


Doggy Bag: Something to Chew On and Ponder This Week.

- 1. Recall a baptism that deeply affected you. It could be your own, a loved one's, or one you've witnessed. How did it impact you?
- 2. Why do you think Jesus needed to be baptized by John? What does that tell you about Christian community?
- 3. In verse 8, John says he will baptize with water, but the one who comes after him will baptize with the Holy Spirit.
 - a. What does water symbolize in baptism? Where else in the Bible has water been important?
 - b. What is the role of the Holy Spirit in baptism? What does it mean to be baptized with the Holy Spirit?
- 4. In baptism, God claims us as beloved children. What is one thing you can do this week to help you live in awareness that you are God's beloved child in your current life situation? What is a way you can help others to know that they are loved?

Reflect on the baptisms that you have experienced in worship. What words or memories come to mind? Were those experiences perceived as a momentary action or as the beginning of a lifelong process?

In the United Methodist Church, baptism is one of two sacraments practiced. A sacrament, which means a vow or promise, is an outward and **VISIBLE** sign of an inward and **SPIRITUAL** grace.

WHAT HAPPENS IN BAPTISM?

THE GREAT COMMISSION

<u>Go therefore and make disciples of all nations</u>, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you... (Mt. 28:19 – 20)

Questions We Ask in Our Baptism Liturgy (and in Confirmation)

- Do you accept the freedom and power God gives you to resist evil, injustice, and oppression in whatever forms they present themselves?
- According to the grace given to you, will you remain faithful members of Christ's holy Church and serve as Christ's representatives in the world?
- As members of this congregation, will you faithfully participate in its ministries by your prayers, your presence, your gifts, your service and your witness?

THE MAIN POINT:

In baptism, you are called beloved, empowered with the fruits of the Holy Spirit, and are united with the struggles and joys in the church community.

Confirmation, then, is the first time a baptized Christian publicly "confirms" their intention to live the vows of the baptismal and membership covenant and so becomes a **professing member** of the local congregation and The United Methodist Church.
