

EXPLORING THE WORD

THE REJECTED SAVIOR

In the reading from Acts, Peter explains to the leaders of Israel how they cured a crippled man. They probably expected Peter to take credit for the cure, so they were waiting for him to hang himself by his words. Peter, of course, gives the credit to Jesus and then makes two important points.

First he calls Jesus the "stone you builders rejected, which has become the cornerstone." This quote from Psalm 118 was used often by the early Christians to show that Jesus was rejected by fellow Jews when he was crucified, but was actually doing God's will when he gave his life on the cross. Thus he became not just a martyr, but the savior of the world. This gave comfort to those who had expected the leaders of Israel to follow Jesus and recognize him as the Messiah. It also told those leaders that they could be forgiven for crucifying Jesus if they would simply repent.

The second point made by Peter was that Jesus is the one and only savior of the world. In those days, the Roman emperor was considered to be a god and was called a savior. Peter says this to the leaders because they had to obey the emperor and his appointed rulers over Israel. While we no longer look to politicians to be saviors, we need to remember that Jesus is the Savior: he forgives our sins, shows us how to love God and our neighbors, and hears our prayers. He lives in us to support us when the answer to our prayers is "no." And in the end, he is with us when we die to bring us to eternal life. When we love others (and are loved by others) we experience a taste of God's love. Now the choice is yours: to reject the Savior or make Him the cornerstone of your life.



Chasuble

The chasuble is the large outer garment a priest wears at Mass. Only a priest (or bishop) wears one and only at Mass. The single exception is on Good Friday, when we have no Mass, but the priest who presides at the service of the Lord's Passion wears the chasuble, linking the services from Holy Thursday to Easter. Its color announces the season or feast.

This odd word comes from the Latin *casula*, meaning "little house." Some of these garments seem ample enough to house a family of six. Originally, the *casula* was an outer cloak or jacket worn by men or women as secular dress on cool days. It was formed by two quarter-circles of cloth stitched together front and back. In liturgical usage, the seams became decorated. In time, the seams moved to the sides but the decorations remained, making the chasuble a portable billboard of liturgical symbolism, ranging from the tasteful to the absurd.

During the Middle Ages, the priest started saying Mass with his back to the people and introduced the elevation of the host and chalice so everyone could see over his head. Fashion-minded presiders noted that the old garment did not function well for the elevation; it bunched up the sleeves and pulled at the bottom. So chasubles became sleeveless, if you will, and servers began lifting up the bottom at genuflections, like bridesmaids tending the train.

The stole, traditionally worn underneath the chasuble, is sometimes seen on top. It makes more visible the distinction between the stoles of the priest and the deacon and creates new opportunities for design, but the results do not always satisfy. A stole external to the chasuble is new in the history of vestments, so instructions on the practice are scarce.

Although designs today run freely through a variety of shapes, colors, and patterns, the basic simplicity of the vestment remains. Priests concelebrating Mass may wear an alb and stole without the chasuble if they prefer. The presider may also wear a combination alb-chasuble with an external stole for certain occasions or groups. But the principal symbolic vesture for a presider at Mass is the chasuble - a "house" the Word of God inhabits, a cloak for the spiritual journey and a sign of our leader's role. Shepherd's Corner

I am the good shepherd, and I know mine and mine know me

Happy Good Shepherd Sunday. In our gospel today, Jesus uses an analogy to remind us that He loves us and protects us like a shepherd who loves and cares for His sheep. What an honor we have to be in a parish that conveys this image of His love to us 365 days a year.

Speaking of shepherds ... I saw a clip on one of the travel channels where a guest went to Ireland and stayed in a working Irish farmhouse. Part of the 'experience' of staying on this Irish farm was for a person to experience real life in rural Ireland. (Personally, I think there must be a better way to get a true sense of Ireland than having to work on a farm.)

One of the duties the guest was given was to bring the sheep back in from the field. As the guest went outside to gather the sheep, the TV crew showed the owners of the farm watching from the window. The guest went out and as he approached the sheep, they scattered farther and farther away from him. He tried to entice them with what I guess were 'sheep treats,' but the sheep weren't falling for this. Again, a closeup of the owners were shown as they chuckled, watching the man as he tried to corral the sheep.

After a while of watching the sheep outwitting and frustrating their guest, the host family came out and simply called out to the sheep and they came running towards them. The owners knew that the sheep weren't going to listen to the voice of someone they didn't know, and while they were having some fun at the guest's expense, it really does put the gospel story into perspective.

Jesus tells us that His sheep know His voice. They hear Him and they respond. Do we respond to His voice, or do we respond more to the voice of the world? For example, Jesus says, 'love one another.' The world says, 'point out the faults of others.' Jesus says, 'peace be with you.' The world says, 'be anxious and afraid that things won't work out for you.'

Sometimes in life unfortunate things happen to us, but we are not called to simply bury our head in the sand like the proverbial ostrich* hiding from those unseen circumstances. We are called to live in the faith that Christ suffered, died, and rose from the dead and remember that He will be with us in all things. But to do that, we need to know the sound of his voice. Spending time in quiet prayer, adoration, and Scripture will allow us to better distinguish between his voice and the voice of the world.
