From the Pastors A Life Turned Inside Out

We find ourselves in the heart of the church season of Lent, a time of reflection and repentance. It is a time that we consider the nature of our being, the nature of our living, and the nature of God's love for us and His creation.

Martin Luther in his reflections upon the nature of humankind offered this thought, "It is easy...to sense how we seek and love ourselves ..., how **we are bent in and curved in upon ourselves**, if not in what we do, then at least in what we are disposed to do" ¹ According to Luther, our sinful nature is one that leaves us "turned in upon ourselves." It is the natural tendency to allow the unholy Trinity of "ME, MYSELF, AND I" to rule over and above the Holy Trinity of Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

In his own reflections on the subject, the Apostle Paul urged early Christians to "[do] nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit, but in humility consider others better than yourselves. Each of you should look not only to your own interests, but also to the interests of others" (Philippians 2:3-4).

So, how are we doing today in considering others better than ourselves? We live in a hyper "mefocused" society, and too often the lives of those inside the church reflect the lives of those outside the church. We continue to be turned in upon ourselves both individually and congregationally. We can be more concerned of what is going on inside these walls than what is going on outside these walls in the homes, workplaces, and shared spaces of our congregation and our community.

The truth is that when Jesus called us to "take up our cross and follow him," he desired to change the "shape" of our lives. Rather than a life that is constantly circling back upon itself, Christ desired that we might die to our old sinful nature. He desired that we may be shaped by his cross, so that we may be "turned outward" toward God and our neighbor. As the power of God's Word speaks into our lives, it cannot help but create a "cruciform" shape to our lives as we look "up" to God for the full forgiveness and freedom that comes by His grace alone but also looks "out" in love to our neighbor (e.g., spouse, children, parents, fellow church members, friends, co-workers).

But where do we receive this transforming power that turns us "inside-out"? Where can we find a power that can set us free from our circle turned in on ourselves? We find it only in the good news of Jesus Christ. Only as the love and grace of our Lord Jesus Christ pours into our lives are we set free from our old sinful ways. See where Paul directs our attention in his encouragement to the Philippians, "Have this mind among yourselves, which is yours in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, but emptied himself, by taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men. And being found in human form, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross" (Philippians 2:5-8). Praise God that there was one who was selfless, one who was truly a servant, one who considered others more than Himself. Thank God for the grace and forgiveness that is not just for us, but for all people. Praise God for Him who is the very power of God at work in our lives. We pray each day that our lives be less about us and more about him. For it is only through Him that we have a forgiveness that knows no bounds, a love that doesn't quit, and a peace that passes all understanding.

May our Heavenly Father be at work in Your life this Lenten season through His mighty and powerful Word. May He continue to turn your life inside-out and upside-down by the lifechanging gift of Jesus Christ.

From Your Executive Director

For those playing along at home, last March I discussed how the name of this month is a word that is anthimeria, meaning it can be used as either a noun or a verb. And I ended my column suggesting we must be bold and fearless in our faith, marching like the hymn "Onward Christian Soldiers."

What I wrote last year still holds true: we must be bold and fearless in our faith. Over the past year, I have read innumerable studies conducted about the future of Christianity in America. The Evil One has been and still is very busy, convincing many in our country to turn away from God, becoming humanists who no longer need God in their lives. Or worse, becoming atheists: over 30% of the young people in our country claim they have no belief in God.

Somewhat surprisingly, there are no hymns in our hymnal that talk about marching, other than "Onward Christian Soldiers". We march – think about our Synod's participation in the annual March for Life events across the county – but we don't generally sing about it.

I had to turn to the Evangelical Lutheran Worship Hymnal of the ELCA, to find a song about marching, the South African song *Siyahamba*. It is a simply worded song, with one phrase: "Siyahamb' ekukhanyen' kwenkhos'", which translates to "We Are Marching in the Light of God." (ELW #866 - for a great video of a performance, see youtube.com/watch?v=QGOiANtGmhE).

Question: are you marching? Or are you watching the parade from the sidelines?

Are you marching to connect yourself and others to God? Are you marching to learn more about His word? Are you marching to help others, demonstrating your care for them? Are you marching, to Engage People In Christ?

Jesus never said it would be easy to be an engaged follower. He didn't say "sit down in your La-Z-Boy recliner and follow me." No, He tells us it will be difficult, in Matthew16:24, when He told His disciples "If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and <u>take up his cross</u> and follow me." (emphasis added)

We know it's not easy. Jesus was tempted by Satan during His 40 days, and Satan continues to tempt us with things to draw us away from God: binge-watching shows on the television. Video games. Sporting events. Social media. Or even worse, apathy.

We have a mission at Calvary, one started over 90 years ago, to fulfill the Great Commission in Matthew 28 in our community. We have been faithful to that, and now with all the temptations around us, it is even more critical we look for ways to fulfil our mission.

So put on your boots. Lace them up tightly. Get ready for a hike in the wilderness, so to speak. There are a lot of people out there who need to hear the good news of Christ. Be like the song "Before The Parade Passes By" from the musical Hello Dolly, when she sings "Before the parade passes by | I've gotta get in step while there's still time left | I'm ready to move out in front." Grab your staff. We are marching in the light of God!

Take A Number

When I was a child many times when we went to the butcher or baker a line was already formed. We needed to take a number to join those in line. A little display box kept a running count of which number was being served. Each time a "click" was heard we knew that our time of waiting was nearing an end.

Take a number to be counted among those waiting. This ensured the proper sequence. First comefirst were served. No line cutting or disagreements as to who arrived first. The number in hand was all that was needed to determine order.

Yet Jesus turns this idea upside down when He teaches that the first will be last and the last will be first. It is in direct opposition to the way the world operates. The students are often seeking to be first in line. Many of our younger grades have a specific line order for them to follow making again the order known for each student rendering the idea to seek the first spot in line a moot point. So what was Jesus referencing from Matthew 20:16? Here, Jesus challenges the conventional wisdom that places value on worldly status or position. He emphasizes that in God's kingdom, the order of importance is different. Those who are considered "last" by society may find themselves at the forefront in God's eyes. Jesus calls us not to be looking to be served, but to first seek to serve others. The acronym J-O-Y summarizes this idea. JESUS- OTHERS-YOU reverses our sinful nature with its desires and looks first to Jesus who gave to us His life.

This is taught each day through the ministry of our day school. The students are given opportunities to practice this through leading worship and conducting service projects. One service project of emphasis this school year has been to send Gospel story books to children in Liberia and Sierra Leone through Lutheran Heritage Ministry. The students and staff of Calvary have raised over \$2000.00 toward this project. We have sent 400 books proclaiming God's Gospel message of salvation. No one should need to wait in line to hear the Gospel message.

We thank God for the prayers and support of our congregation as the doors to our school have proclaimed this same message for 74 years. Praise God for His giving and serving people.

Kindergarten through Eighth Grade Registration 2024-25

Registration for the 2024-25 school year continues. Registrations received will allow us to better prepare for the new school year. Staffing needs, equipment, facilities, and classroom assignments will be determined and finalized based on the enrollment numbers through this registration process. Easter Monday, April 1


Calvary Lutheran School is closed on Easter Monday. Our desire is that families are free to celebrate the Resurrection of our Lord taking Monday as a travel day.




Extravagant Sharing

Here a bronze serpent hangs from a cross, and it was put there by God precisely because of sin. The sign of our sin and the image of the death we deserve is suspended between heaven and earth and between God and man. And there, on the wooden pole, God saved His people.
