From the Pastors

In this the love of God was made manifest among us, that God sent his only Son into the world, so that we might live through him. In this is love, not that we have loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the propitiation for our sins. Beloved, if God so loved us, we also ought to love one another. 1 John 4:9-11 ESV

February 14 is St. Valentine's Day, a day that originally honored a Christian who lived in the Roman empire in the third century. A number of legends have developed around Valentine including his imprisonment for performing marriages of Roman soldiers (forbidden by the emperor) and the healing of his jailor's daughter. Another familiar story is his sending of a note to that daughter, signed "Your Valentine" which has spawned the popular tradition of sending hearts and cards to those we love on Valentines Day.

February 18 marks Ash Wednesday. This is the traditional beginning of the season of Lent (40 days not counting Sundays until Easter). Lent is a penitential season where we remember the road to the cross and the passion of our Lord. But Lent is also a season where we remember God's love. John's epistle reminds us that true love in our world is seen most clearly in God's love for fallen humanity. God's self-sacrificing and decisive active love for sinners sent Jesus into our world to be the one sacrifice for all sin.

During the season of Lent, we will be exploring the implications of God's love for us. Our midweek worship services focus our attention on the Passion of Jesus through the lens of St. Matthew's gospel. Our theme is *Not our Plans, HIS Plan* (Matthew 26:1-28:10). On the Sundays of our Lenten journey, we will be studying repentance and reconciliation in our series, *Questions of Forgiveness*. Please plan to join us!

It is at the cross at Calvary that we see the depth of God's love for us. And that love encourages and empowers us to share forgiveness and sacrificial, self-giving love with others in our world. As Christians, we share the love of Christ within our family, our congregation and school, and our community and world. May you know God's love and show God's love to those around you.

Executive Director

From Your Executive Director

This has been an unusual winter, to say the least. From bitter cold early in the season to spring-like conditions early in January then back to bitter cold the middle of the month, the swings up and down have been staggering. It has confused my flowers that bloom in spring, with many of them departing from dormancy, only to be beaten back into submission by the cold.

Yes, it has been a season of change!

Speaking of change, I hope you've seen the changes that took place the last few months of 2025 in our facility. The new café area is finally complete, the women's restroom is completely remodeled, the garage was rehabbed with new siding, roof, and doors. After 29 years, we also replaced the HVAC system in the gym (and it was a used system when we installed it, so we certainly got our money's worth). Other things are in process: the doors from the gym to the sidewalk, original to that facility from 1963, are being replaced, and we have a plan to address the drainage problem that has caused flooding of our narthex on more than one occasion.

These are just the tip of the iceberg. There are many other things that need to be updated or renovated: the men's restrooms in the narthex. The 29-year-old carpet in the narthex and sanctuary needs replaced. Lighting in the narthex also needs updated.

But wait! There's more! There are other parts of the building that need updating: the restrooms by the library. The locker rooms and restrooms by the gym. And ideally, a new control system for our heating and cooling units, replacing the 1970s era control system, to reduce energy use and better control the overall campus temperature.

Why do we need to do all these projects? Remember, parts of our building date back to 1950. Other parts to the early 1960s. Others to the 1980s, and 1990s. We've had a good run with our building, and we now need to reinvest to keep our building in good condition for the next 50 years or more.

None of these are inexpensive projects. This is why you have been hearing, and reading, about the Calvary Connects project, our first significant fund drive since we paid off our mortgage several years ago. While some of these projects have already been paid out of our financial reserves, we cannot spend everything we have: we must always retain what can best be called a "rainy day fund" for future or unexpected costs.

We are blessed as a congregation to have the resources to fund some of these, and extremely blessed that many of our members have stepped forward with a commitment to the campaign. For these, we are so very thankful.

Our congregation was a mission church started before the stock market crash of 1929 and established as a formal congregation during the Great Depression. Through WWII, the strife of the 1960s, runaway inflation in the late 1970s, and even the COVID pandemic, our members have always placed their faith in God, and our congregation has benefited and grown. Here we are today, an incredible family of Christ, where one can hear His Word and receive His Sacrament weekly, where children receive a Christian education, where we support missions to other countries: we truly live our mission of Engaging People in Christ, by Connecting, Learning, and Caring.

If you have made a pledge to the Calvary Connects campaign, thank you. If you have not, I ask that you pray on what commitment you can make to help us continue our almost 100-year-old mission, as we continually receive God's blessings in all we do.

STEM * STEAM * STREAM

Acronyms are found everywhere. Ask a teenager to text a message and more acronyms, abbreviations, and initialisms will be on the message than completely spelled out accepted words. The military is known for their use of acronyms, initialisms, and abbreviations. This use in communication has been utilized for decades. It is most and only beneficial if the use is communicated within a field known by both the sender and the receiver. When I first saw **LOL** on a text message, I thought that it meant "Lots of Love." I wondered why that was sent when describing in the previous text something that was supposed to be humorous.

Understanding is the key to all communication. Both acronyms and initialisms are made up of the first letter or letters of the words in a phrase. The word *acronym* typically applies when the resulting thing can be read as a word; for example, *radar* comes from "radio detection and ranging" and *scuba* comes from "self-contained underwater breathing apparatus." The word *initialism* only applies when the resulting thing is read as an abbreviation. For example *DIY*, which comes from "do it yourself," is pronounced by saying the names of the letters.

STEM continues to be a hot topic of emphasis within the educational field. Science Technology Engineering Mathematics have been the focus for student development within the classroom and beyond. This combined study is to help formulate and help to prepare individuals for future occupational adventures as well. STEAM adds the academic discipline of ART. This carries another layer of talents and skills to be learned and explored. Calvary incorporates STREAM. This acronym adds the R for Religion. Each day God's Word is taught in truth and purity. 



Calvary Connects Update

As you are aware, in September, we initiated a capital campaign (Calvary Connects) to enhance our ministry by making much needed improvements to our facilities. Two of the projects for this campaign (the Café and the women's restroom in the Narthex) are already completed. The flooring and wall coverings in the Sanctuary and Narthex are expected to be the next phase for this project. While we are still getting pricing for the project, it is expected that all the phases of the project to have a total cost of approximately \$1,250,000. Calvary's leadership initially designated \$500,000 from our reserves as a challenge match to encourage participation in the capital campaign.

As of January 2026, we are well over halfway to our initial goal of \$750,000 in pledges from our members. With over \$600,000 pledged by our members to date, we have more than met the \$500,000 challenge. With approximately \$600,000 pledged to date we are at about 80% of our goal of \$750,000.

If you have not yet made a pledge to the Calvary Connects campaign, please prayerfully consider doing so by completing one of the pledge cards found at the entrances to the sanctuary.

Lenten Midweek Offering Envelopes

Looking ahead to the Lenten offering designation, contributions received in the purple-trimmed Lent envelopes or designated as "Lent" or through online giving will be used to support the Student Assistance Fund. The Student Assistance fund provides scholarships for Calvary members studying to be church workers. These scholarships are made possible by funds from both the Wessler Family Endowment and the Student Assistance Fund. A CALL TO PRAYER

"If my people, who are called by my name, will humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven, and I will forgive their sin and will heal their land." 2 Chronicles 7:14

How we all long for healing in our land. We fret, we complain, we debate, we accuse . . . but do we pray?

Did you know that during World War II when London faced nightly blitzkriegs the people fell to their knees in prayer? Each night at 9:00 p.m. when the Big Ben's chimes would peal out the hour, all British society would come to a standstill and pray for at least one minute for their land. They prayed for protection, for their leaders, soldiers, and loved ones, and for the defeat of the Nazi regime. Winston Churchill came to endorse the effort and the chimes of "Big Ben minute" were broadcast throughout the nation by the BBC at precisely 9:00 p.m. And Britain persevered and victory did come, preserving their freedom and freedom for western civilization as well.

After the war a German intelligence officer when interrogated said: "During the war, you had a secret weapon for which we could find no countermeasure, and which we did not understand. But it was very powerful. It was associated with the striking of Big Ben each evening. I believe you called it 'the Silent Minute.'"

Can we at Calvary do likewise? Imagine if every member would commit to pray at this hour, what wonders could be accomplished! We pray that God would not find us sleeping but watching and praying. As one of our hymns so aptly says:

Rise, my soul to watch and pray; From your sleep awaken!
Be not by the evil day, Unawares o'er taken;
For the foe, Well we know, Is a harvest reaping
While the saints are sleeping. (LSB #663)

We might not hear the chimes of Big Ben calling out the hour, but we can hear God's voice calling out to us:

"Call upon me in the day of trouble; I will deliver you, and you shall glorify me." Psalm 50:15
