

BEING A GENEROUS CHURCH IN CREATIVE WAYS NEW LIFE MORTGAGE



On Sunday December 14th, 2025, current and former Leadership Council members along with Pastor Jim and Pastor Jake joined New Life Community Church in worship for a beautiful and spirit-filled celebration as CUMC received the final payment for the former First United Methodist building and gave New Life the deed to the property and a housewarming gift covering the legal fees.

In 2015 CUMC took a creative and spirit-led approach to selling the building. New Life Community Church, a BIC

church plant that had been worshipping in a local theater and was looking for a permanent building. Because New Life was so new, they were not able to get financing from local lenders or their own denomination and they did not have the cash to buy a property outright. CUMC made the decision to finance New Life Community Church by offering them a 10 year, no interest payment schedule negotiated directly with CUMC. The payments for the building all have gone towards our debt on our Spring Garden Campus. This partnership allowed New Life to grow their ministry in a way that would not have been possible otherwise and gave us the opportunity to see the building used for ministry. It also has built trust between our congregations as we share in ministries like Homeless 2 Home together. This partnership is a reflection of the generosity of CUMC and our Kingdom-minded ministry that loves partnering with others in the

community.

As we celebrated this milestone moment with New Life in December, we were amazed at how faithful God is. The leaders of New Life prayed for our leaders and our ministry during the service and we prayed for their leaders and their ministry. It was a beautiful and holy moment connecting two churches across denominational lines that is hard to describe in words. There were barely any dry eyes in the sanctuary. God is good. All the time!

PASTOR JAKE RENEWAL LEAVE

Pastors in the United Methodist Church are encouraged to take a period of spiritual or educational leave for renewal after every 6 years of serving in full-time ministry. This time apart is meant to encourage pastoral leaders to step off the treadmill long enough to rest, renew, and clarify vision for life and work. The goal is for a pastoral leader to return refreshed, reconnected to Jesus and their calling, healthier, and energized for ministry. Renewal leaves are part of sustaining healthy long-time ministry. Our United Methodist Book of Dis-



cipline allows for this leave to be up to 6 months long, and is approved by the local church leadership council and the District Superintendent.

I'm grateful for the opportunity to take a renewal leave this year. I am finishing 21 years of full-time ministry and have never taken a leave. At the end of last summer, I began to feel God's nudge in quiet times and conversations with others that it was time. At their January meeting, the Leadership Council approved May 25, 2026 - July 20, 2026 as

GENERATION ALPHA

Often we notice differences in generations by what media is showing us.

Headlines and social feeds can make it easy to assume the worst about the youngest among us. Recently, though, I attended a training where the Barna Group shared new research specifically about Generation Alpha & faith and the findings were deeply encouraging. If you're not familiar, **Barna Group** is a respected research organization that studies trends in faith, culture, and the church. For decades, they've helped church leaders understand how people of different generations think about God, spirituality, and community.

You may have heard some of the Gen Alpha slang floating around lately (I'm sure "6-7" has come up in your house or on your screen!), but I'd love to share some things that matter much more.

Generation Alpha includes children born **between 2010 and 2024**. Today, they range from **toddlers to about 14 years old**. The majority of our students in student ministries fall into this group as well as all of our Kid's Ministry. Here are a few powerful insights from Barna's research:

- Many Gen Alpha students **worry about being judged by adults**. They are looking for adults who will listen without jumping to conclusions.
- They believe faith communities could do a better job of being **welcoming and less judgmental**.

- Gen Alpha **craves relationships with consistent adults**—people who listen, follow through, and show up over time.

And here's the really hopeful part:

- **1 in 4** Gen Alpha kids considers themselves **very or extremely spiritual**.
 - **1 in 3** attends a religious service or gathering **once a week or more**.
 - **Young men** are about as religious as young women.
 - **Over half** of nonreligious young people may be open to faith.
- When these students talk about churches where they feel highly engaged, they say things like:
- "I feel like adults here really get what I'm going through."
 - "Adults talk about stuff I care about."
 - "Adults ask questions instead of just giving answers."
 - "We regularly talk about real-life topics."

What an incredible picture of what the church can be for this generation.

As we continue to strive to **live like Jesus** and share His love with everyone, including Gen Alpha, let's keep praying for this generation. Encourage them when you see them. Ask them questions. Listen well.

Thank you for all you do to create a place where they can **worship Jesus, grow in their faith, find community, and serve the world**.



MENTAL HEALTH MINISTRY

A CALL TO FAITH, HEALING, AND COMMUNITY



At Carlisle United Methodist Church, living like Jesus means loving people and building community where all are welcome and all means all – no exceptions. Over the past year, there has been a growing commitment to mental health ministry through many people inside and outside of CUMC. What began in prayer and God’s nudging has become a movement of education, partnership, and presence in our church and community.

Many sit quietly in worship carrying unseen burdens—anxiety, depression, bipolar disorder, and other diagnoses that affect them and their families. For too long, these struggles stayed hidden behind shame or silence. At CUMC, we are choosing a different path, one marked by compassion, knowledge,

and hope, where mental health is not separate from our faith but reflects how we love our neighbors and care for ourselves.

As a result of making community connections in mental health, CUMC is hosting NAMI Cumberland & Perry Counties’ free NAMI Family-to-Family and Peer-to-Peer courses this spring. CUMC’s commitment is to provide those who attend these classes a safe and respectful space where they can learn new life skills. NAMI Family-to-Family provides trained facilitators who offer practical education, communication tools, and support for family members and caregivers of those living with mental illness symptoms and diagnoses. NAMI Peer-to-Peer educational programs are also led by trained

facilitators for adults with mental health conditions who are looking to better understand themselves and their recovery.

This partnership is about changing the narrative and culture as much as the classes themselves. We aim to reduce stigma, affirm that prayer, faith, and professional care can work together, and ensure every person feels seen and valued. When someone enters our building for a mental health program, they enter a community that honors their dignity and sacred worth.

Scripture reminds us that God draws near to those who are hurting. “The Lord is close to the brokenhearted and saves those who are crushed in spirit” (Psalm 34:18). We also carry one another’s burdens, as Galatians 6:2 teaches, fulfilling the law of Christ through shared compassion. Mental health ministry reflects these truths. When we create space for honesty, support, and healing, we live out the call to love our neighbors as ourselves. In doing so, we trust that Jesus meets us in our weakness, strengthens us through community, and brings hope even in the midst of struggle.


We take great pride in our staff and the way we work together to create an en-

DID YOU KNOW? BiA (Believers in Action)



This article is the first in a series from Believers in Action (BiA), a CONNECT ministry of CUMC focused on creating a more just and equitable society. BiA focuses on listening to, learning about, and loving all people as Jesus taught, and one of its key goals is encouraging honest conversations about racism and justice. Along with scripture, BiA's ministry is a shared commitment based on the Constitution of The United Methodist Church (UMC)—a document many members don't realize exists.

Like the U.S. and Pennsylvania, the UMC has a Constitution that guides how the church is organized and how it lives out its beliefs. It appears in The Book of Discipline (2020-2024). First adopted in 1808, the Constitution established the church's structure, doctrine, and Social Principles. Although it has been updated over time, its core ideas remain the same.

When someone joins the UMC, they

promise to "be loyal to Christ through the UMC and do all in our power to strengthen its ministries and be faithful

disciples." The Discipline teaches that faithful disciples speak the truth in love and address conflict with forgiveness and reconciliation.

Rev. Lui Tran, Ph.D., a respected United Methodist scholar, notes that the Constitution is more than a set of rules. It is a covenant shaped by John Wesley's vision for making disciples through shared values, responsibilities, and decision-making. It is the key link that connects United Methodists in their faith and mission around the world.

One important part of the Constitution is Article 5, titled "Racial Justice." It states that every person is a beloved child of God and that the church is committed to healing and wholeness for all. It acknowledges that racism has harmed the church throughout its history and continues to divide and marginalize people. The UMC pledges to confront and eliminate racism in every part of church life and society, working with others to advance racial justice everywhere.

The UMC has wrestled with issues of

race since the days of John Wesley, from slavery to the long-term effects that followed. Debates about racial justice have shaped the church's history, sometimes causing division and later reconciliation. This work is ongoing. While laws have helped address racism, the church recognizes that deeper change must happen within people's hearts and minds.

BiA shares this information to invite open, non-political conversations about racism. The call to confront inequality comes from Jesus, from John Wesley's teachings, and from the UMC Constitution—not from any political agenda. BiA encourages us to continue these discussions with love, humility, and a commitment to our shared faith.

“The volunteers and congregation express authentic love and care. Genuine love and care are unmistakable and irresistible. When people encounter it, it’s truly transforming. The source is God’s love, but the expression and experience come from the people in your congregation, both from your volunteer leaders and regular attenders. It is humbling to encounter faithful church volunteers who continue to serve others, even sacrificially at a consistent

level and with joyful hearts. Those who visit your church catch that spirit! ” Knowing this, we ask everyone to engage with the people around you before or after worship. It doesn’t have to be a long interaction a simple “Hello, I am not sure we have met, my name is ...” Then the next time you see them say hello again and try to remember their name. Ask if they received a welcome cup. Walk them to the information desk after worship and hand them one. Recently, a long-time member

saw that I was having a conversation with a first-time worshipper so she got a cup for another worshipper who sat near her. This was the first time she had done so and was surprised how natural it felt. Everyone is capable of making our first time guests feel welcome. slides... but nothing replaces a genuine invitation from someone who cares.

So here's the gentle challenge:

Read the Sunday Bulletin Wrap. Open the Midweek Minute. Check the website for details. Follow and share our Facebook and Instagram posts. Pay attention to the slides on Sunday morning. And then – talk about it. Mention it at work. Bring it up at lunch. Invite a neighbor. Forward an email. Share a post. Personally invite someone to sit with you.

Communication in the church isn't just about distributing information. It's about participating in the mission. Every time you share what's happening here, you're helping extend the invitation. You're making sure no one misses out – not on worship, not on fellowship, and not on the Good News.

Because the message we carry was never meant to stay on a website.

It was meant to be shared.
