them; as the first words of the great commission state, "therefore, GO" (Matt. 28:19). Maybe you need to travel long distances to a lake or the ocean, or perhaps you live near the water, either way you have to get up and GO! You also need to be prepared with good equipment that needs to be maintained; a reliable boat, rods and reels, fishing tackle, and perhaps a GPS or other fish finding devices. These are tools that the Bible, your pastor's care and advice, or close Christian friends who support you will offer. God provides the maintenance through the Word and Sacraments in regular worship and Bible Study. You must also use the right kind of bait. Fish aren't always hungry for the same thing. Sometimes you can use an artificial lure, but other times you may need live bait. God's Word provides these in the ways to meet people for what they are "hungry" for or what they need. These come in the forms of guidance, patience, comfort, forgiveness, and most important, hope in eternal life through Jesus Christ.

Even though we may have all of the right "tools" to be a good fisherman, we must also realize that there will be elements working against us while trying to land those disciples in the boat. Wind, waves, water conditions, and tides (if you're on the ocean) can be environmental factors when fishing. Making disciples is no different. Wind; things can change very quickly or make things hard for a long period of time. Waves; even though the place you are working is a great spot, the water can be pretty rough sometimes. Water conditions; it can be crystal clear, warm, and calm, the ideal place, but cloudy water, extreme water temps, or stagnant water affects where the fish/future followers of Christ will be and how they respond. Tides; they come and go, can be very high or very low. Such are the opportunities to share the Gospel of Jesus and his redeeming work on the cross. They may be plentiful, or very rare, but in the latter case, we don't give up completely and never put a line in the water again. Instead, we wait for the next occasion and try again. There are many, many fish in the sea, future disciples and fellow Christians. We just need to be sure to take the time, have the right tools, and be ready for the right circumstances.

God bless your next "fishing trip" and be ready to land a big one!

More Than a Negative

Even if you've never had to testify in court, a thousand TV shows have made you familiar with the question, "Do you swear to tell the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth?" Why not just make people swear to tell the truth? Or make them promise not to lie?

Any parent who has ever had to interrogate a child about a broken cookie jar or a scuffle over a toy knows the answer. There are plenty of ways to try to get out of trouble without technically lying. You tell *just enough* of the truth to skate on by.

We often play the game of seeing how close we can get to sinning without technically going over the line.

But in our heart of hearts we know that this is not what God intended when He gave us the commandments. He's not giving us a merely negative rule and challenging us to just barely stay away from this or that. There is much more to each commandment than a prohibition. We shouldn't just avoid murdering people — we should be of service to our neighbor.

For each negative prohibition in the commandments there is a positive good that we are to cherish and protect. In the Eighth Commandment, that gift is the reputation of our neighbor and our relationship with him:

You shall not give false testimony against your neighbor.


What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not tell lies about our neighbor, betray him, slander him, or hurt his reputation, but defend him, speak well of him, and explain everything in the kindest way.

Your relationship with your family members (who are your nearest neighbors), the other members of your congregation, your coworkers and your friends is one of the most precious gifts you have been given. You need to exercise good stewardship with this gift just as much as you need to exercise good stewardship with your life, resources, time and income. This is an especially fragile

gift because it's easy to ruin a relationship with slander and

talking behind someone's back.

But speaking well of your neighbor in Christian love is absolutely free; it costs you nothing, yet it pays you great dividends. If you find this challenging at times, if you are tempted to speak ill of others, just remember that this other person is also a beloved child of God for whom your Lord Jesus suffered and died. Your Lord Jesus loves you both.
