CARLISLE UMC'S KINDNESS CAMPAIGN

In early September, Pastor Jake asked, "Could we have a Kindness Campaign for five weeks in October and November." He provided guidance, and our Serve Leaders and Directors of Kids and Student Ministry brainstormed ideas and organized the campaign.

Throughout October and into the first Sunday of November, CUMC launched a hugely successful Kindness Campaign which ran parallel to the Presidential Election Campaign and focused our congregation on

a major teaching of Jesus: that we should treat others as we want to be treated. This is commonly known as The Golden Rule and holds the power to bring people together rather than divide them.

The campaign was to encourage people to be intentional about treating one another with kindness, even those with whom we disagree. A vote for kindness is a step toward overcoming the polarization in our country through civility and respect. We see

division and polarization in our country, communities and even inside the walls of our own churches. It is easy to wonder if we will ever go beyond agreeing to disagree, yet Jesus shows us a better way.

Kindness signs were purchased and displayed in our yards, our neighbors' yards, to the west in Pittsburgh and as far south as Jacksonville, North Carolina in someone's yard that visited CUMC during the campaign. We wore (continued on page 10)

DE BEER FAMILY INTERVIEW

PASTOR QUINTON

Q: What inspired you to pursue ministry, and what has been most rewarding in your journey so far?

A: It was on a Tuesday night in downtown CBD where I was leading a small group looking at the narrative of Zacchaeus in Luke 19. As I read the words of V5 "When Jesus reached the spot, he looked up and said to him, "Zacchaeus, come down immediately. I must stay at your house today." Jesus spoke to me! Quinton come down, it's time to get off the sidelines and join me, I want to meet with you. That was the start of an incredible journey as an Amateur follower of Jesus.

My Ministry Journey has been filled with many God moments! As I have reflected on them, I recognise that at the heart of each encounter is humility, relationships and service. In South Africa we have a Zulu (Nguni Language) saying "Umuntu ngumuntu ngabantu" which means a person is a person through other people. The Christian journey is about walking together.

Q: How do you like to connect with and support families, youth, and others in the church?

A: I believe in fostering relationships and subscribe to a collaborative leadership style. People are important to me, opportunities where we can share life together need to be at the heart of community and church life, Men's Fellowship has always been a ministry close to my heart, gathering each week

and learning from others as I seek to live

life as a husband and father. Small groups where we can learn and grow deeper in our faith and sometimes just be heard will always be a gift. I am a dad to teenagers, please pray for me, as I learn, unlearn and relearn. Through the eyes of my daughters, I have become aware how the Youth and next generation are thirsting for an authentic expression of the Christian Faith, not just an association with the religion of their parents but a personal relationship with Jesus. Our role as the Church is to encourage our Youth to freely express their faith and walk alongside them.

Q: What core values or guiding principles shape your ministry and daily life? It's quite simple: Do what is fair and just to your neighbour, be compassionate and loyal in your love, and don't take yourself too seriously-take God seriously." I am guided by living out my faith through service, recognising the injustices and social ills that diminish (Our/My) capacity to love our neighbour as we love ourselves.

I am a contemplative at heart and seek to live life in daily conversation with God, before and after each engagement with others, noticing glimpses of Grace offered to me through conversations.

Living out our Methodist Rule of Life "Do Good, Do no Harm and Stay in Love with God" is important to me and is a wonderful guard rail to live by.

Q: What are some hobbies

or activities you enjoy when you're not working?

A: I enjoy playing Golf (25 Handicap), although I don't play as often as I would like to. Golf is a sport that teaches patience and humility! I enjoy being a sports fan, I love Rugby and our national team the Springboks, I can't wait to attend as many sporting events as I can with our CUMC family.

Anyone keen to educate me about NFL & Baseball? I will reciprocate and explain Rughyl

When time allows, I enjoy Trail Riding on my Mountain Bike and the outdoors with my family. 

BELIEVERS IN ACTION



Keystones Oral Histories

On November 12, 2024, Believers in Action (BiA) hosted a presentation of the new documentary, "Underground Railroad: South Central Pennsylvania," which was cosponsored by Keystones Oral Histories and the Carlisle Quaker Meeting. The documentary, produced by Bryan Wade, CEO and founder of Keystones Oral Histories, and Ruby Media, is the third in a fifteen-part series designed to shed light on the overlooked contributions of marginalized communities throughout history. It can also be viewed on WITF and other PBS member stations.

The film, narrated by local histori-

ans, professors, and students, was well received by an audience of over 125 people from CUMC and the Carlisle Community. It tells the little known but powerful story of citizens from Adams, Cumberland, Dauphin, Lancaster, and York counties who at great personal risk provided safe houses or were abolitionists, conductors, and stationmasters supporting the Underground Railroad. These individuals guided freedom-seekers who crossed the Mason Dixon line and were on free soil, but were not necessarily free from risk of capture, as they continued their journey to freedom often ending in Canada. Joel Martin, of Norwalk, CT, a

Joel Martin, of Norwalk, CT, a musician, and composer, who composed the documentary's soundtrack, made a guest appearance and gave a brief piano concert which set the mood for the evening and enthralled everyone with his internationally recognized talent

Individuals from the Carlisle Quaker Meeting, CUMC's tech and facility management teams, together with Christina Benson and Kerm Leitner and other members of BiA, helped make the event a success.

CELEBRATING OUR CAPITAL CAMPAIGN PROGRESS

We have so much to be thankful for at CUMC as 2024 comes to a close, including the amazing results of our third and final capital campaign to finish paying off the construction loan for our incredible campus. As you read this brief article, take a moment to thank God for all He is doing with this congregation.

The end of October marked the completion of our first year of this three-year campaign. A total of 168 households pledged \$2,351,372, and thus far an additional 69 households have made gifts to the campaign, for a total participation of 237 families and individuals. Our campaign consultant set a goal for us to receive 40-45% of pledges by the end of

2024. Thanks to your generosity, we already hit that goal by the end of October, and by year-end we anticipate receiving over 50% of pledges, which is simply remarkable! Over and above the pledged amounts, we have also received \$48,320 of additional gifts, and anticipate that figure will be close to \$100,000 by year end.

Our remaining construction loan balance as of the end of October was \$1,747,550. As you can see by comparing the pledged total plus additional gifts received thus far, we are well on our way towards paying off this loan in its entirety by the end of this Forward Campaign in October 2026!

For perspective, we spent a total of \$15 million for our

Spring Garden Campus. Here we are just 8 short years later having already paid off 89% of that total, plus interest on our loan. God is so good, and the faithfulness and generosity of this CUMC congregation is unequaled.

Also, please know that it's never too late to join in this Forward Campaign. We have two years yet to go, so if you wish to join us in this amazing journey, please contact Pastor Jake or one of us. Our goal has always been to leave CUMC debtfree for those generations who will follow us in loving God and sharing His love with our community. Let's finish the job together!

VOLUNTEERS IN MISSION

The CUMC Volunteers in Action Team or VIM was in Roper, North Carolina Oct 13 - Oct 19th. This team of eleven consisted of seasoned VIM members who have been on many mission trips and one new member. It was equally men and women who ranged in age of 35 to 74. The team was also diverse in their skills levels, the team contained many talented home repair experts who were able to teach the others. I have very few home repair skills but was able to do jobs because they fit my skill set. I also did a few things I hadn't done before like glaze windows. One great thing about VIM trips is getting to know the team mates. Even though I had known everyone on the trip, I got to know them better and truly learned that they were working to serve Jesus. Glazing windows takes time so my work partner Debbie Washinger and I were able to chat while we worked. A truly enjoyable experience for me. We served one homeowner for the whole week. We were able to take time to connect with him. One day he

asked me how we came to his house. I explained that the organization we volunteer through had assigned us to him and his home. The team we worked with is Carolina Rebuilding Ministry which matched our skills with the need of the homeowner. The home owner said "I am glad you were sent to me." The team replaced 9 windows and did the siding trim around them. We painted and rescreened two porches. A big plumbing job! What I learned about this team is that they were truly there to serve. The plumbing job got bigger every day and some days it got bigger every couple hours. The two main workers took each setback in stride and immediately went to work on how to fix each new problem. It was a messy, stinky job. They could have easily walked away and no one would have faulted them. But they didn't, they kept working. I am very thankful and in awe of them; they showed me, the team, and the homeowner that they truly cared about him. Two nights the plumbers went back after dinner to check on a job so the home owner could have water overnight. The team showed me that they cared for each other too. The team stayed at Plymouth United Methodist Church which was very spacious. We had meals together there and many team members played cards and games in the evening. We had daily devotions led by Roger Woods. This trip he connected a song to the lesson. A favorite of mine was Do Something by Matthew West. One verse is:

We are the salt of the earth
We are a city on a hill
We're never gonna change the world
by standing still

Please consider joining VIM the next time we have a mission trip. All skill levels are needed. VIM truly is an opportunity to live out our love for Jesus who first loved us.

SAMARITAN FELLOWSHIP

Samaritan Fellowship is a nonprofit, ecumenical organization that has operated in the Carlisle area since 1958. The mission is to provide financial assistance to people in dire financial need who reside in the areas of Carlisle, South Middleton, and Middlesex townships. In many instances, Samaritan Fellowship is their last resort.

Every Saturday without fail, single parents, individuals and families meet face to face with community volunteers at CUMC to determine their needs and the help that can be provided. CUMC is a Samaritan Fellowship partner, and provides the space

every Saturday. Many CUMC members are volunteers. Not one Saturday providing services has been missed in the past 65 years. Usually around 15-20 cases are reviewed each Saturday by 10-15 volunteers. Most of those in need have been referred by a local non-profit agency. The majority of the needs are either housing, utilities, or transportation. Upon signing in, the application process validates the need and, when necessary, phone calls are made to landlords and utilities to discuss the financial obligation. Money is not given to the client, rather sent directly to the business. Some of the local organizations Samaritan Fellowship works closely with and refer to are: Community CARES, Maranatha, Salvation Army, Todd Baird Lindsey Devlin Foundation, His Hands Ministry and Project Share.

Last year, 679 people applied for assistance and the majority received financial help. Samaritan Fellowship paid nearly \$230,000 to keep people from being evicted from their homes, from utilities being turned off, and to keep cars running so moms and dads could get to work. It's always heart wrenching talking to a young (continued on page 8)
