From the Pastors Sacred Space

⁴ "When the Lord saw that he turned aside to see, God called to him out of the bush, "Moses, Moses!" And he said, "Here I am." ⁵ Then he said, "Do not come near; take your sandals off your feet, for the place on which you are standing is holy ground." (Exodus 3:4-5).

¹⁰ And when the priests came out of the Holy Place, a cloud filled the house of the Lord, ¹¹ so that the priests could not stand to minister because of the cloud, for the glory of the Lord filled the house of the Lord (1 Kings 8:10-11).

The idea of holy ground and sacred space is found throughout the Bible. From the rock at Bethel where Jacob saw a ladder descend from heaven to the sand surrounding the burning bush to the temple mount in Jerusalem, we see a special reverence for the holy, the sacred, the set apart. Genesis 1 affirms the goodness with which all physical space was created. Even after mankind's fall and the land's subjection to futility, we observe the beauty of God's creation and a continued reverence for certain locations as particularly holy. While holy places and holy shrines have been misunderstood and abused many times throughout history, the reality of revered sites actually proclaims a central truth of Christianity that at certain points of recorded time and space God has acted in history for the sake of saving His people. Going and visiting everything from the Holy Land to the sites in Rome and other historic cities places us in the midst of the locations that continue to tell the story of Christianity and its proclamation of Jesus Christ as Lord. The fact that we can walk in the footsteps of Jesus can actually be a wonderful experience that strengthens our faith and our appreciation of his very incarnation as a man.

In biblical times, the tabernacle and the temple have mirrored this intersection between the divine and the human realms. When the Lord commanded Moses to build the tabernacle, He took great pains to describe in detail the work that was to be done. Again, in the time of Solomon, the Lord took much interest in the work carried out upon the temple. Everything from the dimensions to the rules for construction to the utensils used in its services was specified in the biblical account. Following the completed construction and consecration of each building, the Lord filled these sacred spaces with the presence of his Spirit. Each was filled with the cloud of God's glory, so that the priests were rendered incapable of fulfilling their duties. By the services performed within these hallowed halls, the story of God's salvation was proclaimed, and His forgiveness was delivered to generation after generation.

In this same way our Christian churches today remain blessed buildings, where the Lord comes into contact with His people. It is neither the location nor the building materials nor any special rite of consecration that makes the site sacred and holy, but it is what resides and happens within that space. It is here in Christ's church that the Holy Spirit dwells richly where two or three are gathered. It is here that the Spirit fills our lives with His cloud of presence (Exodus 13:21, 40:34; 1 Kings 8:10). It is here where we meet God face to face and then are sent back into this world as the chosen people of God who now declare the praise of him who called us out of darkness into his wonderful light (1 Peter 2:10) and are always prepared to give the reason for the hope that is within us.

In the one holy Christian and apostolic church, the story of salvation is preached and forgiveness is granted. It is here that we stand with Moses on holy ground. It is here that we join together in the sacred place of rest with the many other religious pilgrims walking in the way of the Lord. Throughout time and throughout the world there have been and are many places considerably revered, but it matters not how far or wide one travels when the sacred space of God's rest lies so close to home. "Or do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, whom you have from God? You are not your own, for you were bought with a price. So glorify God in your body" (1 Corinthians 6:19-20). Our Lord goes with you wherever you go, for you carry the gift of His Spirit with you at all times. May God bless and keep you this day as you continue to **Connect** with God and others, **Learn** His Word and will for your life, and **Care** for others by His grace.


study/reflection. Open to everyone. Begin attending at any time; sessions are not sequential. Contact Mike Louden or Roxanne Deardurff for more information.


Young Adult Bible Study & Fellowship

From Your Executive Director

The 1960s animated television series, "The Rocky and Bullwinkle Show", was known for its cultural and topical satire, with puns and dry humor. Like a variety show, it featured several segments, one known as "Peabody's Improbable History", with the time-travelers Mr. Peabody and his boy Sherman, using the Wayback Machine to meet various historic figures (but they never visited Martin Luther).

Let's use that Wayback Machine to travel back to June 1956, when President Eisenhower signed the Federal Aid Highway Act of 1956 into law, establishing our modern-day interstate highway system. In November of that year, the first stretch of what would become I-70 opened in Kansas. In less than 50 years from the introduction of Ford's Model T in 1908, a system of modern roads connecting state to state was now underway.

I doubt that in 1956 one would have used that stretch of I-70 with a horse and buggy, which was a standard transportation method less than 50 years earlier. Our nation had moved significantly forward with travel in less than 50 years. And in only 13 years from 1956, the United States would land on the moon. From rudimentary motorized transportation to space conquest in 60 years.

And how does that apply to Calvary? Because it's been over 50 years since we adopted what is the general form of our congregation constitution and bylaws, and with some structural tweaks we are still using those. We are trying to travel on an interstate with a horse and buggy.

I have written and spoken ad nauseum about the changes that have taken place in our society since we first adopted our current structure in the early 1970s. The world has vastly changed, but we are still trying to navigate it on a horse.

The way we operate today is stuck in the 1970s. Think back: rotary dial telephones. Black and white TVs with 4 local channels. No computers, no calculators, no cell phones. Gas was 16.9¢ a gallon, less during gas wars. A typical work week was 40-45 hours – many of us would be thankful if we could get back to those hours, since we are now connected via text messaging, Teams, and e-mail 24/7.

We cannot continue to run the day-to-day operations of our congregation like we did 50+ years ago. We must change our organizational structure.

<u>But we will not change our message nor will we change our mission and vision</u>. We will continue to Engage People In Christ. We will continue to Connect, to Learn, and to Care out of Service to God. We will continue to preach Christ Crucified, never watering down our message to cave to populist cravings. You will always hear Law and Gospel preached in our church: *Sola Scriptura, Sola Fide, Sola Gratia*!

The leaders of the congregation will be charged to begin to tackle this necessary task to change how things "run" at Calvary. It will most likely result in a different means by which we carry out our mission and vision. I don't know what that final form will be, but the end goal is to create a new structure for the next 25 years or more, as we faithfully and graciously serve God, bringing His words of salvation and grace to an increasingly skeptical and un-Christian world, as instructed by Christ in Matthew 28:16-20, the Great Commission.

Thrivent Members – Did you know...

Thrivent Members, did you know that Thrivent Financial budgets a significant amount of money each year to pay the transaction costs for gifts to charitable organizations? This includes gifts made by credit card. Each year, Thrivent budgets \$300,000 to pay online processing fees for personal donations made through Thrivent's online giving platform. Calvary is an eligible charitable organization.

Scholarships available for those pursuing an education in church work

Scholarships are available for Calvary members studying to be church workers from both the <u>Wessler Family Endowment and the Student Assistance Fund</u>. Anyone who is considering <u>pursuing an education</u> in church work and would like more information on scholarship opportunities please reach out to the Stewardship Ministry Team.

Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCDs)

If you are 70½ or older, you can use assets from your individual retirement account to provide a tax-free gift to your chosen charities through the qualified charitable distribution (QCD) process. Individuals can donate up to \$100,000 per year through the QCD process. This tax advantaged tool is particularly useful for those who are 73 and above and subject to required minimum distributions (RMDs) from an IRA. QCDs can be a giving option for these individuals as it satisfies required minimum distribution (RMD) requirements while potentially providing charitable contributions tax deduction benefits.

RMD withdrawals are typically considered income and subject to income taxes. But individuals can instead create a qualified charitable distribution with the RMD, where the withdrawal becomes a donation to an organization of your choice. The advantage is that as you make a contribution, you won't pay taxes on the RMD withdrawal channeled through a QCD. Please consult your tax advisor for specifics related to your personal situation.


Extravagant Sharing
