#### *From the Pastors* Worldly Appearances and Gospel Truth

"Be wise in the way you act toward outsiders; make the most of every opportunity. Let your conversation be always full of grace, seasoned with salt, so that you may know how to answer everyone."

#### Colossians 4:5-6

In the book *The Screwtape Letters*, C.S. Lewis tells the story of two demons, who discuss how best to lead a particular human away from Christianity, the Church, and <u>their</u> great Enemy—God. The book is a rather clever way to deepen our understanding of the temptations that we undergo in our daily lives. A portion that I found most insightful is a dialogue where the wiser demon, Screwtape, advises the younger, Wormwood, on how to use the Church to drive this Christian away from the Church!

"When he gets to his pew and looks around him, he sees just that selection of his neighbors whom he has hitherto avoided. You want to lean pretty heavily on those neighbors. Make his mind flit to and fro between an expression like 'the body of Christ' and the actual faces in the next pew. It matters little, of course, what kind of people that next pew really contains. You may know one of them to be a great warrior on the Enemy's [i.e. God's] side. No matter. Provided that any of those neighbors sing out of tune, or have boots that squeak, ... or odd clothes, he will quite easily believe that their religion must therefore be somehow ridiculous" (p. 6).

Do we at times have a hard time seeing spiritual significance despite physical appearances? Are we too easily distracted with the things of this world to see the deeper things of God at play? There is a gap that is observed between appearances and truth. Too often we forget that Christians are both saint **and** sinner. We are the forgiven and beloved children of God, and yet we are also still those who are daily "poor miserable sinners. We do not always reflect God's light in our "moral" goodness, but we do have a unique and powerful chance to reflect God's light in our personal experiences of grace. The Apostle Paul says that even though he was the chief of sinners, he proclaims that, "I received mercy for this reason, that in me, as the foremost, Jesus Christ might display his perfect patience as an example to those who were to believe in him for eternal life" (1 Timothy 1:16). Do you see the primary testimony of your life, as one that gives thanks for God's undeserved grace and steadfast love? My testimony tends to be a list of places that I messed up and God's grace cleaned up and covered up. My testimony doesn't often point to how many things I've done right. Instead, it points to how many times God has shown unlimited patience, unrelenting forgiveness, and unending love.

There is a gap between "appearances" and "realities" when it comes to individual Christians and the collective group of Christians called the Church. Paul describes the church as the 'body of Christ'—a group knit together as one functioning body with each member playing an essential role. And yet we know that the "body" of the church does not always function as it should. We have "aches and pains" within our relationships, as well as our "strains and stresses" within our unity and our witness in Christ, and yet Paul reminds us that even though our unity in the body of Christ is imperfect, we are still serving as a witness to those around us. Some of our most powerful testimonies as the people of God can often be moments when we point to God's grace in our brokenness, God's forgiveness in our mistakes, God's welcome in our failures. We currently walk by faith, not by sight. We live in the tension between what is visible and invisible. We lead lives both as saints and sinners. And yet, despite all of these tensions, we recognize that God is using our lives and our relationships to reflect the love, forgiveness, and grace that He has for us and for all.

We are a church that emphasizes Connecting, Learning, and Caring, all for the sake of Serving the mission of Christ. Where is God inviting you to let your light shine? Where is God inviting your testimony to tell of His "perfect patience" for imperfect people? Where is God calling you back to the good news that in Christ Jesus you are fully known and fully loved by Him who created you, redeemed you, and even right now is in the process of making you holy.

May God grant to you this day and every day His blessed peace. Amen.

The Lutheran Ladies are sassy, have strong-spined opinions, and have stepped out of your office, your kid's soccer club, or your church to live on these pages. They deal with change--sometimes poorly--but with humor and heartache, they're on life's journey.







#### From Your Executive Director

I saw an interesting number a few days ago: 3,125. That's how many miles some biblical scholars estimate Christ walked during his ministry. That's a pretty impressive number, no matter how one looks at it – roughly, a trip from Detroit to Key West Florida and back. Now, another number: 600. This is the estimated distance in meters from Pilate's judgment hall to Golgotha, where Jesus was crucified, slightly more than 1/3<sup>rd</sup> of a mile. And a smaller number: 90, the estimated distance in meters from Slightly less than football field!

Imagine a circle drawn around our building with a radius of 1/3<sup>rd</sup> of a mile. It might seem at first to be a long distance, but from Calvary to Southport High School is further away. In fact, our circle would roughly extend west to the Little League diamonds, north to Gilbert Avenue, east to Madison Avenue, and south to just north of Banta. Using our high school geometry, we have a circumference of approximately 2.1 miles (remember C=2pr?).

Think how many people and families live inside this circle. Probably about 200 or so houses, 2.3 people per household – or somewhere between 400-500 people. Some of the more recent Pew and Gallup surveys suggest than 30% of Americans no longer profess to be Christian. And according to the most recent data from the Public Religion Research Institute, <u>51% of adults in Indiana say they never or seldom attend church or religious services</u> – a result in the growing number of those who say they have no religious affiliation.

Let this sink in for a minute: in a small area around Calvary, it is very likely that as many as 150-200 people have no religious, let alone Christian affiliation. And 200 or more of these neighbors never or seldom attend church or religious services. They probably drive by our building on a regular basis – and keep driving.

How do we reach these neighbors? We talk of Engaging People in Christ, yet there are many of our neighbors who are not engaged for one reason or another, a mirror of society at large.

We need to find new ways of being a Christian Lutheran congregation to reach these neighbors. We must seek new methods and programs to show our neighbors that we **CARE** about them. That we want to **CONNECT** to and with them. That we want to help them **LEARN** about Christ. And by being Servant Leaders, we do things to **SERVE**, to glorify and edify God.

Whether we like it or not, most people have little to no idea what it means that we are Lutheran, and they especially don't know what it means that we are LCMS. We know who we are – Christians who adhere to the Lutheran Confessions and have a passion for God's Word and His world. Now, we need to be certain our neighbors and our community knows who we are.

This means we need to think about the distance between us and our neighbors, and how to close and eliminate that gap. It may be 100'. It might be 400 yards. It could be a mile or two. Or more.

Then again, maybe not even four feet, just across the aisle. (Yes, that close.) Even closer, sitting next to you in a chair or in a pew.

A neighbor, seeking to learn. Now is the time to show our care and help them connect. All it takes is for you to personally connect to and with them.

So, what's stopping you?

Thrivent Members, did you know that Thrivent Financial budgets a significant amount of money each year to pay the transaction costs for gifts to charitable organizations? This includes gifts made by credit card. Each year, Thrivent budgets \$300,000 to pay online processing fees for personal donations made through Thrivent's online giving platform. #### Scholarships available for those pursuing an education in church work

Scholarships are available for Calvary members studying to be church workers from both the <u>Wessler Family Endowment and the Student Assistance Fund</u>. #### Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCDs)

If you are 70½ or older, you can use assets from your individual retirement account to provide a tax-free gift to your chosen charities through the qualified charitable distribution (QCD) process. Individuals can donate up to \$100,000 per year through the QCD process. This tax advantaged tool is particularly useful for those who are 73 and above and subject to required minimum distributions (RMDs) from an IRA. QCDs can be a giving option for these individuals as it satisfies required minimum distribution (RMD) requirements while potentially providing charitable contributions tax deduction benefits. RMD withdrawals are typically considered income and subject to income taxes. But individuals can instead create a qualified charitable distribution with the RMD, where the withdrawal becomes a donation to an organization of your choice. The advantage is that as you make a contribution, you won't pay taxes on the RMD withdrawal channeled through a QCD. Please consult your tax advisor for specifics related to your personal situation.
