From the Pastors

Reflections and Questions on the Call Process (Part 3)

"Do not be hasty in the laying on of hands..." (1 Timothy 5:22a).

As we continue through the call process, we prayerfully reflect on where God is leading us.

Over the past two months we reflected upon the questions: "What are we looking for in a pastor?" and "What are we hoping this pastor will do?"

This month we look at the question: "Why is this process taking so long?"

The old joke goes something like this, "We all know that we want patience, and we want it now!" Where have you seen this true in your life or the lives of those around you? And yet we know that the old saying goes, "Patience is a virtue," we also know that we wish that patience was a product that we could buy from Amazon with same day free shipping. If it was simply a product, rather than a character virtue, I guarantee that it would be a top seller! Character, however, is caught, not bought. It is something that must be observed around us and formed within us. So, how is your formation in patience going? Mine has its rough days!

While it is true that there are many human things that can slow down or delay a call process, it is also true that the call process is kind of like a marriage. It is "not to be entered into inadvisedly or lightly, but reverently, deliberately, and in accordance with the purposes for which it was instituted by God" (Declaration of Purpose within a Christian Wedding Service). We are not simply looking for someone to "fill" the role and "play" the part. Hopefully, those of you who are married included a little more effort in your selection process for spouse than that. As the Apostle Paul reminds Timothy, "do not be hasty in the laying on of hands," which is a reference of the process by which a pastor is welcomed into the ministry, so also must we be patient within this process.

As we have now extended a call to Rev. Paul Dickerson to consider, we pray for God's guidance and direction for all parties involved—Calvary Lutheran, Christ Memorial Lutheran, and the Dickerson family. Too often we forget that when we extend a call the recipient now finds himself with two "divine calls" one to his current church and one to consider from our church. Now comes that question, "Where does God desire him to best serve?" In many ways, a pastor can have a meaningful ministry in either location, but which setting is uniquely calling for the best use of his skills, experience, etc. And that is the prayerful process on which we now embark. We ask God to lead and us to listen. We ask God to guide and us to go where he leads us. May we continue to seek not our will but God's will throughout this entire process.

May God grant us peace, patience, and perseverance throughout this process of prayerful deliberation. And may God remind all of us of the shared ministry that we have of "sharing the hope that is in us" (1 Peter 3:15), as we continue to shine with the light of Christ, wherever He has placed us. You don't have to be a pastor to shine with the light of Christ in your unique calling and vocation.

Executive Director

From Your Executive Director

Earlier this year, I read what I consider to be an excellent book by Eric Metaxas, author of biographies of Martin Luther, Dietrich Bonhoeffer, and abolitionist William Wilberforce. His recent book "Letter to the American Church" discusses what he considers to be disturbing similarities between the German church of the 1930s and the American church today. I normally don't go about recommending books, but this is one that hits the proverbial nail on the head. He has since written a second book as a sequel – "Religionless Christianity: God's Answer to Evil", and that book is also a worth-while read.

Metaxas is just one in a long line of authors writing about the church and Christianity, following in the footsteps of C.S. Lewis, Charles Spurgeon, and others dating, back to the beginning of Christianity, like St. Augustine. Consider the Pauline epistles for example, when St. Paul wrote to churches in Corinth, Rome, Galatia and others, including Ephesus, the subject of a recent sermon series in our church, explaining the faith, encouraging the people, and most of all expressing how Christ is our salvation.

In our Lutheran heritage, we recognize the first writer of our reformed faith, Martin Luther. This month we celebrate the 507th anniversary of his 95 Theses, which he posted on the door at Wittenburg. This posting was followed by many other works, too numerous to list here – especially since Concordia Publishing House currently has 55 volumes of his writings.

Luther was one of many in a long line of pastors who helped shape what we believe and why we believe it, all founded in scripture. Philip Melanchthon. Martin Chemnitz. CFW Walter. Oswald Hoffmann. More recently, Paul Maier. These are just a smattering of writers who have helped us grow in faith by carefully examining and explaining our beliefs as Lutheran Christians.

With social media taking over the world, so to speak, I wonder how Luther might have used it if it were available to him? After all, he used the most modern technology at the time, the moveable-type printing press as developed by Gutenberg, but I can only imagine postings from Luther on X or other sites – assuming he wasn't repeatedly suspended for what the current world would call hate speech, since he was not one to mince words. Can you imagine the tags he might use in his posts? #reform #noindulgences #noromechurch #solascriptura #hereistand #norecant all come to mind. I'm certain he would find many others. I'm also convinced he would have firmly been in the sights of the "cancel culture" for his unabashed approach to the needed reform. And probably taken out of context as well: his oft-quoted phrase "sin boldly" is only part of a much longer statement, but all people seem to remember is that one snippet.

Today we unfortunately live in a world where words are still manipulated and taken out of context. And we seem to be in the middle of precisely what Paul wrote in 2 Timothy 4:3-4: "For the time is coming when people will not endure sound teaching, but having itching ears they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own passions, and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander off into myths." We seem to be exactly where Paul predicted we would be.

We continue to discuss how we at Calvary are Engaging People in Christ. More than ever, our clear and direct message of the Gospel needs to be told both inside and outside our building, as we Connect to others, we Learn (and teach) Scripture, and demonstrate Caring words and actions. Importantly, we must be bold in our actions, just as Luther was 507 years ago, preaching Christ to a world that needs Him more and more each day!

Sola scriptura, sola gratia, sola fide!

TOO GOOD TO BE TRUE?!

God has opened the doors to families who would not have considered Christian education opportunities within their financial abilities. How are these doors being opened?

Scholarship Grant Organization Program [SGO]

Private and corporate funded mechanisms are in place providing tuition scholarships to qualified families. All students are eligible for these scholarship grants. The same household income levels are used for the Indiana vouchers and the scholarship tax credit program. Calvary Lutheran Church and School has established our own Scholarship Tax Credit fund through The Lutheran SGO of Indiana, Inc.

Why should I consider donating to the Scholarship Grant fund?

Benefit #1: Each year Calvary Lutheran Church and School provided over \$30,000.00 in scholarship money to families unable to pay the entire tuition costs. Donating to the SGO fund has eliminated these budgeted scholarships.

Benefit #2: All your donated money comes right back to Calvary Lutheran Church and School.

Benefit #3: 50% of your corporate or private donation is an Indiana state tax CREDIT. If your state tax liability is less than your CREDIT, that CREDIT is extended for up to 9 years.

Currently, \$65,000.00 is needed to fully fund the scholarship grant applications. Please send in your donation by December 31, 2024 to the Lutheran SGO.


How Shall We Pray for our Children, Our Grandchildren, and Those We Love?


