- 1) **Live in His Grace.** *Where do we need to hear anew the heartbeat of our Savior, who assures us of His goodness, His faithfulness, and His forgiveness?*
- 2) **Love His Truth.** *Where is God inviting you personally and us collectively to take a step in faith?*
- 3) **Serve with our heart.** *How are we connecting with our neighborhood and surrounding community?*

May God continue to lead and guide us as a congregation, as we continue to be about the tasks of **Connecting**, **Learning**, and **Caring**, all for the sake of **Serving** Jesus and His mission.

## From your Executive Director

It's likely everyone has heard the saying "a chain is no stronger than its weakest link," meaning no matter how strong individual links might be, all it takes is one poorly formed link to fail – and that chain becomes a worthless pile of scrap metal.

In many ways, our congregation is no different: we have many members who commit their time to the church or the school, who contribute their money to keep our mission alive. Yet sometimes we are overly reliant on them, expecting them to help us carry our mission and vision forward. This leads to one of two things: people don't become engaged with Calvary (so much for our stated vision of "Engaging People In Christ") and are marginalized; or, when one of these stalwarts can no longer continue to be a rock of the congregation, we crumble like that house built on a foundation of sand.

Organizations have a life cycle, and Calvary is no exception. Allow me to now ask this open question: what kind of links are we developing at Calvary? Are we forging our members to be strong links, ones who will continue to carry the church forward for the next ten, twenty, or more years? Ones who will help Calvary effectively carry out our commitment to CONNECT with others, to LEARN more about God's Word, to CARE both inside and outside our congregation, doing these things out of our SERVICE to God?

Or are we instead forging links of paper, who will crumble at adversity, who instead of continuing our message of Christ Crucified instead fall into the worldly trap of not wanting to be viewed as proselytes? Ones who fall for the "we all worship the same God" lie told by so many?

In his 1967 inauguration speech as governor of California, former president Ronald Reagan stated "Freedom is a fragile thing and it's never more than one generation away from extinction. It is not ours by way of inheritance; it must be fought for and defended constantly by each generation, for it comes only once to a people." The same holds true for our congregation: unless we develop new leaders and strong links for and in the congregation, we run the chance of becoming ineffective and even potentially shrinking – or worse. One can see churches – Lutheran and others – around us who became inward focused and stopped building new leaders (and the older leaders didn't let go) and are no longer open.

I challenge our members, both new and old: work to become a strong link – or become a stronger link than today. Look for ways to strengthen what we as Christ's church at Calvary can and will do. As the German philosopher Goethe said: Dream no small dreams. Bring big, challenging dreams to our church, and more importantly, to each other. What we can accomplish together is unknown and is also unlimited. And in whatever we do, or whatever we dream, we must always remember to always give thanks to God!

5. Senior Promise Events: 4 seniors joined me in attending “Living Well with Pain” and “Tips and Tricks to Spring into Gardening” at Senior Promise Office, 8778 Madison Ave.

## **Community Outreach, Service Projects & Events**

1. Operation Christmas Child Shoeboxes: On Thurs., Nov. 20, adult volunteers and Calvary’s K-4 students packed 244 shoeboxes.
2. Grandparent’s/Special Person’s Day: On Friday, Sept. 26, adult volunteers were “special persons” for Calvary Lutheran students whose grandparents were unable to attend.
3. Christmas Themed Mug-packing: On Tues., Dec. 2, volunteers and Mrs. Springer’s 2<sup>nd</sup> graders packed 185 mugs.
4. Easter Egg-Packing Day: On Tues., March 17, volunteers assisted Outreach Ministry and students for Calvary’s Sat., April 28, Easter egg hunt.

### **Mission**

Support the Calvary India Mission Tamil ministry founded by Pr. Raji in three main areas: 1) sponsor mission trips to India, 2) share God's word through tuition and tailoring centers and through discipleship training, 3) support the monthly worship service and outreach to Tamil speaking Indians in Indianapolis.

### **2025 – 26 Activities**

1. A new Mission Discipleship training program was initiated in Ambur, India on 2025. The eight trainees in this inaugural class completed their training and field work. Pr. Raji was in India for their graduation ceremony on May 1, 2026.
2. In addition to discipleship training, we now have 5 centers operating in the Ambur, India area (3 tuition and 2 tailoring centers). We thank God for the ongoing support of Calvary and Mt. Olive Lutheran church, along with our individual donors.
3. The addition of a 3<sup>rd</sup> tuition center and a 2<sup>nd</sup> tailoring center over the past few years was made possible by the regular support that CIM receives through the Calvary budget, and by support from our many individual donors.
4. In addition to our regular supporters who provide tuition and tailoring center sponsorships, the congregation provided support through our CIM Christmas giving tree. These extra funds provided Christmas gifts and clothes for the students.
5. The local Tamil church group continues their worship and fellowship at Calvary once per month.

### **2026 – 27 Goals**

1. Share the tailoring/tuition Center student sponsorship vision with more people.
2. The next mission trip is planned for October, 2026.
3. Support the expanding ministry in Ambur, with a special focus on evaluating the new discipleship training program and the potential to expand this program.
4. Maintain a strong Tamil church group at Calvary and look for opportunities to expand our community.

## Mission

Lutheran High School of Indianapolis prepares young adults for a Christian life while providing academic excellence in a Christ-centered environment.

## 2025 – 26 Activities

1. Celebrating 50 Years has been a year-long celebration in sharing “The Wonders He Has Done.”
2. The students of LHS are blessed to be part of a close family at Lutheran High School. The daily diet of God’s Word, academic study, safe social interaction, and spirited extra-curricular activities have been the mainstay during the year. The forecast for 2026-27 is an enrollment increase as more families are seeking the best for their children.
3. LHS has 65 seniors who will graduate on May 17, 2026. The Academic Honors Core 40 Diploma from the Indiana Department of Education was awarded to 34 of those seniors with 31 receiving the Core 40 Diploma both of which are college-ready diplomas.
4. Students engaged in community events including the Indiana Blood Center Drive, Indianapolis Prayer Breakfast, Ray Skillman Clothe-a-Child, The Pink Ribbon Connection Fundraiser, March for Life in Washington D.C., College Visit Day to IU-Indy, El Salvador Mission Trip, LHS Sunday at Association Churches (Calvary).
5. New Curriculum was introduced for students. I.U. Bloomington Dual Credit was available in American History, Chemistry, Biology, Political Science, and Discovering Literature. These additional courses now provide for 37 I.U. University credits for LHS students to gain in high school while being taught by LHS teachers.
6. Highlights of the Saints athletic teams this year:
  - **Marion County Champion**: Logan Kennerk (wrestling)
  - **Conference Champion**: Football, Wrestling, Softball (Conference Schools: Covenant Christian, Greenwood Christian Academy, Cardinal Ritter, Seccina, Heritage Christian, Lutheran)
  - **Sectional Champions**: Football, Baseball (2025), Softball (2025),
  - **Regional Champions**: Baseball (2025), Softball (2025)
  - **Semi-State Qualifier**: Logan Kennerk (wrestling)
  - **State**: Baseball Champions (2025)
7. Strategic Planning was accomplished by the Board of Directors, School Administration, and key stakeholders. The mission statement

was confirmed with the addition of a new vision statement, value statements, mission goals, and strategic initiatives.

8. Lutheran Golf Outing took place June 1, 2025 at Martinsville Golf Club with 76 golfers participating. 2026 Lutheran Golf Outing returns to Martinsville Golf Club on June 7.
9. 455 tickets were sold for the annual LuFest Dinner Auction. Lutheran was blessed to raise over \$167,000! LuFest 2027 is being planned for Friday, February 19, 2027 at the Indiana Roof Ballroom.

## **2026 – 27 Goals**

1. Fill the seats and welcome another full class of freshmen in the fall of 2026. The goal is to successfully bring more students to maximize the mission and vision of LHS with a future total enrollment of 300 students.
2. Promote the strategic goals developed by the Board of Directors, School Administration, and Community Stakeholders. They are:
  - Positive Christian Culture: Immerse all students in a distinctly Lutheran Christian ethos, supporting growth in faith, character and vocation.
  - Academic Excellence: Cultivate an environment of accountability and support, delivering excellence in teaching and learning that equips each student for post-secondary success.
  - Whole Student Growth: Advance holistic student development that prepares graduates for college, career pathways, and faithful life beyond high school.

### **Mission**

The Outreach Ministry Team connects members of the church with the community, learns about the community, cares for lost people, and shares the love of Christ Jesus.

### **2025 – 26 Activities**

1. Hosted (along with Kara Hiatt) the Foundations of Faith class for new members (spring + fall).
2. Hosted the Calvary Touch-a-Truck in September, 2025, with support from Fellowship, the Children's Ministry, Steve Bardonner, David Leim and Mike Daake. We had 20 trucks/vehicles, 60+ volunteers and approximately 500 attendees. The birdhouse building was a big hit!
3. Collaborated with the Fellowship team on the Fall Outdoor event in October, 2025.
4. Coordinated and hosted the Community Easter Egg Hunt in March, 2026, with support from the Fellowship team, and 80+ adult volunteers. Despite overlapping with Calvary's spring break, we had near record attendance with 315 kids and a total attendance of more than 700.
5. Helped with school Trunk-or-Treat, the Women in Mission Yard Sale and the Holiday Bazaar.
6. Community Garden Team – continued to conduct the spring petunia and fall mum flower sales as fundraisers for Committee projects. As in prior years nearly all the beds were reserved. For several years the

committee has used beds that are not reserved to grow fresh vegetables that are then supplied to Perry Township Hunger Inc. Reserve funds were used to make a cash donation to the Emmaus Food Pantry and Perry Township Hunger, Inc. With the assistance of Diane Noe we completed a “beautification” project at the south entrance that included a new flower bed.

### **2026 – 27 Goals**

1. Facilitate the introduction, orientation, reception, and integration of new members.
2. Promote and direct congregation-wide outreach endeavors. Provide volunteer help and advertising support for VBS, school and Fellowship team events.

# **STEWARDSHIP**

## **Mission**

Develop overall stewardship education programs; develop and maintain a program to discover and enlist for service the talents God has given members of Calvary; foster support for missions and charities; develop, maintain, and evaluate processes involved in giving, including estate planning, bequests and memorials; and coordinate door offerings and fundraisers.

## **2025 – 26 Activities**

1. Continued support of international, national, and local missions including: LCMS Missionaries; Lutheran High School; Camp Lakeview; Wycliffe Bible Translators; Lutheran Child and Family Services; and Habitat for Humanity. Provided tuition support for a member of the Calvary staff and three (3) Lutheran High School students pursuing a career in church work.
2. Educated members about online giving options.
3. Continued to recognize different Calvary Ministry Partners each month through promotion and partnership with other ministry teams.
4. Conducted a Financial Planning Workshop where members were provided information on programs and opportunities that have tax benefits, such as the Scholarship Granting Organization (SGO) and Qualified Charitable Distributions.

5. Calvary Connects capital campaign was initiated in September with a goal of raising \$750,000 in contributions. Funds received from the capital campaign are being used to add space and improve existing spaces that will allow Calvary to better connect with the community. Initial projects have included the Calvary Café and a remodel of the Women's Restrooms. The pledge goal of \$750,000 was achieved in April, 2025.

### **2026 – 27 Goals**

1. Calvary Connects Campaign – focus will shift from fundraising to administering campaign fund collection and tracking. Periodic reports will be provided to individuals regarding the status of their campaign pledges.
2. Lilly Endowment Grant - Grant is providing funds for increased STEM opportunities in the school. Calvary is required to provide a 20% match to this generous gift. Assist in fundraising activities for this second Capital Campaign to provide the required matching funds.
3. Continue to educate members on the availability of Thrivent Action grants and Direct Choice dollars as well as other matching funds.
4. Consider conducting another financial planning workshop for members and the community to provide information on retirement considerations including estate planning.
5. Continue support of students studying to be church workers through scholarships.

## CHURCH ENDOWMENT FUND REPORT

Contributions to the endowment fund may be made at any time through listing "Calvary Church Endowment Fund" on your contribution envelope. ## CONCORDIA CEMETERY

In 1870, the leaders of St. Paul's decided there should be another Lutheran Cemetery in town, the others being at Ebenezer Lutheran on Millersville Road on the city's far north-east side, and St. John's in what was then referred to as Five Points or Little Minden. They purchased property on South Meridian Street, south of Pleasant Run Parkway, in what was then the outskirts of the city. As the number of LCMS congregations expanded, St. Paul's invited other area congregations to become members of an association to own and operate the cemetery: Emmaus, St. Peter's, Grace, Trinity, and eventually, Calvary.

Since its founding, Concordia has been the final resting place for generations of Lutherans, particularly for many members of Calvary, and continues so to this day. Because of the foresight of St. Paul's when the cemetery was plotted, sufficient space remains for decades at Concordia. There are plans for some upgrades to the Cemetery, including a beatification project over the next 18 months.
