
fueled by your relentless energy, have truly made a difference in the lives of many.

Describe a time when your faith was challenged, and how did CUMC community support you through it?

We felt very supported and we were getting spoken to and it was a really good thing for me and my family.

SHARE A MOMENT YOU FELT INSPIRED OR CHALLENGED TO LIVE OUT YOUR FAITH IN A NEW WAY BECAUSE OF SOMETHING YOU EXPERIENCED

I guess I had an ahh-ha moment after being at Charlie's house and thinking about the other mission trips I've been on. I think I've become a little bit more I guess understanding as to why some people are in these circumstances. I mean sure his house was a mess but he didn't choose to do that. I'm starting to understand that being so low that addiction is the only option for some people's problems. I've learned to understand and not judge.

WHAT'S ONE HOPE OR PRAYER YOU HAVE FOR THE FUTURE OF OUR STUDENT MINISTRY OR CHURCH AS YOU TRANSITION OUT OF HIGH SCHOOL?

I would say for student ministry my prayer would be for people to continue to attend and to bring in some new people. I would want other people to have the experiences I had that student ministry changed my life and shaped my faith. As the church I would pray that the church would know that the church has always been a safe place for me. So I'd pray that it would continue to be that way for anyone who might need something like that.

What is one Bible verse or passage that has been particularly meaningful to you?

Exodus 14:14 "The Lord will fight for you; you need only to be still." - I think that explains everything that needs to be understood.

HOSPITALITY PAUSE

We all know when we experience it at a business. You enter the door and all the employees say welcome to... The Hospitality pause is a purposeful break from what each person is currently doing to greet the unknown. The unknown at CUMC may be a first-time guest or a regular you haven't met yet. The 5-10 rule is a great way to practice the hospitality pause.

The 5-10 rule is how we can connect with people at 5 and 10 feet away from each of us. At

can smile, nod, and make eye contact with everyone within ten feet of us. When we use the 5-10 rule we are greeting everyone within 5 feet of us.

The pause is best used if it is short. A quick hello, welcome, introducing yourself is all it takes, nothing fancy. These quick interactions give guests the opportunity to ask questions or walk away. Their choice. Remember this is your established church, you feel comfortable while the guest did a big thing; they walked in the door.

The part of the 5-10 rule with the longest impacting is remembering. Remembering the names of the people you meet. Some people take notes so they remember the names. Make sure you read your notes.

I was told recently 5-10 is work, that it doesn't feel natural. For many it does come naturally, and the rest of us practice. I believe if we purposefully pause to welcome guests, we are attempting to live like Jesus.

ASSOCIATE PASTOR HIRING PROCESS & UPDATE

The search for a new associate pastor is a lot more than just advertising and hoping for the best. We are hiring for a theological and cultural fit in addition to competence in the job responsibilities required of a pastor. It is a strategic and significant decision, as this person is going to be shaping our leadership culture for years to come. It is not just the past and the present to consider, it is also the future.

A number of carefully considered steps have led us to where we are today. The Leadership Council (LC) approved a job description and qualifications for this new role. Advertisements were posted (continued on page 7)

CARLISLE UMC EMERGENCY ASSISTANCE FUND



The Emergency Assistance Fund began as HOT Grace around 2009 as a Grace UMC complement to Samaritan Fellowship. HOT stood for Homeless Outreach Team, a term disgusting to some but embraced by many more. Over its sixteen years, the EAF assisted church members and strangers, averaging about four per month, and donating about \$1500 per year. Since CUMC moved to the Spring Garden Campus, the number of persons seeking help has dropped to about two per month. But with inflation, our average donation is greater. EAF donates on your behalf \$25 and \$40 Giant Gift Cards, which can pay for

gasoline, a meal, and food. We greet applicants, listen, evaluate, advise, give, and pray with them. Many of the needs are greater than our abilities, so we advise about other assistance available. CUMC produces a brochure covering important services in our area. Pick one up at Info Central. We also interview walk-ins between services on Sunday. If you are interested in joining the EAF team, please talk to one of the Pastors or to me. And please give to the EAF by Alternative Gifts.

WE ARE HONORED TO SERVE...

CUMC launched a pilot project in April 2023 and renewed it for 2024 to support individuals receiving services at the Cumberland/Perry Domestic Violence Emergency Shelter in Carlisle with a hot lunch once a month during the support group meeting.

CUMC quickly got 15 volunteers for this project and this group immediately wanted to do more to bless, support and nurture these women and children in transition. Easter baskets for the children and Mother's Day tote bags for the mothers were overflowing with toys, goodies and cards of encouragement in 2023 and 2024.

CUMC added this project to the list of Alternative Gifts that could be selected for Christmas giving in December 2023. These gifts totaled \$650.00 and the funds were split evenly between the two projects - baskets and bags. These funds purchased the main gift

for the children including glow in the dark footballs for the boys, jewelry making kits for the girls and play mats with lots of surprises for the babies and toddlers. The mothers received Gold Bond hand cream, gel socks and manicure kits. CUMC volunteers contributed all the extra goodies and candy to expand the packages.

We formed a new partnership in 2024 with the LeTorte Quilt Guild to provide handmade tote bags for mothers. These fabric bags were colorful, fun and functional to serve both as the packaging for these gifts but also for use on a regular basis as a purse or carry-all.

We are honored to serve these most vulnerable members of our community as they move forward to heal their trauma through prayers, good food, gifts, love and support. We also continue to offer prayers in remembrance for the local victims who have perished because of

violence and their families of which there were four more in 2022, the last year that statistics are currently available.

SERVING LETORT ELEMENTARY

Laughter, pencils, erasers, glue, scissors, paint, books, kickballs, ipads, discussions, questions, answers, music, lunch, and friendship - what do these things have in common? They are all part of the week day life at Letort Elementary School. Imagine being a part of these activities and helping to have an impact on over 200 students at the school : listening to their stories of adventures in and out of school; helping them as they read; spelling a word for them as they write; encouraging them to keep trying on difficult tasks; giving them a smile and a hug while getting one in return. These are just some of the experiences

the 14 volunteers from CUMC have each day they are in the classrooms at the school. Assisting teachers and students is just one part of the nine-year CUMC Serve partnership with the school. During the 2023-24 school year, the church has contributed the following: gift cards to the teachers for supplies; gift cards to the entire staff to use for personal items; a large donation by the Thursdays men’s group used for the purchase of gift cards that are given to Letort families who have special personal needs; breakfast for the teachers and staff; lunch for the teachers during parent/teacher conferences; books for the weekly

Book Swap; shoes for 12 students as part of the Christmas gift tag tree; monthly notes of support to each teacher and staff member; treat bags for Teacher Appreciation Week. CUMC will continue to support Letort Elementary School during the 2024-25 school year in as many ways as possible. In doing so, we continue to “Live like Jesus” and spread his blessings to the community. in publications viewed by candidates describing the opportunity here as well as the qualifications. Pastors shared the opportunity among their networks. There were fifty-three inquiries and twenty-three resumes received from as close as Carlisle and from around the world. As resumes were received, Kathy Charette screened them to ensure the qualifications were met. A team consisting of Kathy Charette, Cheryl Hale, Deb Johnston, Jim Vanzandt and Carol Lemon reviewed and prayerfully considered the twenty-three qualifying applicants. Nine were selected for Zoom interviews with Kathy Charette and Cheryl Hale.

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Upon completion of those interviews, five candidates remained. A decision was made to employ Chemistry Staffing, a company that helps churches determine whether a candidate is a healthy, long-term fit. There are five components to their process: Theology, Church Culture/DNA, Personality, Skill and Abilities, and Chemistry. As this is being written, the results of the Final Fit Analysis have been received and candidates are slated for interviews with Pastor Jake, Pastor Jim VanZandt, and LC Chair Michelle Williams. The final step will be on site (or zoom, depending on the applicant’s location) interviews with CUMC ministry leaders, LC and pastors.

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While we wait for the Lord to make clear the next associate pastor at CUMC, we have been praying and asking for the Lord’s hand to be upon the hiring process. While we may not know the identity of our new associate pastor, He does. Our search for an associate pastor is being done with prayerfully informed wisdom and decision-making. We would like to thank everyone that has and continues to pray for us and our new associate pastor and the volunteers and staff who have assisted the team along the way. We will keep the congregation updated as soon as we have more information.

SAFETY & SECURITY UPDATE

Church safety and security has become an increasingly important topic in recent years, as congregations look to protect people and assets from potential threats. Implementing and maintaining church safety and security policies and procedures is essential for fostering a secure environment and ensuring the well-being of those who attend services, Little Lights, events, classes, and outside groups. The approach—trust in God and be prepared—balances the faithful with the practical and provides a wise middle ground for congregations.

Our Facilities Manager, Jason Weeber, has been attending quarterly seminars on House of Worship safety and security. These seminars include safety and security for our people, building and grounds, indoor and outdoor events, making yourself appear as a hard target and more. Through these seminars we developed a community partnership with the local and state police. These community partnerships provided the opportunity for a training session by the state police for our staff, walkthroughs of our building and grounds for familiarization, a copy of the building blueprints are on file with the local and state police should they need them during an emergency, and we are scheduled for a Risk and Vulnerability Assessment. You may also see state troopers driving through our parking lot on Sunday mornings and when we have larger events to provide a law enforcement presence.

During staff meetings this year, the staff will select one emergency

listed in the CUMC Emergency Response Guide (ERC) to review and discuss responsibilities. In April, Jason Weeber attended The Pennsylvania Office of Homeland Security Domestic Terrorism and Violent Extremism Briefing for community and faith-based organizations.

We can all do things to help ourselves, our families, and others feel more safe and secure at church. Safety and security are the responsibility of all of us! Here are some things that you can do.

- Know where the exits in the church are located so you can easily exit during an emergency and guide others.
- Say "Hello" and introduce yourself to those you have not met before. This connects and welcomes visitors and helps us remain aware of others visiting services and events.
- Keep an eye out for unattended children and help them return to their parents or leader.
- See something, say something to a staff member.
- Volunteer leaders should review the CUMC ERC guidelines posted in the room they are using so they know how to lead and help others during an emergency.
- Know where the AEDs and fire extinguishers are located.
- Take a CPR class.
